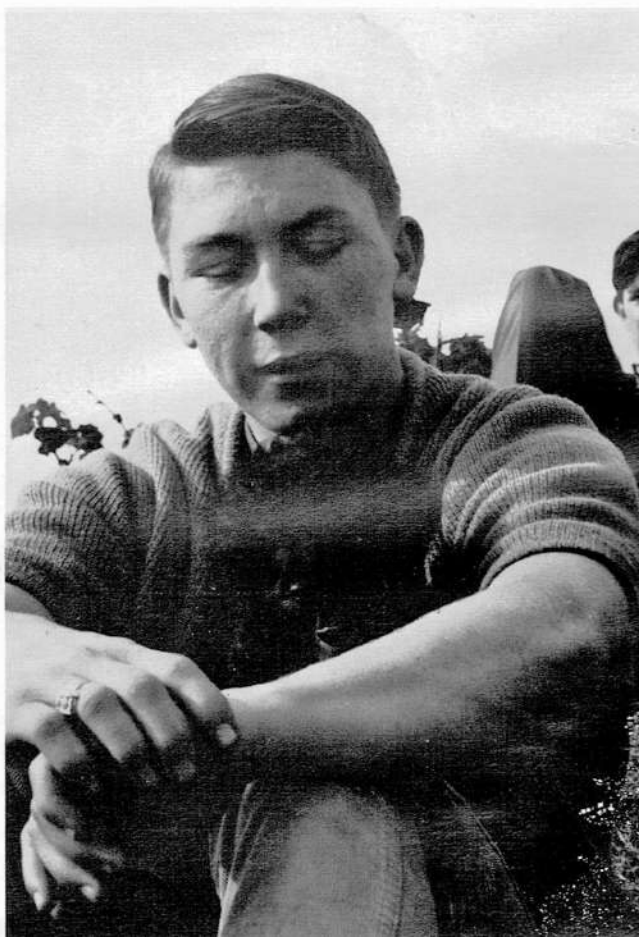

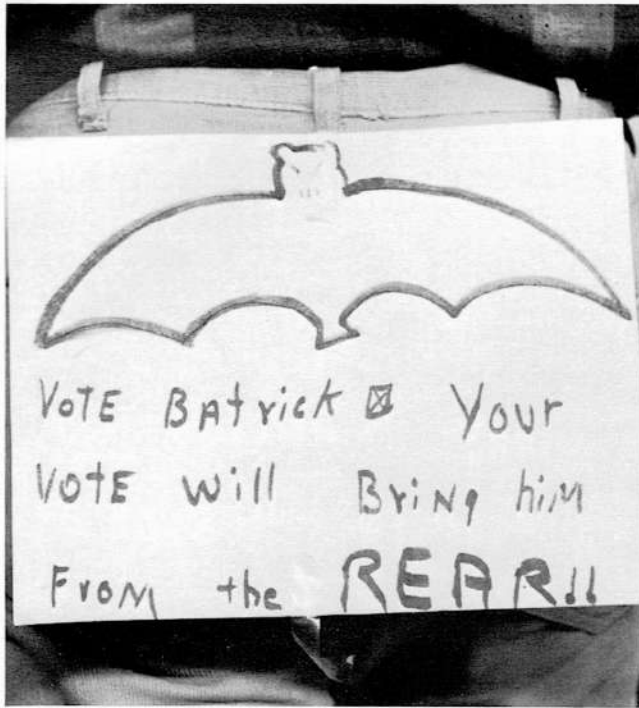

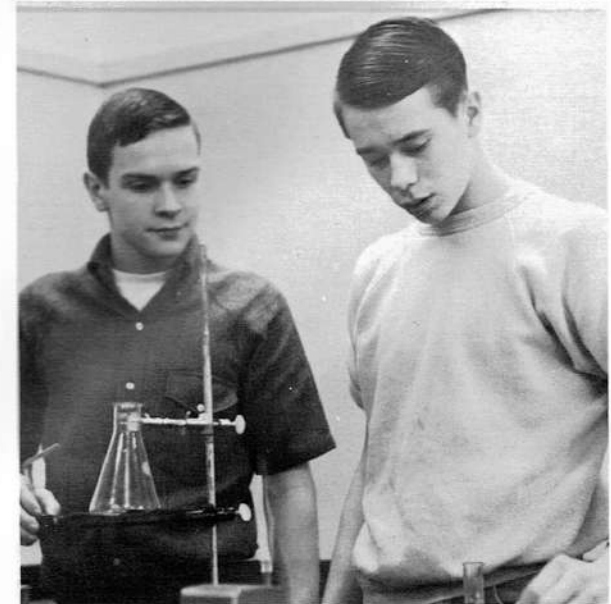

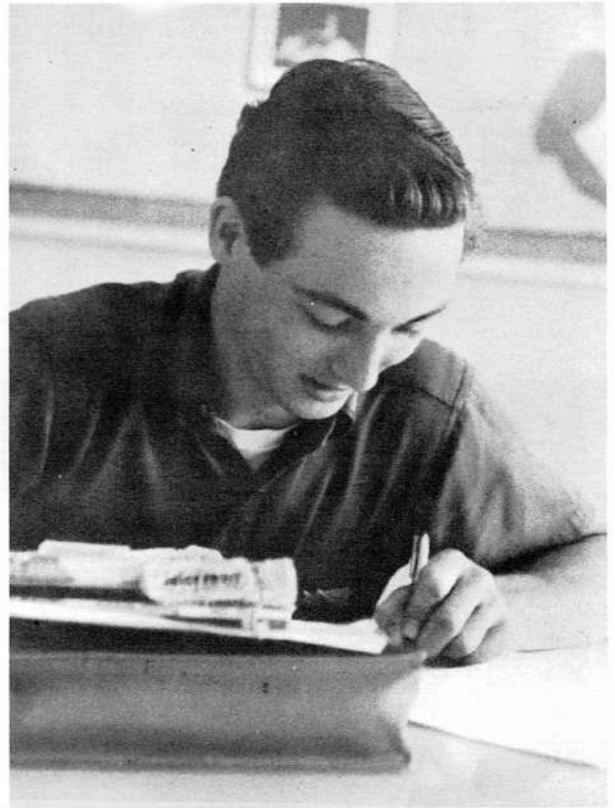

OREGON STATE LAW requires that all school districts have a board to control the schools in the district and to erect buildings and otherwise maintain the schools. The board, elected by the people of the district, consists of six members, who serve five year terms, plus the District Superintendent and District Clerk. Members must be residents of the district. If a vacancy occurs on the board, it is filled by majority vote of the members until the next election. According to Mr. Louis Knapp, chairman, the board is responsible for employing teachers, furnishing buses for transportation of the students to and from school, and making rules and regulations not covered by law for successful operation of the schools in the district.

Mr. Knapp stated that the chairman's duties are to preside at meetings and to sign official papers and contracts on resolutions by the board.

