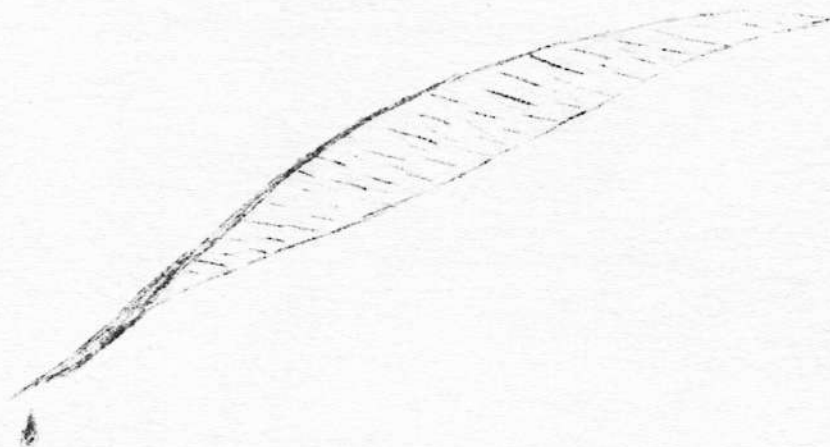

One night I had a dream. A marvelous dream. I dreamed of the future of the Senior Class of 1939. My dream began in New York. I was window shopping before one of the largest dry goods stores in the city.

The finest display of goods in all the windows was the Simmon's bed window. In the foreground was a handsome bed with lovely drapes and pillows. But, who is this, sleeping soundly in the bed? Why, of course, and who could it be but Ted Cadman?

Just then, a short bearded hobo with a pack on his back bumped into me. Being of a curious nature, I asked him where he was from.

"From Port Orford", he said, "I have toured the whole of North and South America and I am preparing to charter passage on the Queen Mary, for a trip through Europe."

Surely, after that, who could mistake him for any but Delbert Womer?

I wished him luck, then crossed the street and entered a picture studio that took up the whole ground floor of the building. Smiling and rubbing his hands together, the manager of the store came forward and showed me through the store. I was especially interested in one department where posed photographs were being taken. 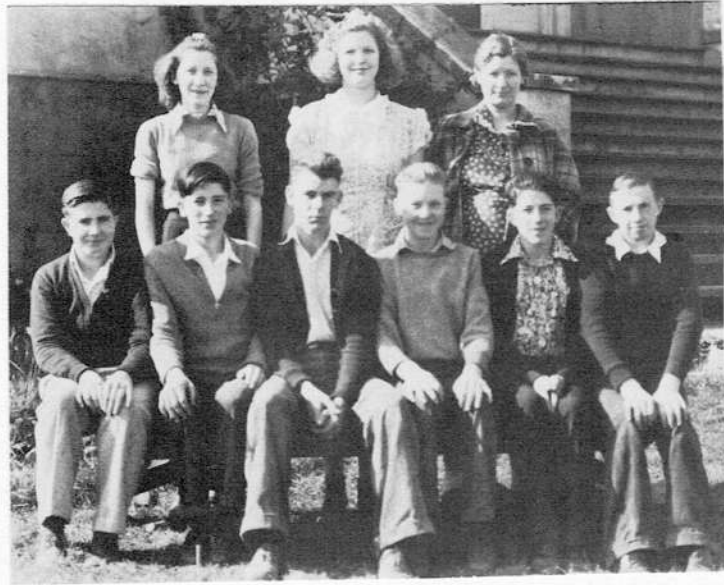
#### RINGS

Dropping only four out of 17 games played this season.

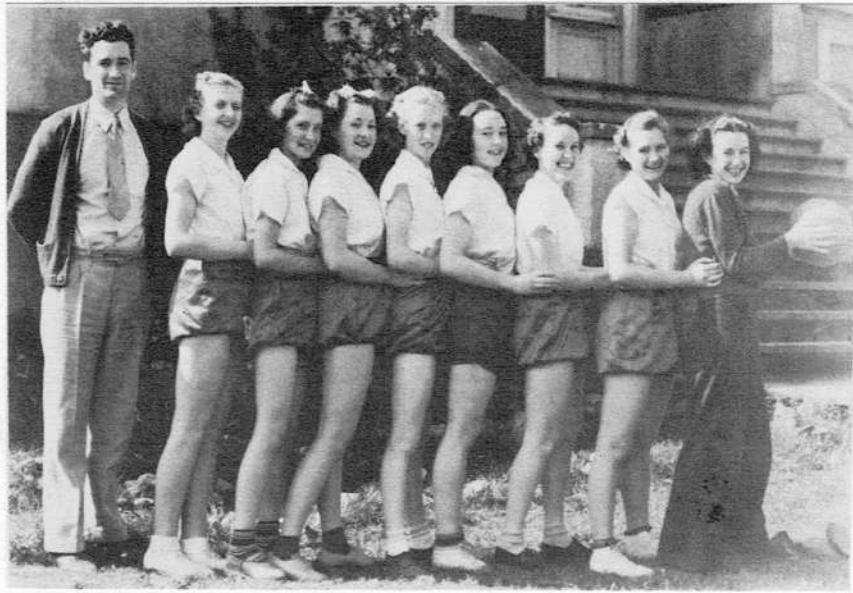
Scoring 449 points to their opponents' 346 all but one of their conference games. By winning the county championship, P. O. H. S. acquired a bronze trophy and a beautiful blue and gold pennant from the Lion's Club of Gold Beach.

