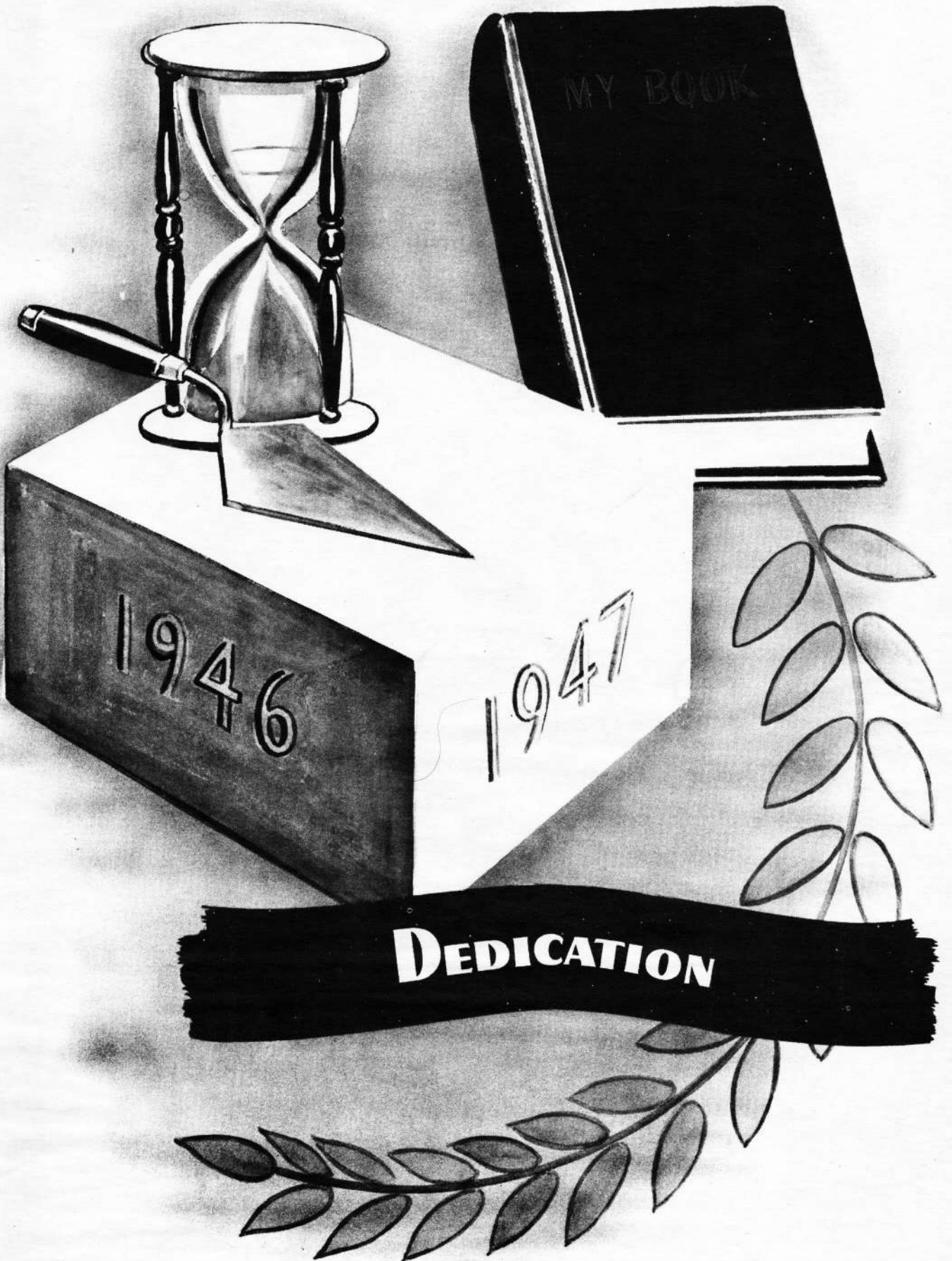
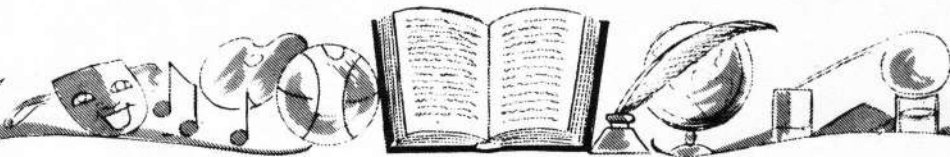

She teaches English and Home Economics.

