Two of the girls, Patty and Shirley, play instruments in the band.

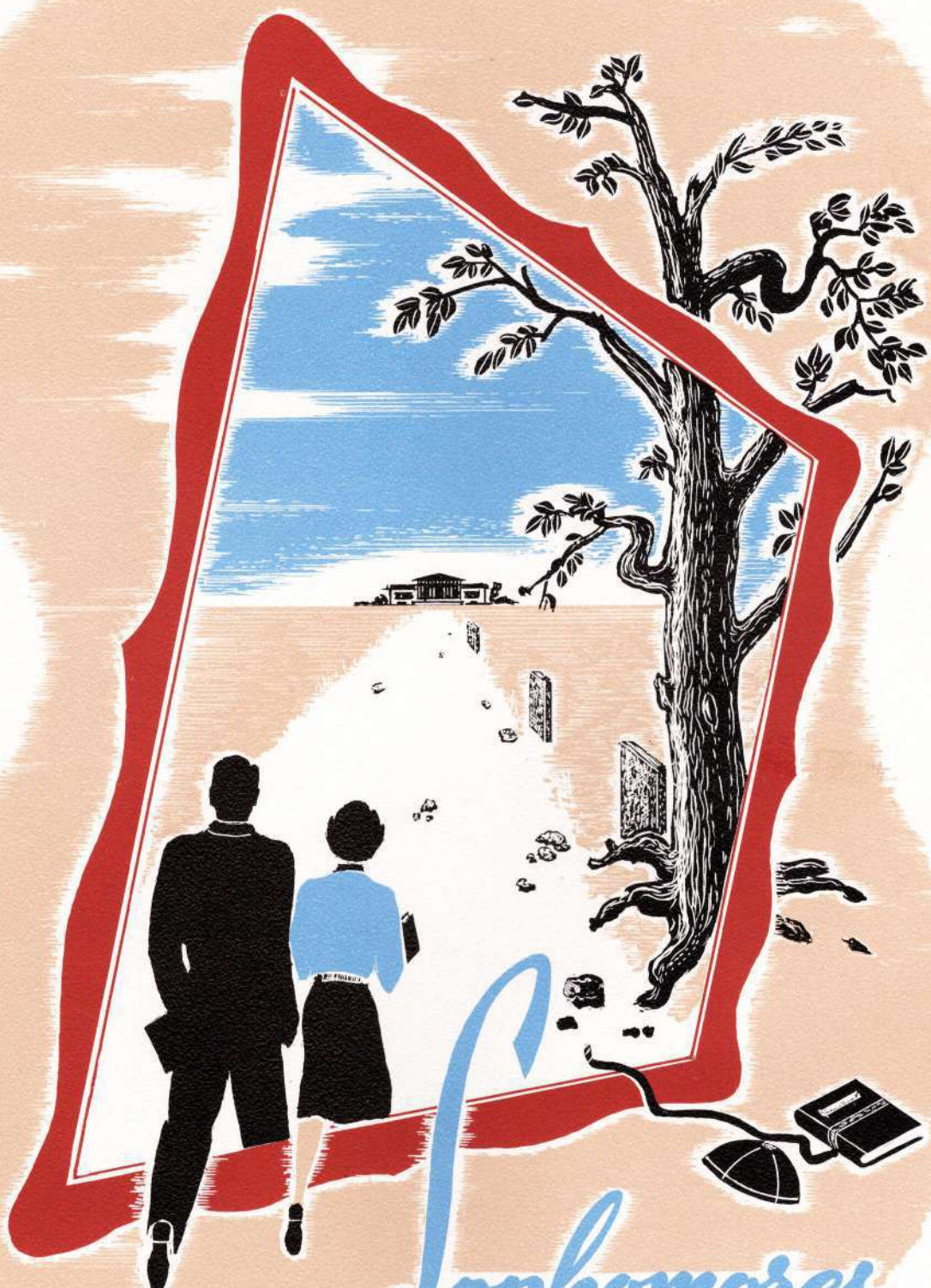
Since several of the students of the junior class enjoy dramatics, they have been taking part in student body plays.

### SOPHOMORE NEWS

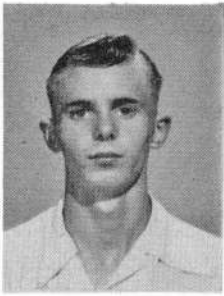

Some were purchased in music stores, some in second hand stores, and some from private parties in Gold Beach, Port Orford, Coquille, Coos Bay, Salem, Eugene, and Portland. Our bass drum and upright bass horn was originally property of the Port Orford Town Band in 1915.

It has been my privilege and pleasure to direct the band for the past three years, and I think the band members will all agree that we have had some really good times playing for the basket ball games, school programs, band concerts, county fairs, Lily Festival, and going Christmas caroling.

For our band concerts and county fair dates, we combine our band with the Port Orford High School Band to make a total of seventy-five pieces.

We have been very fortunate through the cooperation of the community and the school board in the past two years in obtaining three new bell-front Conn horns, and one new Conn Sousaphone. However, we are still very much in need of some of the basic instruments, and we sincerely hope that the community and the school board will continue their assistance until our instrumentation is complete.
