


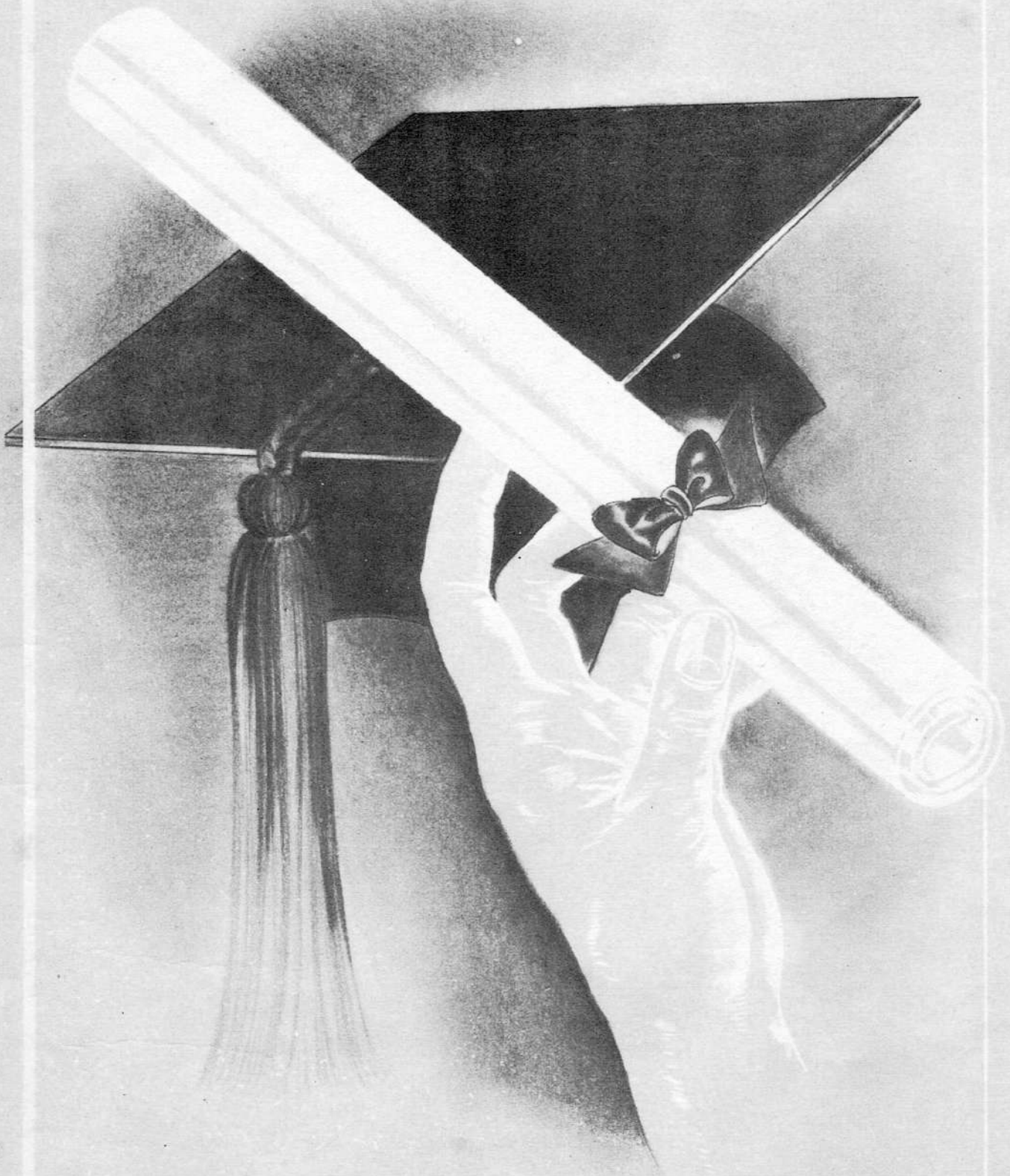

SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

With the enrollment of sixteen freshmen in September of 1941, the class of "45" began its high school career (as freshmen they were very studious----but as the years have passed many changes have taken place). They did their part as they were told by the upper classmen, who saw to it that they never had an idle minute.