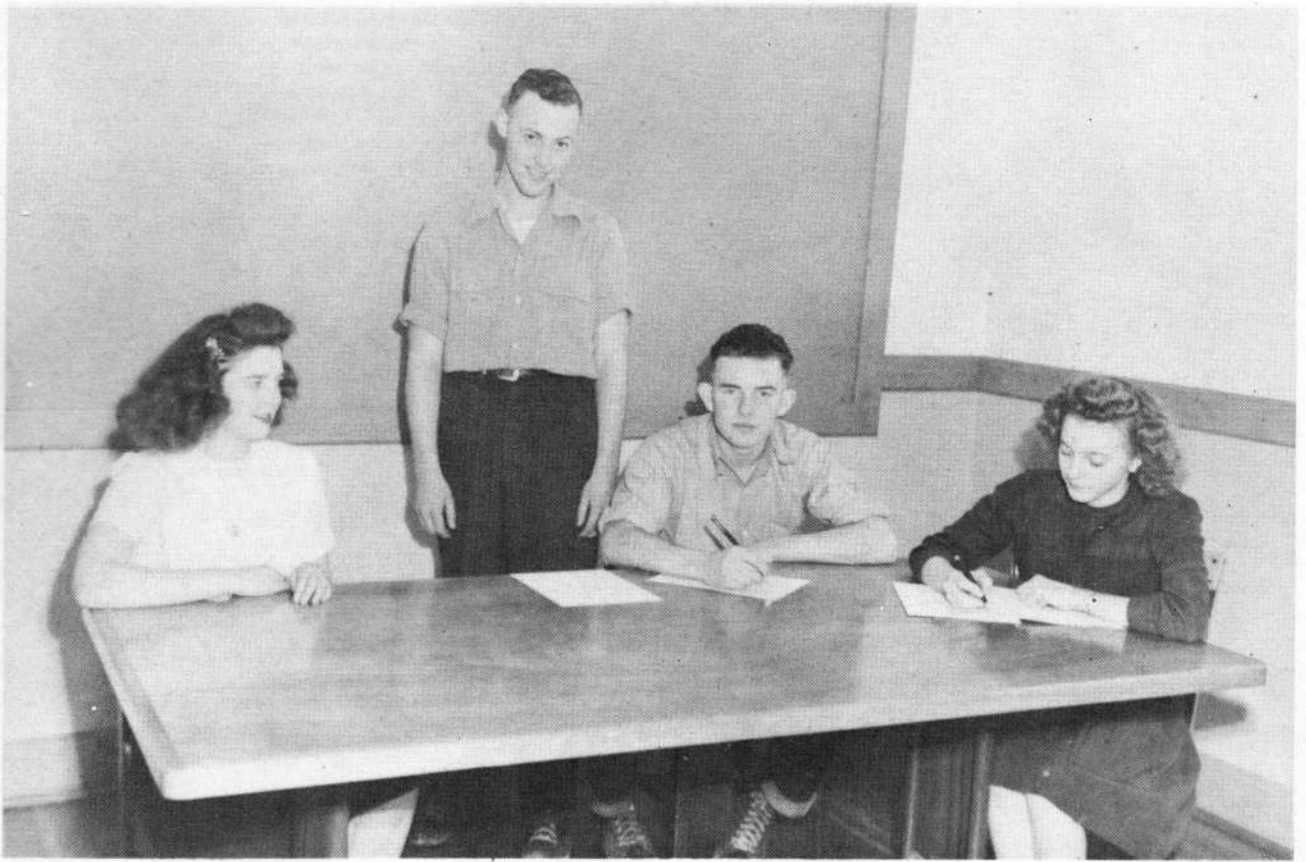


Miss Boice

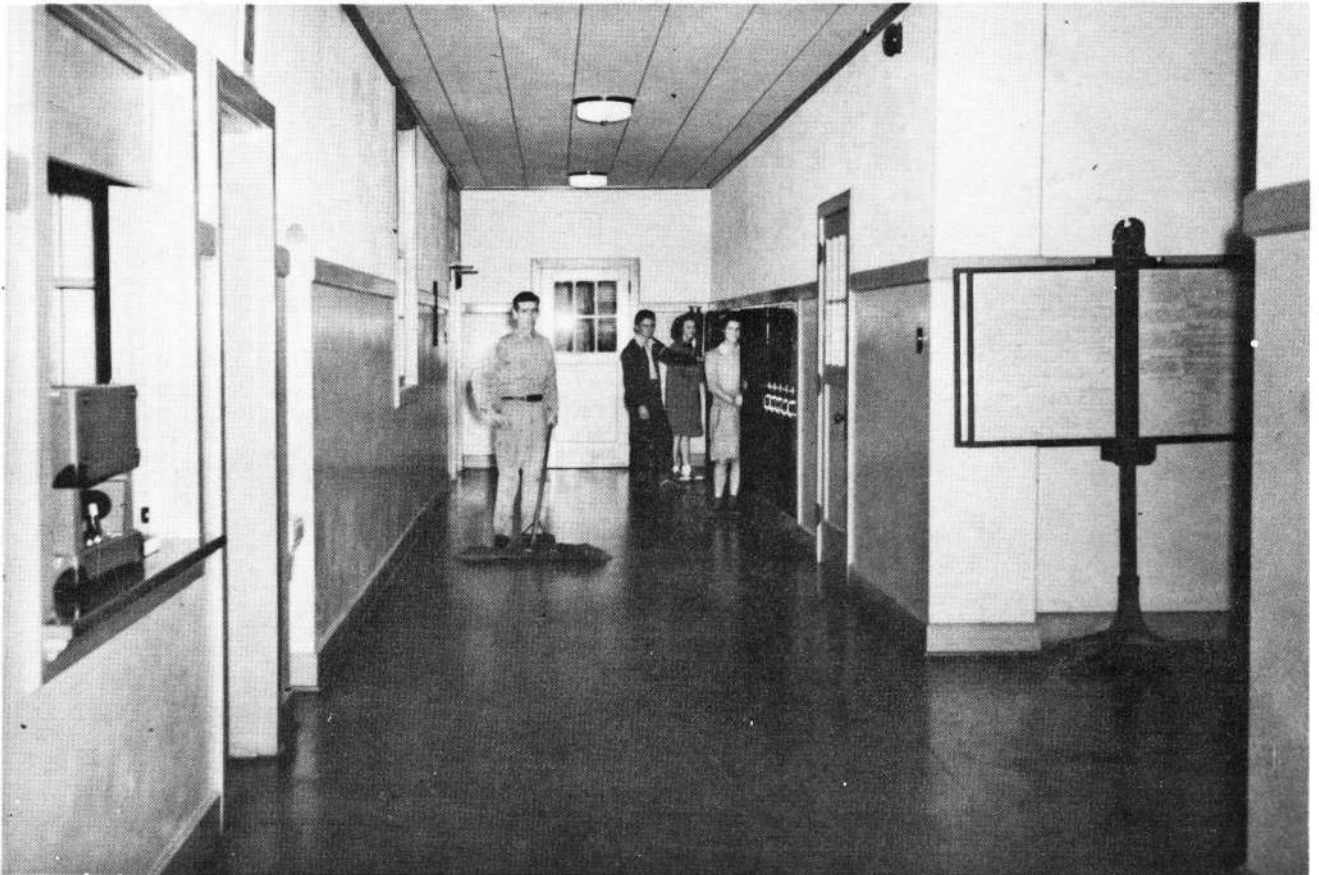

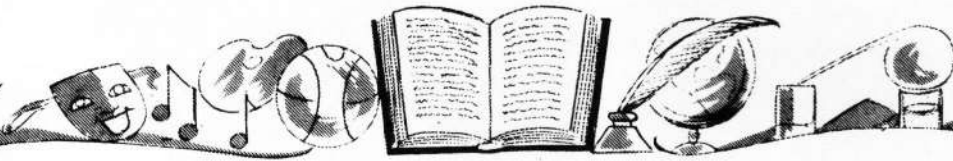

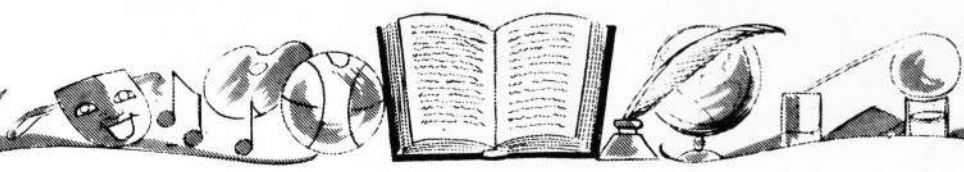

Next year's team is planning on giving their competitors a good fight and will try to come out on top.

