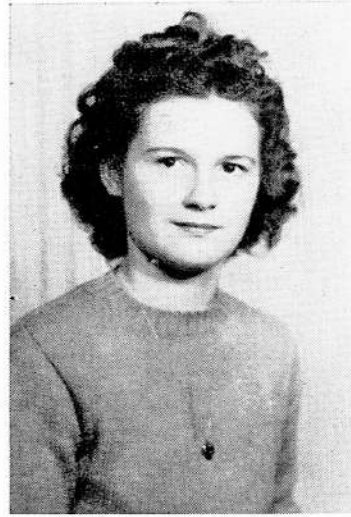
This class was very active in every activity sponsored by or in the school.

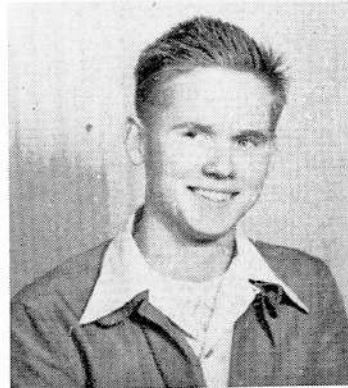

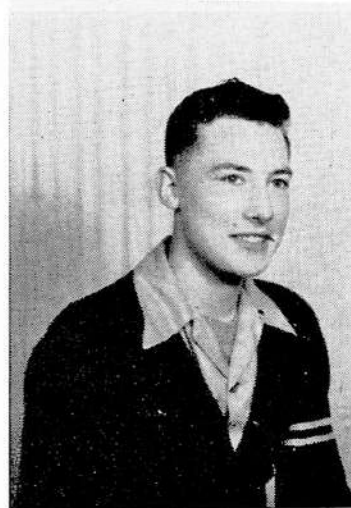

We tied up our class history by throwing a school skating party which was proclaimed one of the outstanding successes of Port Orford High school.

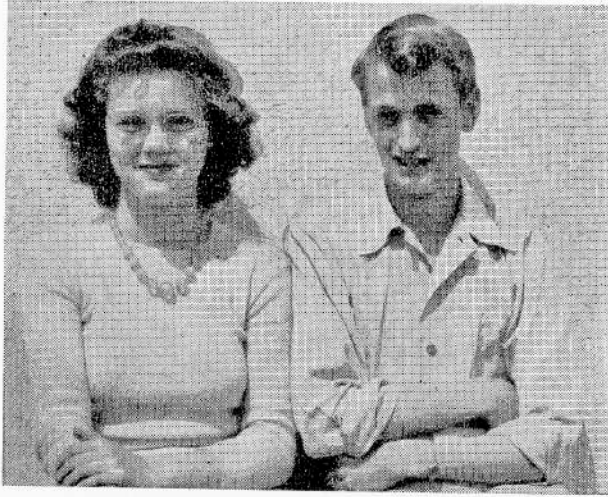

When the freshman class entered Port Orford High School there were six members. At the beginning of the second semester Blaine Marsh entered from Hill Military Academy.

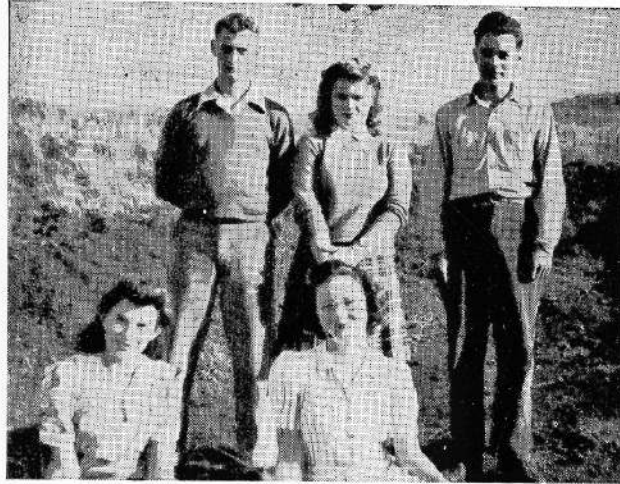
The freshmen were given the traditional task of cleaning up the lawn and tennis court. At first the freshmen didn't want to work but they were persuaded to do so by the use of paddles.

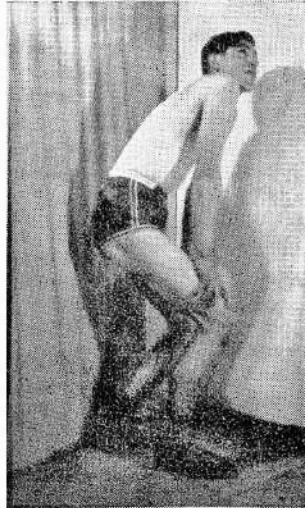

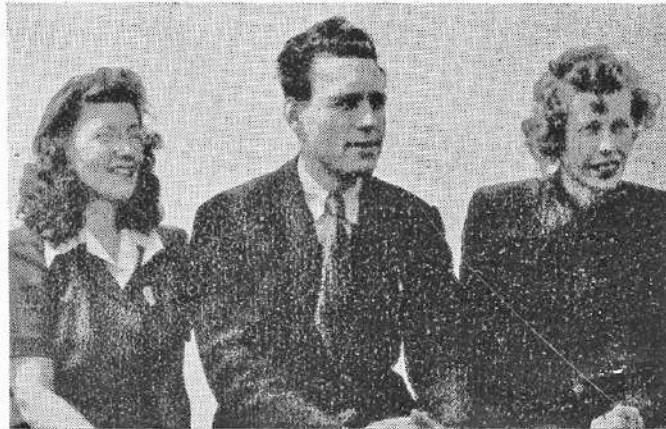