By the time they were ready to make their appearance as sophomores, their class had dwindled down to fourteen. The first week was a joyful one, while they gave the "Freshies" their orders of the week.

Then the time came that they were upper classmen (at last). A journalism class was started in which most of the juniors were interested. February 25, 1944, the juniors took part in a carnival given to finance the year book of "44".

Their senior year has proved most exciting, although a lot of privileges were barred them. January 27, 1945, the senior class opened the Ritz Orford Night Club for a one night run. March 24, they gave a senior ball in the H.S. gym. It was decorated in spring colors and greenery.

On completion of their successful years in P. O. H. S., this class of "45" will be remembered in the years to come for its pep, school spirit and cooperation.

After suffering the terrible ordeal of being freshman, the sophomore class of '45 heaved a sigh of relief and looked at their school in a new light.

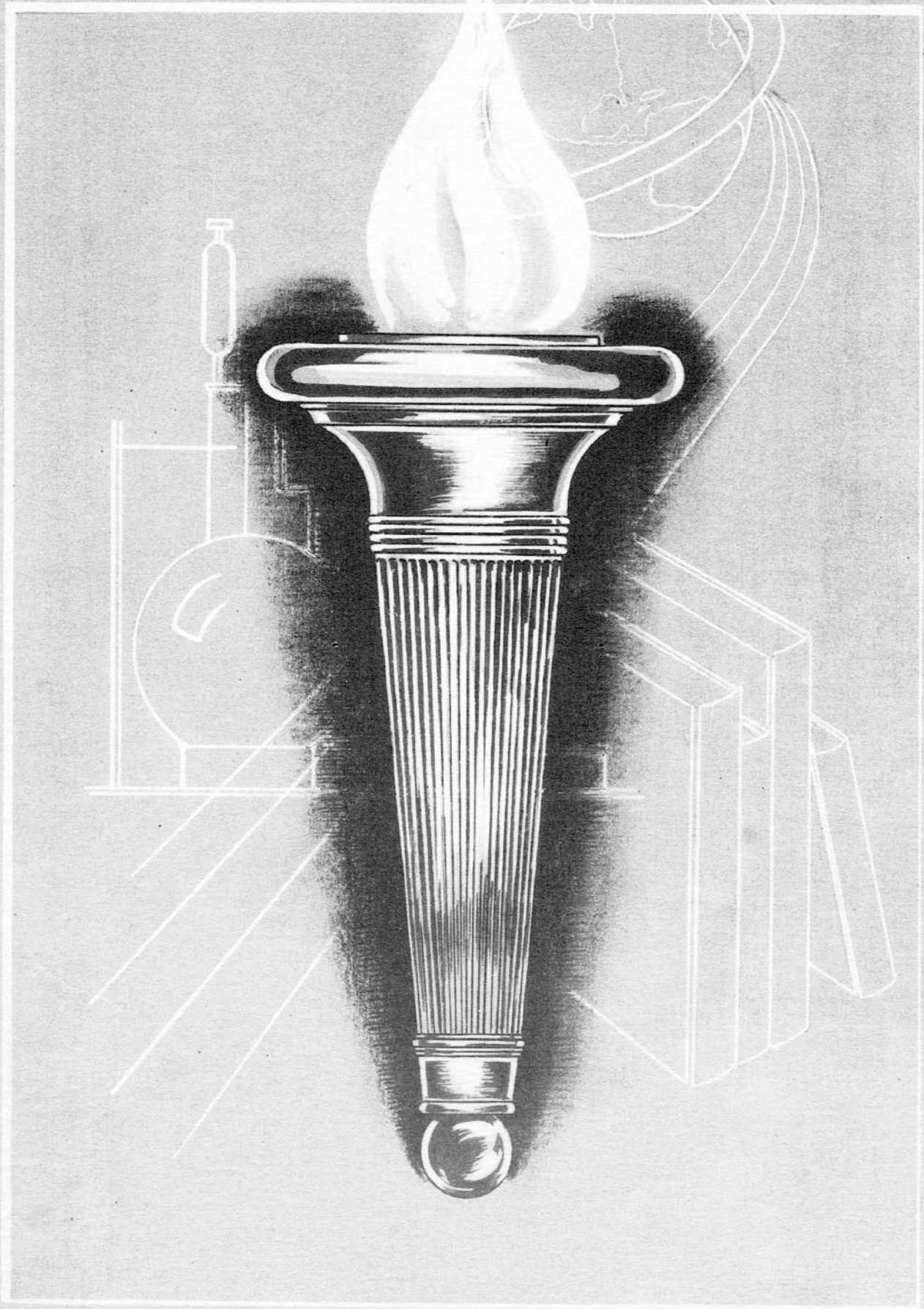
Our main interest at the first of school was to make the initiation of the freshman as gruesome as we could. Rotten eggs were the specialty of the initiation party.

