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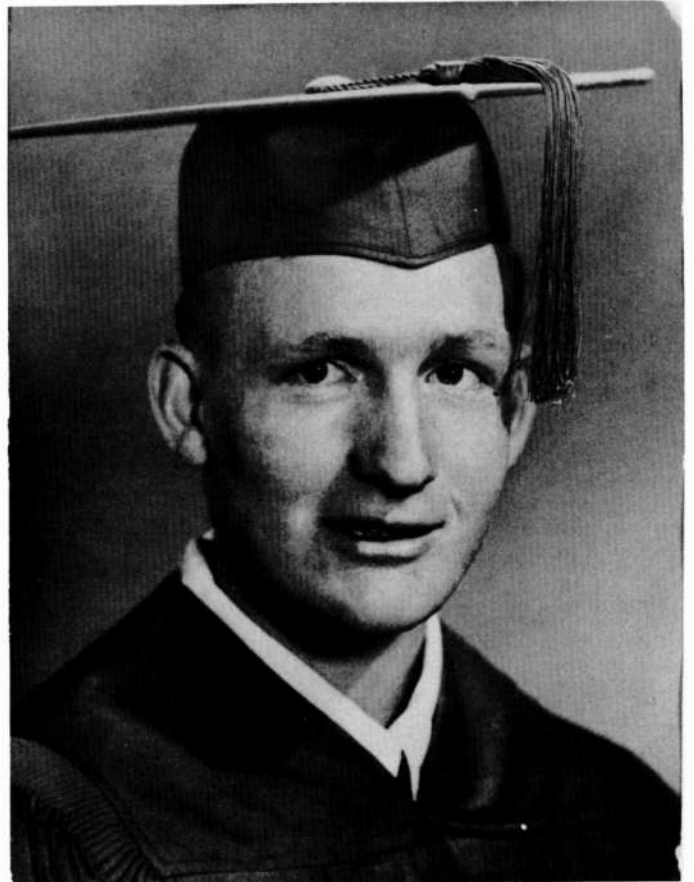
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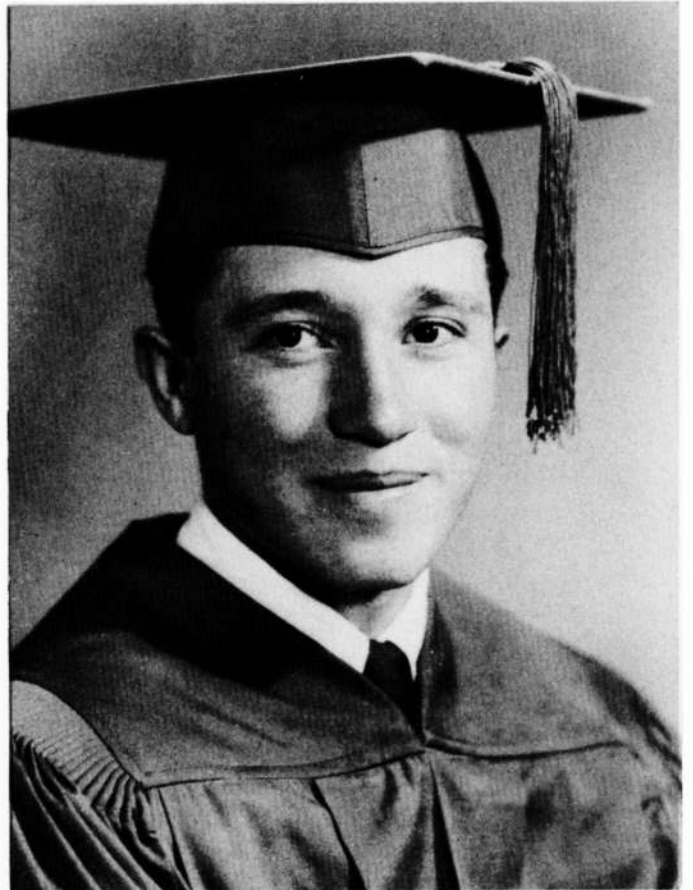
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SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