High point man for the season was Elton Miller with 121 points. This is the second year in a row that Elton has copped this distinction and it is probable that he will take it again.

The Pirates blossomed out in bright new suits in their first conference game which was with Brookings. The suits are royal blue with white trimmings. Instead of the regular sweat shirts, warm-up jackets of jockey satin were purchased.

The annual trek to Ashland was taken by the squad. Entering in the Championship division, P. O. H. S. represented Curry County. No luck this year as the Pirates were defeated by Keno and Central Point.

Prospects for next year seem to be fair. With only two regulars graduating this year, Ted Cadman and Art Eddy, which leaves Elton Miller, "Huck" Maloy, Jim Adams, Cecil Jamieson, and Ralph Sweet to carry on.



#### GIRLS' SPORTS

In October, the girls played two games of volley ball with Langlois. The first game at Port Orford, October 15, was won by Langlois by a score of 40 to 33. On October 20, Langlois again won by a very narrow margin, 37 to 36, on their own floor.

## HISTORY FROM THE LOG

Sept. 16, 1938

School opened on Tuesday, September 6, with an enrollment of 56 pupils.

There are 20 Freshmen, 12 Sophomores, 15 Juniors and 9 Seniors.

The faculty, composed of Miss Clark, Mrs. Paris and Mr. Griffith, is the same as last year.

The new subjects are Social Problems, World Geography, and Chemistry. The Science text and the Typing I text are by new authors. Miss Clark is teaching the Social Problems and the World Geography; and Mr. Griffith, the Chemistry.

Oct. 28, 1938

Friday, Oct. 28, the Port Orford High School Student Body had the annual Class Night Program. A large part of the program was original.

The proceeds from the program amounted to \$18.70. This money will be used to pay bills and buy athletic equipment.

Nov. 23, 1938

On Thursday afternoon, a picture show was held in the gymnasium under the sponsorship of the Student Body.

December 10, 1938

The Hi School students are giving their first dance of the season, Friday December 9, with music by Babe's Melody Kings.

The gymnasium is being beautifully decorated in a cobweb network of gayly colored crepe paper growing out of autumn leaves which adorn the walls. An effective lighting system is also being constructed.

January 13, 1939

During the Christmas holidays Mr. Longstaff put an additional coat of varnish on the gymnasium floor.

January 27, 1939

The high school is sponsoring the show, THE AFFAIRS OF ANNABEL, this Thursday, Friday, and Saturday at the local theatre. The comedy features Jack Oakie and Annabel.



January 27, 1939

Died, January 5, 1939, at its home in the high school gymnasium at Port Orford, Oak Upright Piano, Number 20, 277, after a long painful illness. The end came suddenly, shortly after a severe bout with one of the members of "Babe's Melody Kings". The internal organs of the deceased, due to strained ligaments and a rheumatic heart, not only were torn loose and collapsed, but fell out completely, and the body toppled heavily against a stairway, and life was gone.

The mourning students covered the remains with blue cloth and are waiting a fitting burial ceremony. Meanwhile, the Piano lies in state in the morgue, near the stage entrance, and visitors may pay their respects.

March 3, 1939

The Port Orford High School basketball squad, accompanied by the coach, Ray Griffith, Elliott Woodworth, and Delbert Womer, left Wednesday morning for Ashland where the Pirates will enter the championship series of the Southern Oregon Normal "B" tournament.

March 3, 1939

The student body held a dance in the gymnasium following the ball games last Friday night. The dance, including the supper, and checking booth, netted about \$37.

March 3, 1939

Thursday, February 16, Mr. Fernald took pictures of the students for the 1939 annual.

March 31, 1939

The two one-act plays presented March 17 were quite a success. A large crowd attended them and the student body netted \$34.15. Between the plays the Junior Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Ralph Baird, played and the high school glee club sang. The evening as a whole was very pleasing. The cast of the play "Bread" was as follows: Vernon Jamieson, Norma Price, Ruth McClintock, Bruce Zumwalt, Elmyra Holcomb, and Dorothy White. The "Quiet Home Wedding" cast included: Glenn Biddle, Loeta Johnson, Louise Pattison, Georgina McKenzie, Betty Zumwalt, Alida Quick, Fern Gerber, Donald Sweet, Wallace Coon, and Jim Adams.

March 31, 1939

The high schools annual "Spring Dance" has been scheduled to be May 6, the same day as the County Track Meet. Bum Gartin's Swing Band has been engaged to play for that night, and a large crowd is expected.