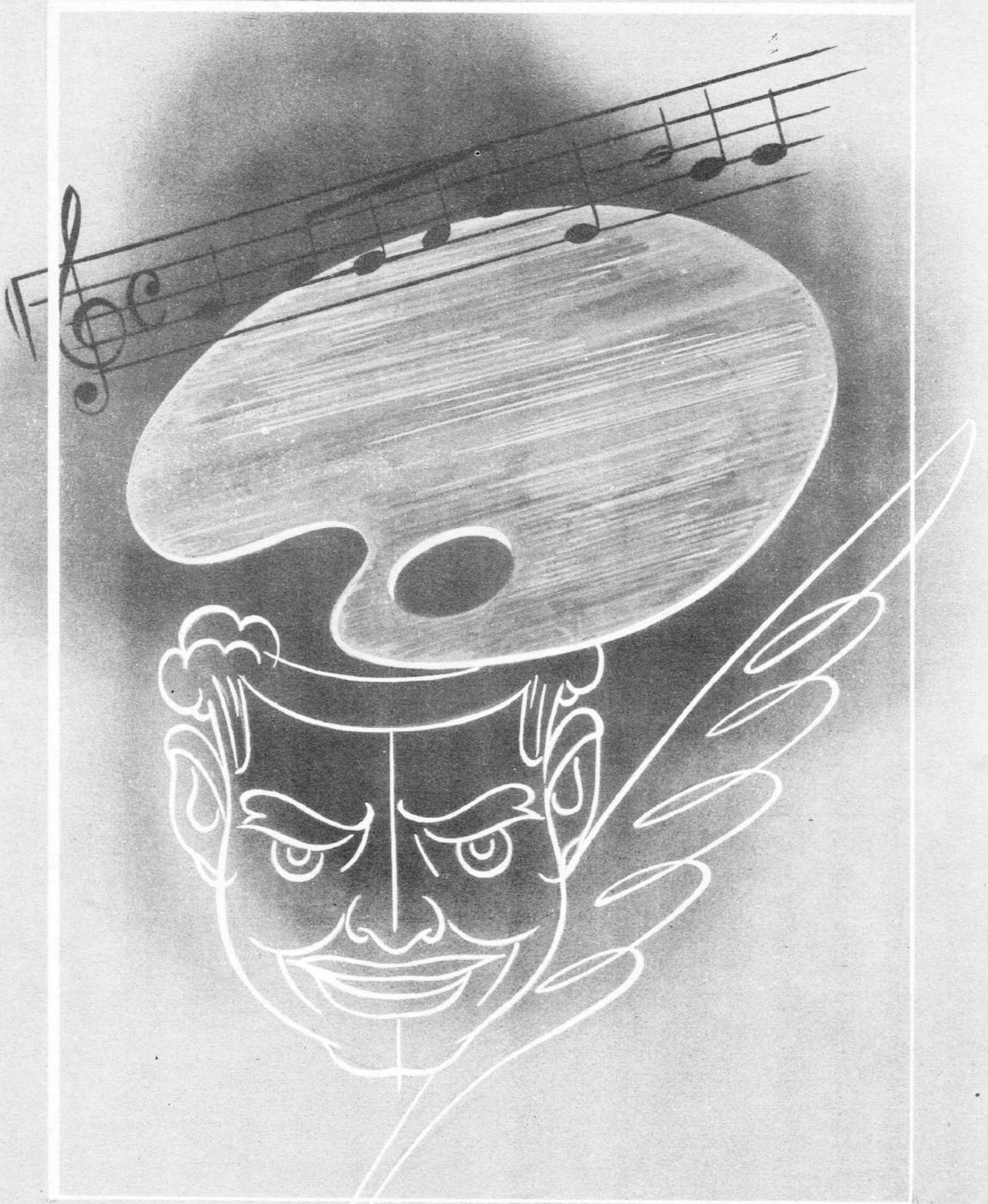
Mr. Helm teaches social economics, world history, manual training, general science, and geography. He also heads the glee club and physical education class.