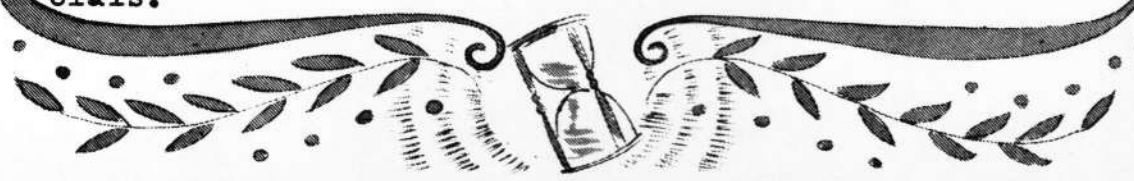

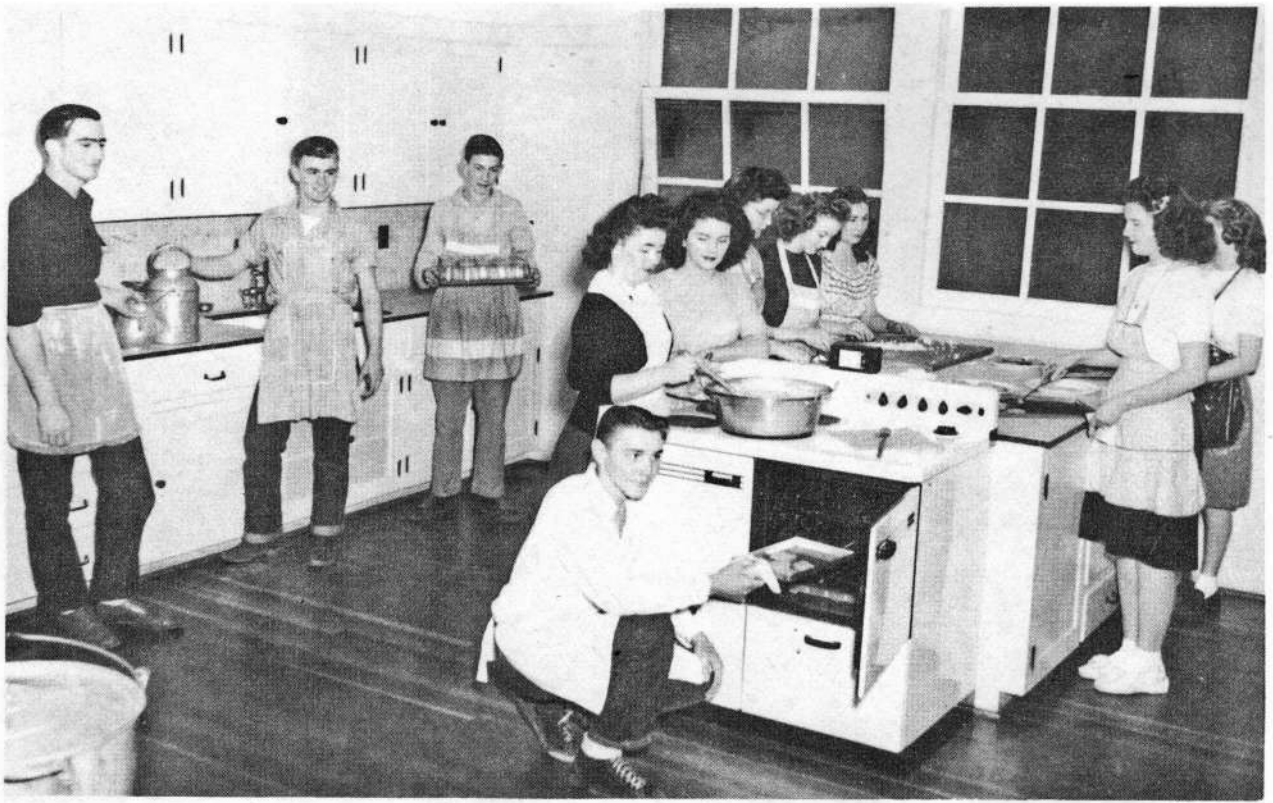

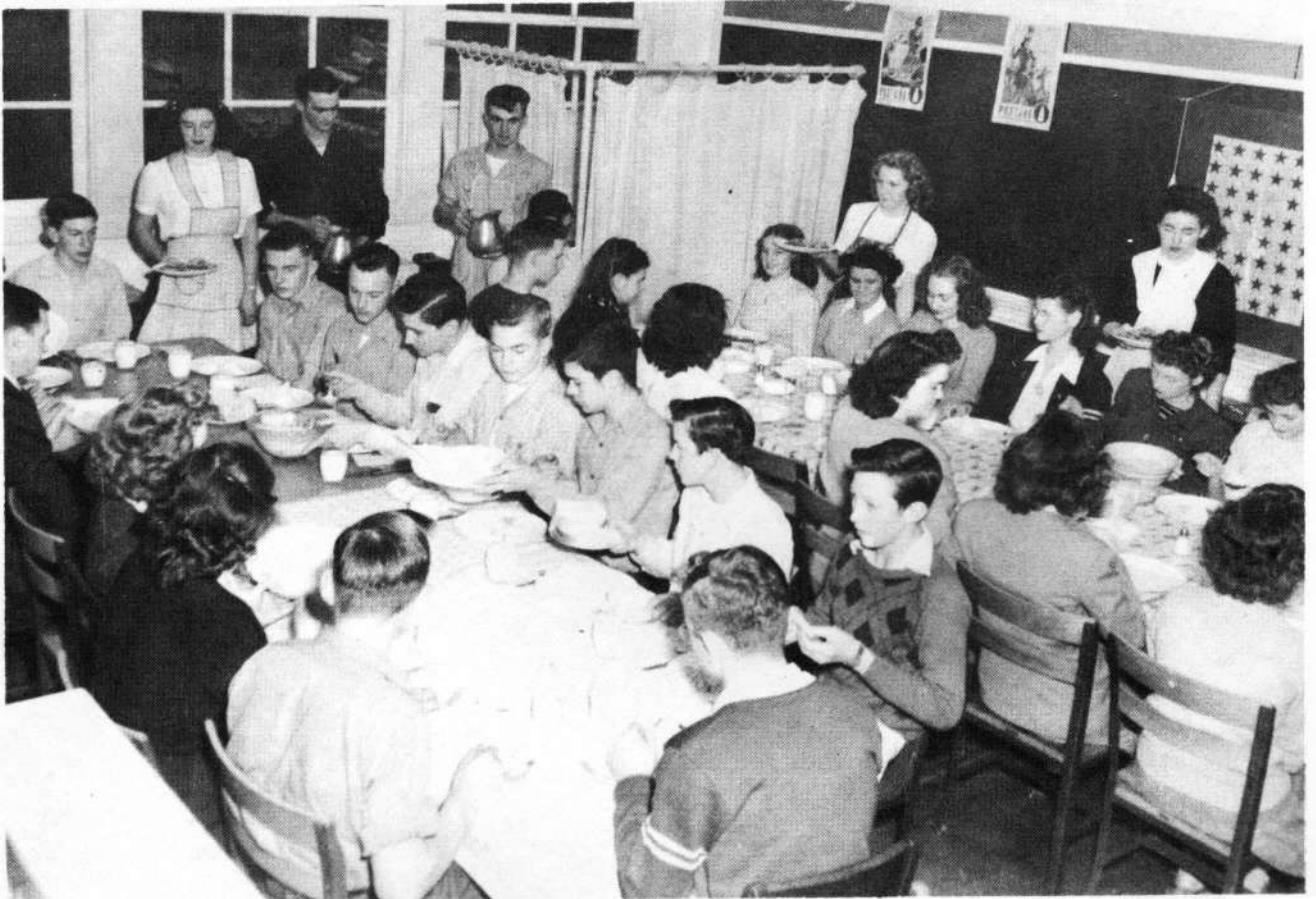

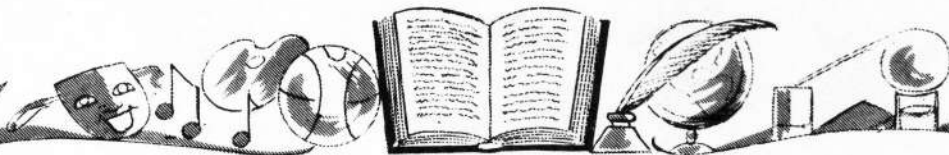

At the climax of the initiation there was an egg rolling contest at which the winner had to clean up