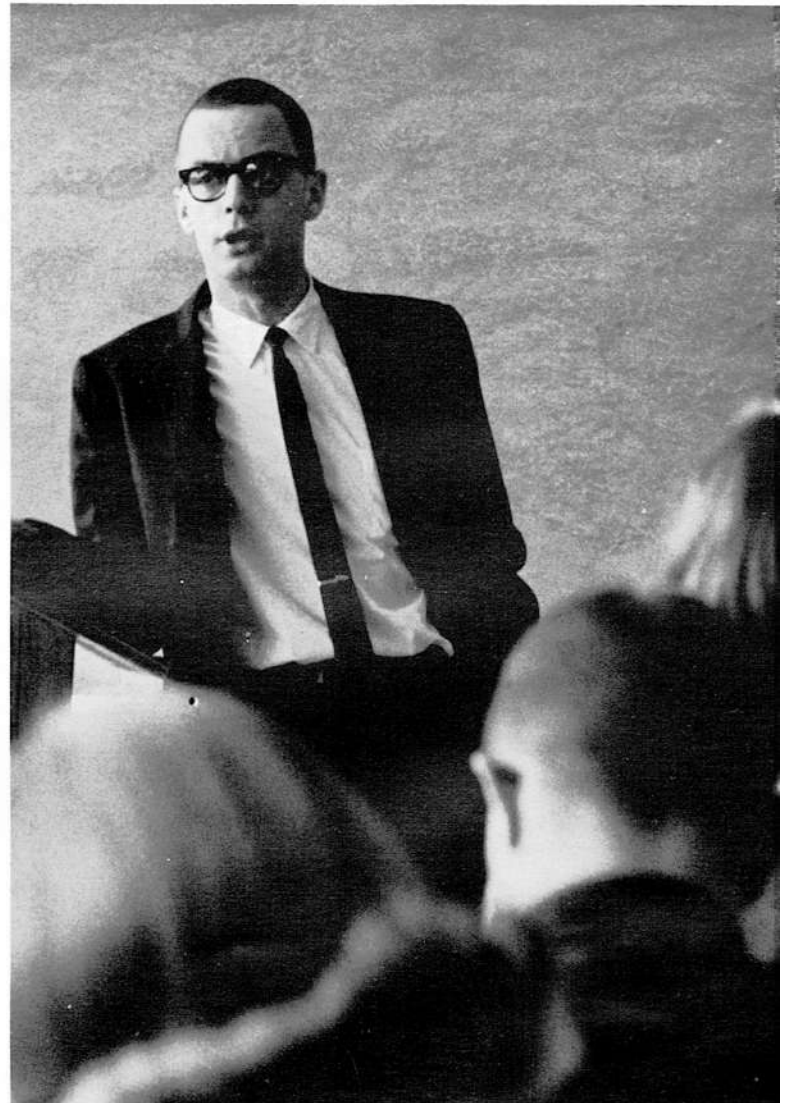

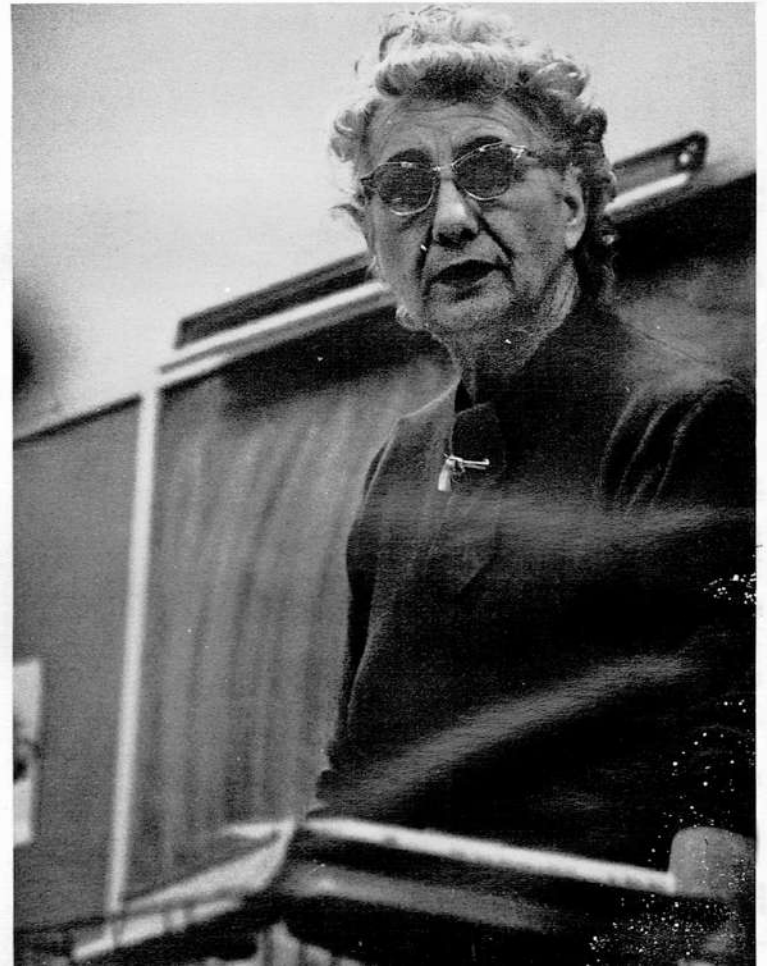