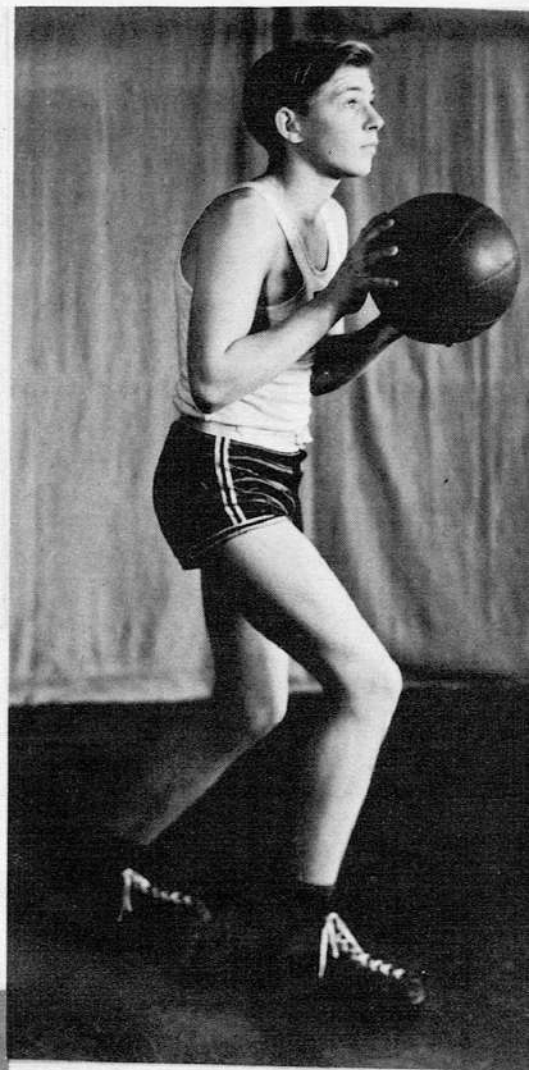

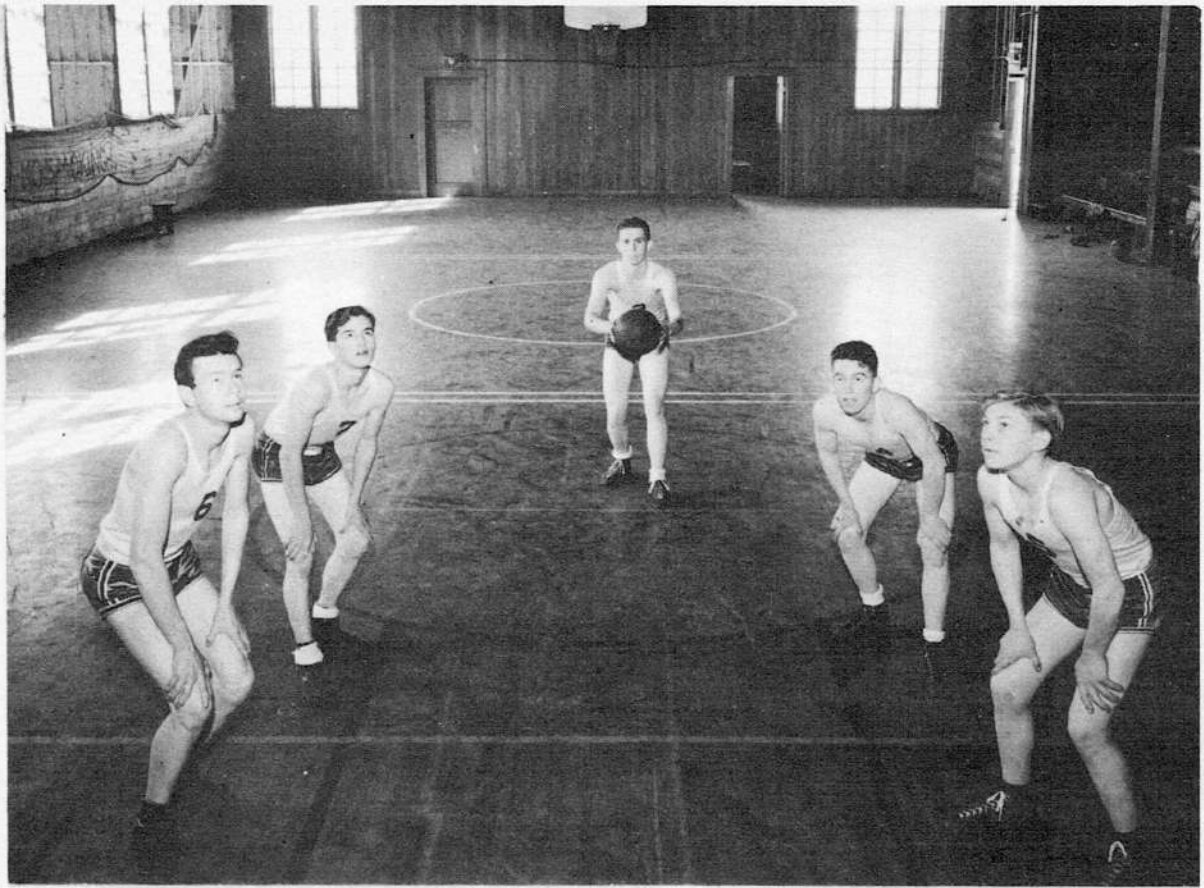

GIRL'S SPORTS

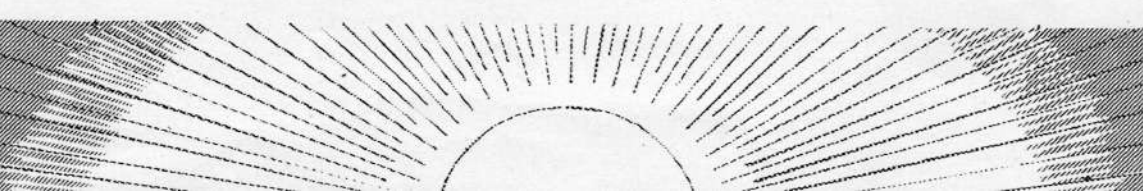
Volleyball, the main girl's sport, dominated the fall and winter season. Dolores Marsh captained the team during the inter-school competitions.

