### SENIOR CLASS HISTORY 1938

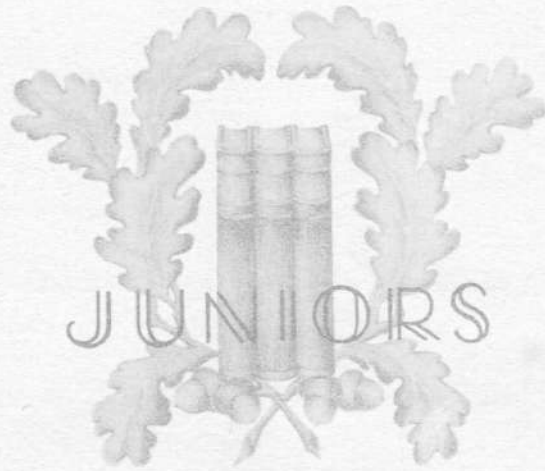