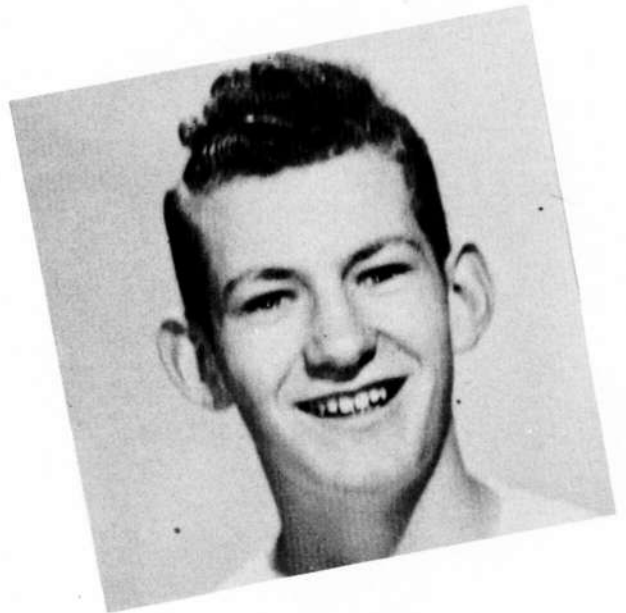

Mary Ellen Mermilliod, Greymarie DeHaven, and Nelda Bierman, the three girls, belong to the volleyball team.

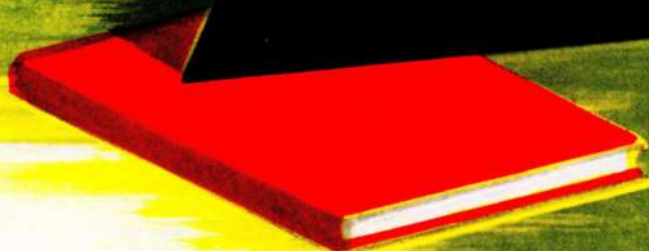

Clyde Quigley is manager of the boys basketball team. One of the senior boys who is a four year letterman stated: "Quigg is the best manager we have had in my four years here."