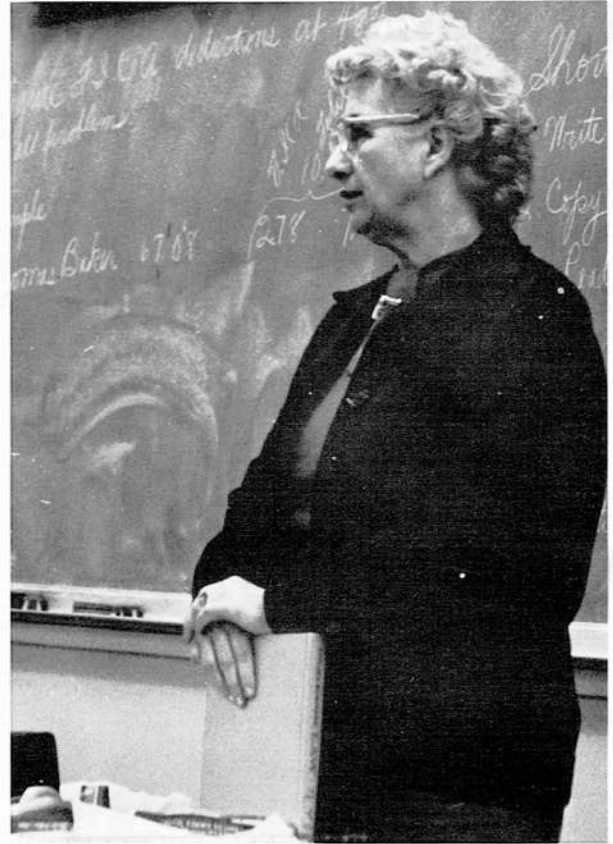
We Honor—Mrs. Florence McNeese