April 14, 1939

A senior auction was held Friday afternoon, April 7, to help raise funds for their "sneak" day. Joe Douglas was the able auctioneer, and the auction was quite a success. The high school was the only audience.

April 14, 1939

The show held on Thursday, March 30, sponsored by the Student Body and presented by Mr. Tomlinson, netted about \$2.86 to the Student Body.

## ONE ACT PLAY CONTEST

This year Port Orford again won the one-act play contest, held at Gold Beach. They presented the farce, "A Quiet Home Wedding".

The story concerned the family's struggle to have Connie's wedding come off smoothly, during which Junior is arrested for speeding, and running over Horace, the groom. At last the "Quiet Home Wedding" was postponed, and everybody "breathed in their diaphragm".

## CLASS NIGHT

One of the annual activities of the school is the Class Night Program. Every year each class devises an entertainment, and all of them are given before an audience. Judges are chosen and the class which presents the finest program is given a holiday.

This year a very original program was presented. The Seniors enacted Dr. Cutemupski's free clinic, and gave their impression of a school board meeting. (Next page, please)

The Juniors presented a County Fair, the Junior boys gracefully executed a Greek Dance, and a girls' trio of Olive Smith, Norma Price, and "Dot" Mather sang "When Mother Nature Sings Her Lullaby".

The Sophomore Class program consisted of a skit, "The Dime Lunch", a graveyard scene, which showed the gruesome lighting effects now possible, and a song "The Little Brown Jug" by Ralph Sweet.

The Freshmen held a meeting to decide what to give for Class Night, and put on a Professor Quiz skit, and a farce, in the course of the meeting.

#### THE HIGH SCHOOL NEWSPAPER

In November, 1936, the school board purchased a duplicator for the high school. The Civics Class, under the editorship of Jack MacDonald, put out a modest four page paper called the Pirates Monthly. The next month a larger paper was issued. The name was changed to Pirates Bi-Weekly, issued twice a month, and a regular staff was appointed.

Near the end of the year, Jack moved to Coquille and Nadine Babel was elected Editor. Many improvements were made under her management. A different style of advertising treatment was started and the paper was divided into sections, with a person responsible for each section.

At the beginning of the 1938-39 school year Loeta Johnson was elected Editor. The name of the paper was changed to "Pirates Log". She has improved the quality of the paper used, and has inaugurated a two column sheet.

The policy of the paper is to contain material concerning the school, written by school students, or of exceptional interest to the school.

### THE GIRLS' CLUB

In 1935, the Girls' Club was formed under the leadership of Miss Dorothy Parks. In that year, Doris Forty was president. Pat Moyer was president in 1936, and Nadine Babel in 1937. Loeta Johnson held that office this year. The membership of the club is from seventy five to one hundred percent of the girls in school.

The Girls' Club has sent delegates to the Southwestern Oregon Girls' League Convention for the past two years. They have learned many things helpful to the school.

The Club has sponsored and given many parties and celebrations, and acted as hostess for the Girls' Play Day.

### THE GLEE CLUB

The Glee Club was handled by Mr. Fernald for part of this year, then Mrs. Corson assumed leadership. The group studied three part singing, and sang for several public occasions. They took part in the Music Week Program held in the gymnasium on May 9.

### THE COUNTY TYPING CONTEST

On Friday, April 21, a typing contest was held at Port Orford. All schools in the county took part. In the Novice section, Wallace Bullard, Gold Beach, was awarded the prize for speed with a score of 10 errors, 46 words per minute. Irene Markle, Port Orford, took honors for accuracy with a score of 3 errors, 40 words per minute. The tests covered fifteen minutes continuous typing.

In the Amateur section, Dwight Tyson, Port Orford, took both speed and accuracy awards, with a record of 2 errors, 46 words per minute.



### NUMBER OF GRADUATES

From 1924 to 1939, one hundred sixteen students have graduated from Port Orford High School. They divide quite equally between boys and girls; fifty nine boys and fifty seven girls. They are all living.

### HIGHER EDUCATION

Twenty of these students have completed some course of higher education; college, normal school, business school, or technical school.

### HONORS RECEIVED BY GRADUATES

Davis Ponting and Leslie Zumwalt have both won membership in the National Agricultural Fraternity, and (Secretary of the "Varsity O").

Neil Rice won a membership in the National Athletic Fraternity.

In an examination for graduate nurses held in California, Helen Capps received the second highest grade in the state.

Mary Catherine Soranson was elected a member of Phi Beta Kappa, the highest national honorary scholastic organization.

A great many of the graduates who attended college achieved honor grades. Among those who have done so are: Roderick McKenzie, Mary Soranson, Leslie Zumwalt, Bill Sweet, Melba White, Davis Ponting, and Bill Soranson.

### PRESENT POSITION OF ALUMNI

Five of the graduates have entered the teaching profession. Many of them hold responsible positions. Most of the graduates are engaged in useful occupations and none are criminally inclined, as shown by the fact that none are in prison!