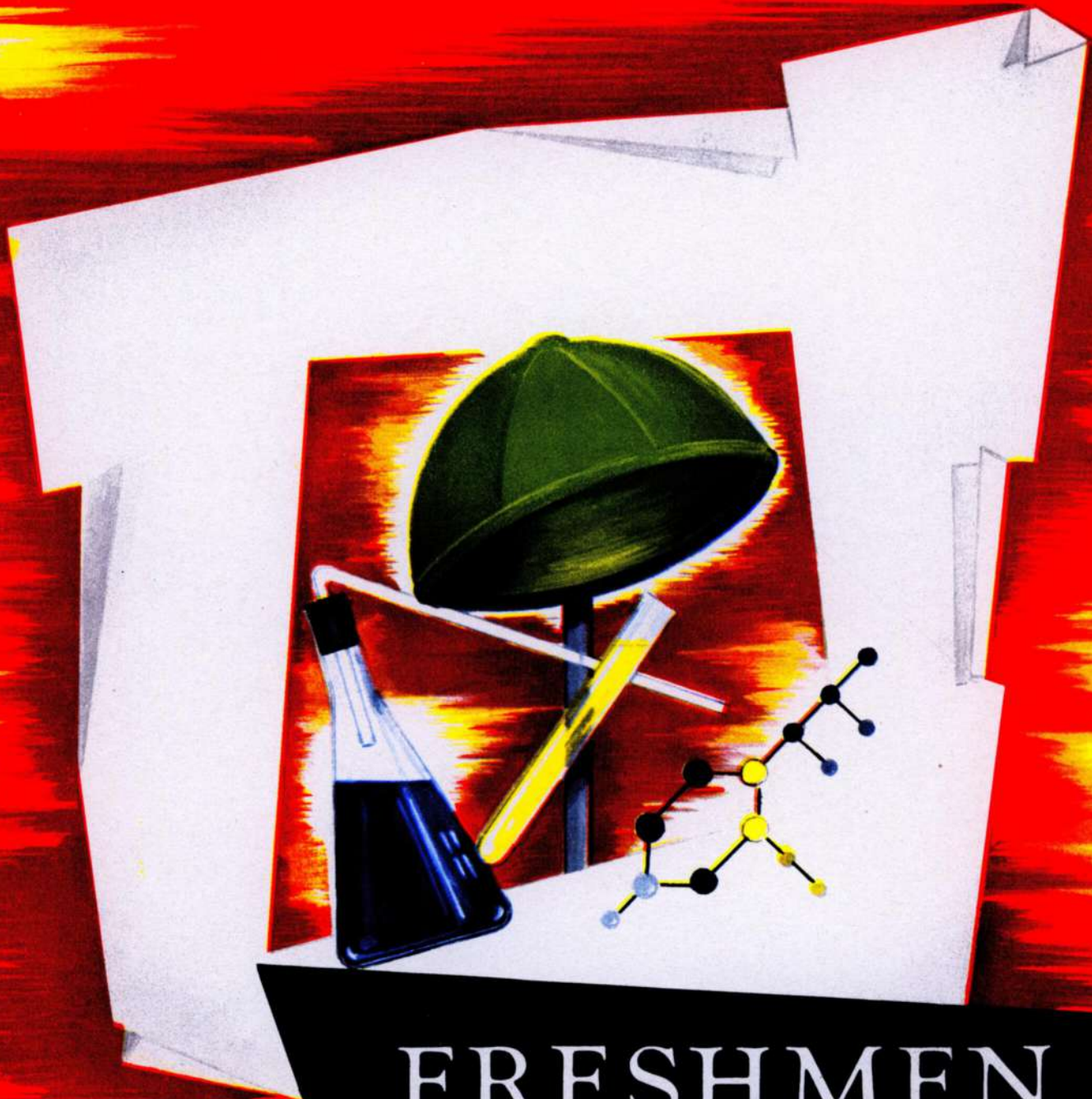

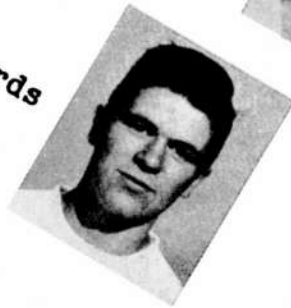

Their activities have consisted of playing at the Basketball games with the Port Orford Band; Playing at the Christmas Play, and playing at Tanglewood on the Christmas Program.