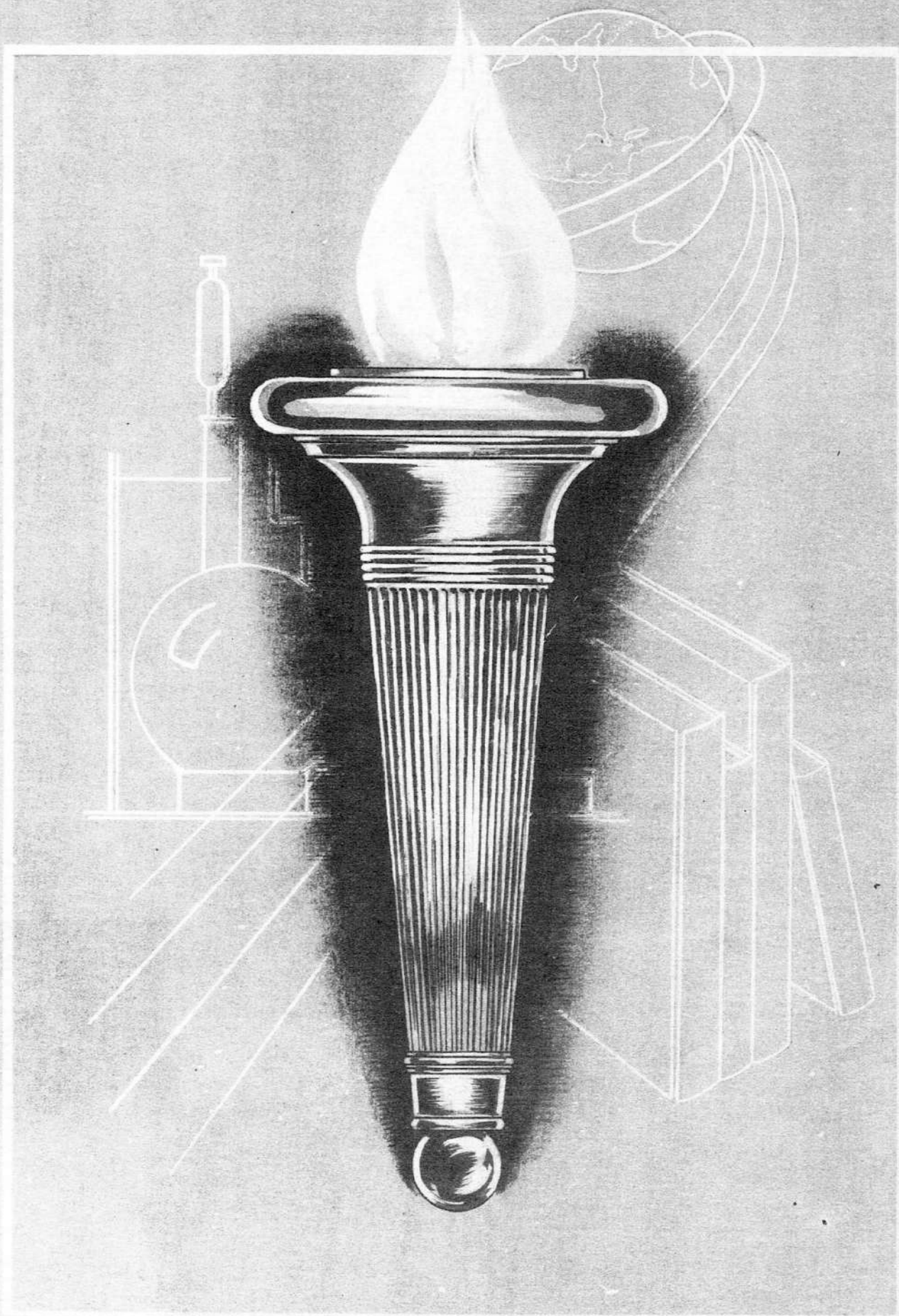