all broken eggs that were broken during the race.

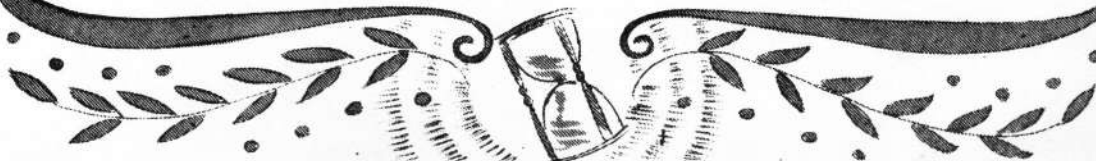
After the initiation the student body had a dance at which everyone enjoyed themselves thoroughly. Later refreshments were served to all who attended.

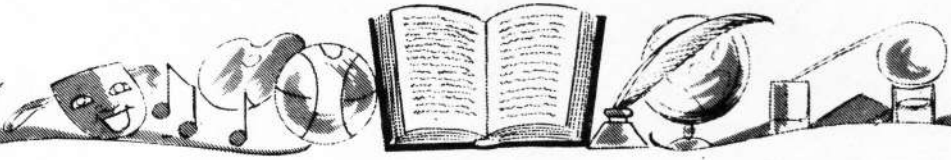
DANCES.

FRESHMAN RETURN

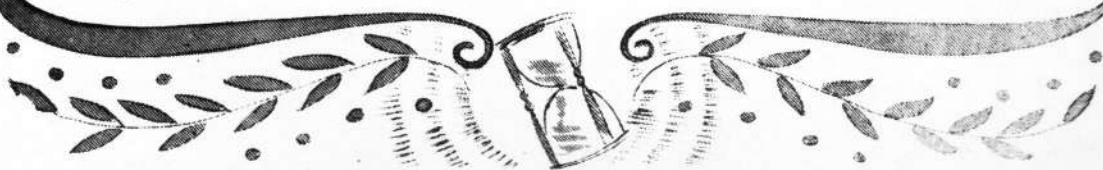


VOLLEYBALL TEAM DINNER

The play contest was held at Ophir on May 2, 1947, with all five schools in the county participating.


CLASH DAY

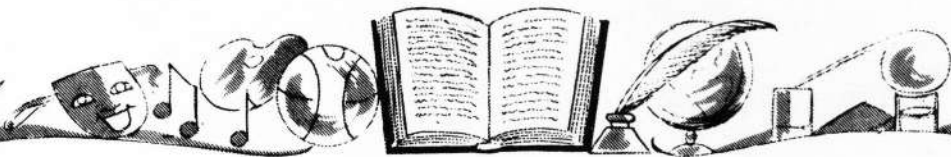