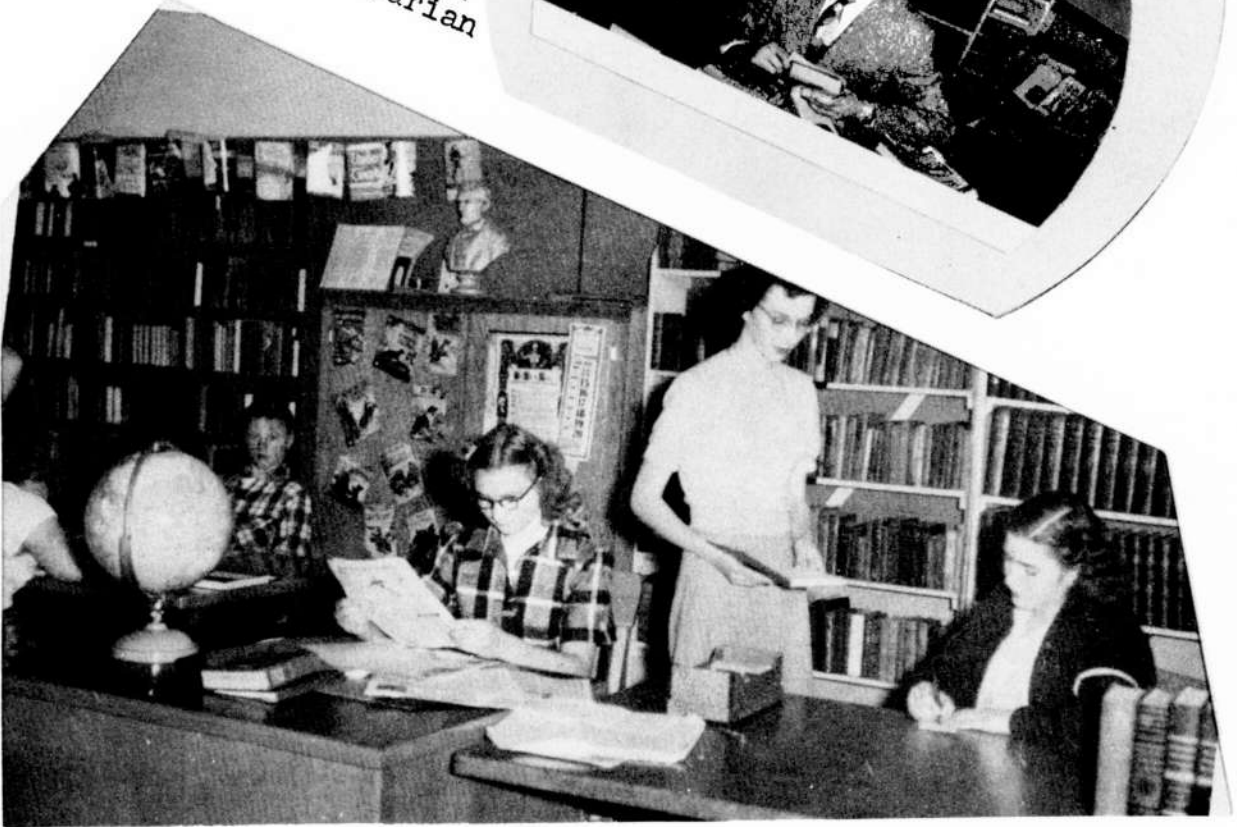

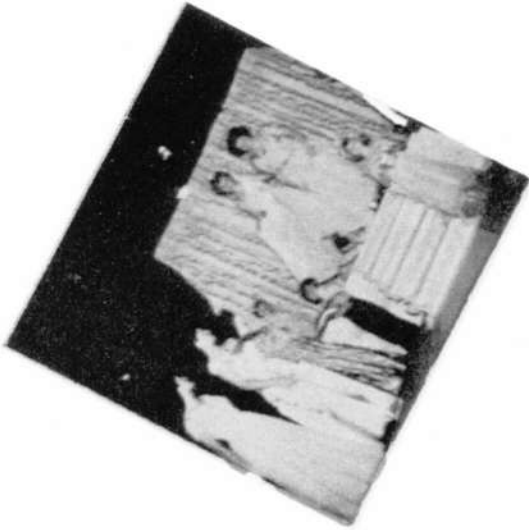

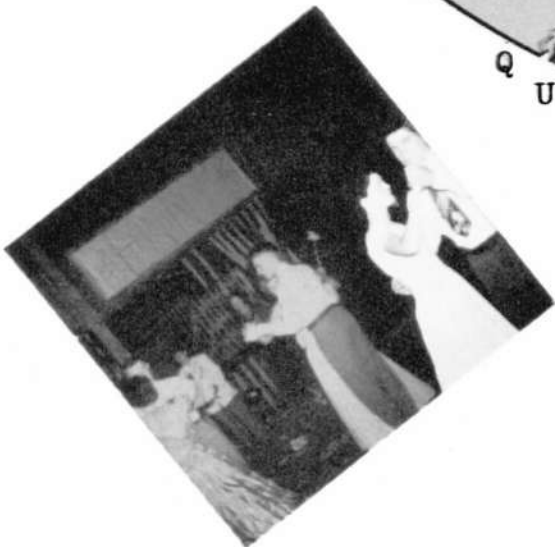


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CARNIVAL

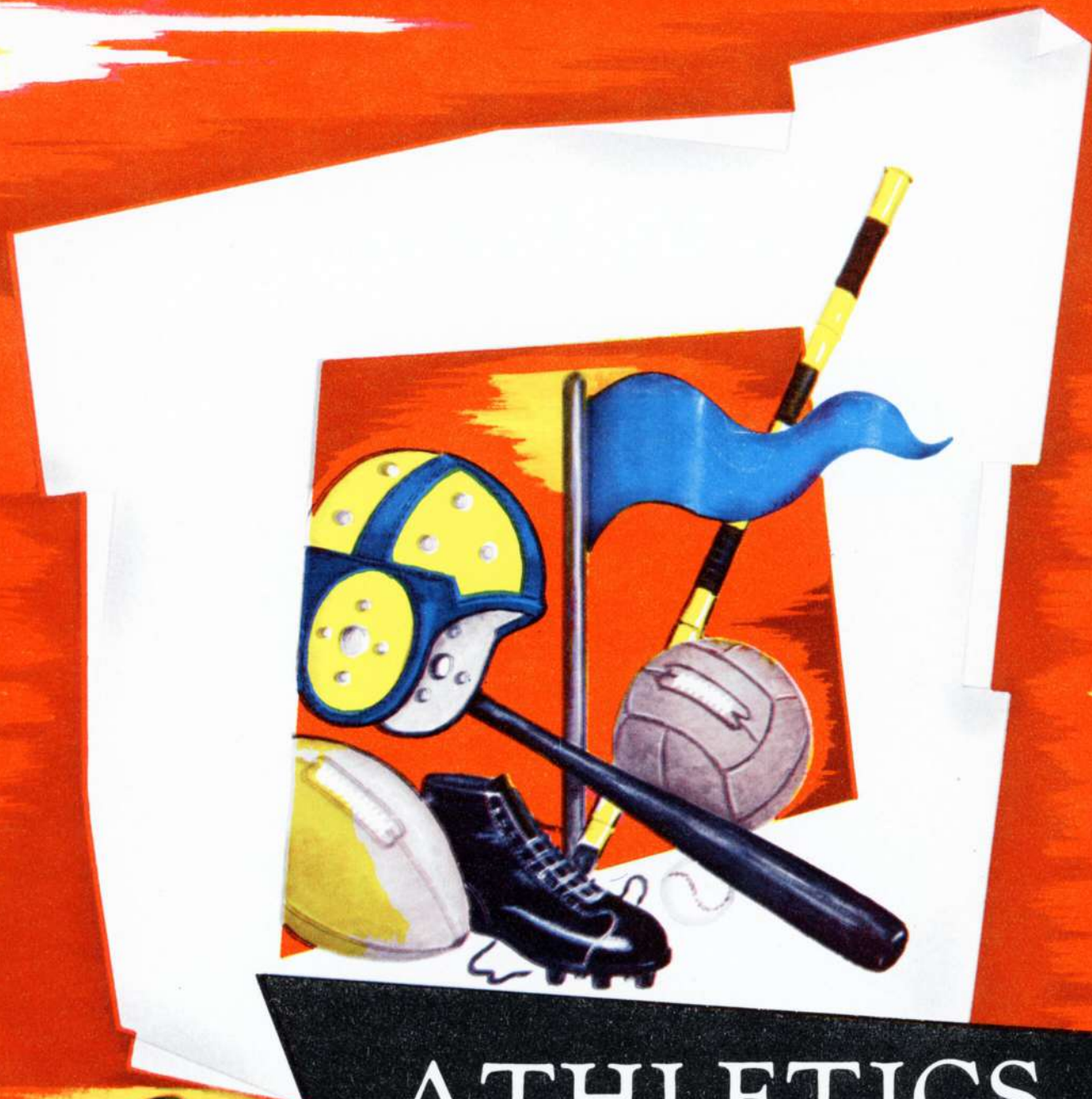