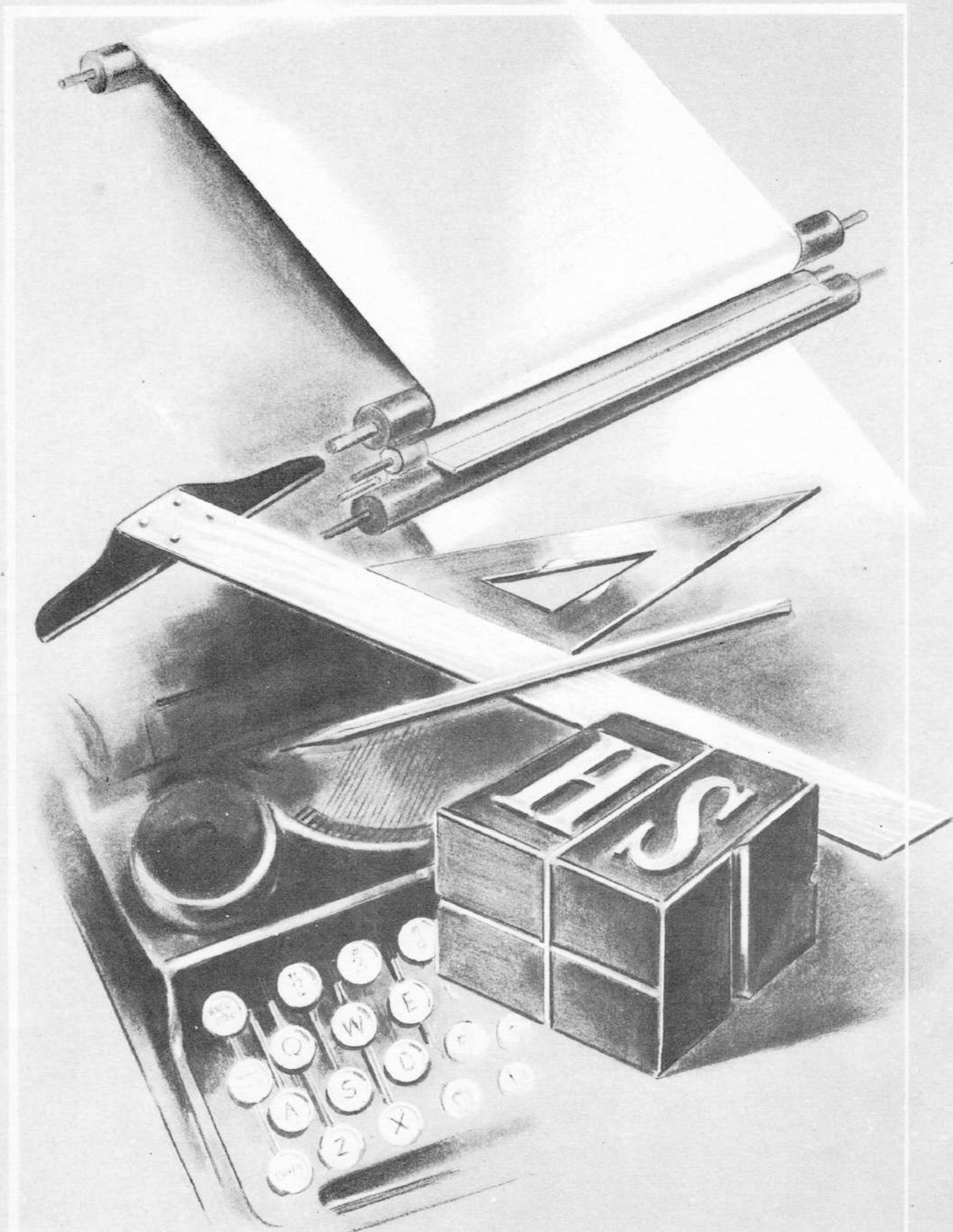