This concluding play was very inspiring for next year's talent; we hope they will be as successful as we have been this year.

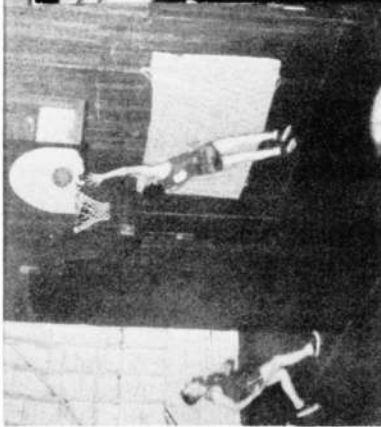

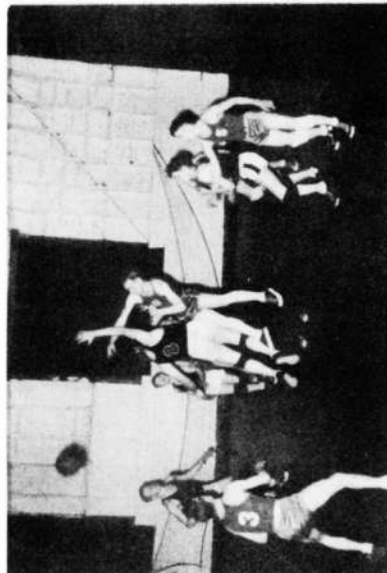