Mrs. McNeese's only son, his wife, and two children live in Chicago. He has just accepted a residency in dermatology at Cook County Hospital in Chicago.

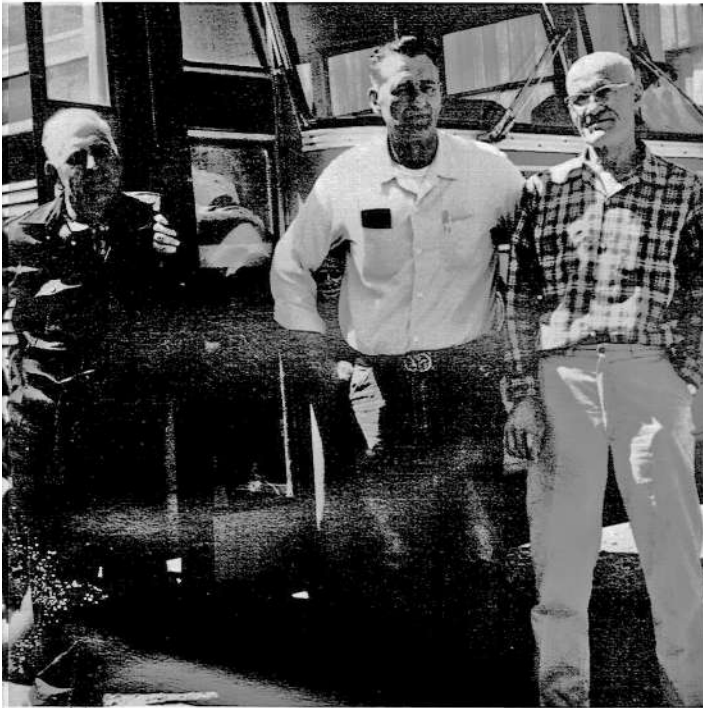

The Junior Class sponsored the Junior-Senior Banquet and Prom which was anticipated with much excitement. These events were among the highlights of the year.

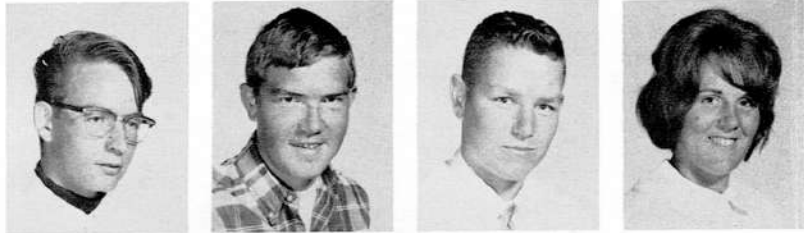

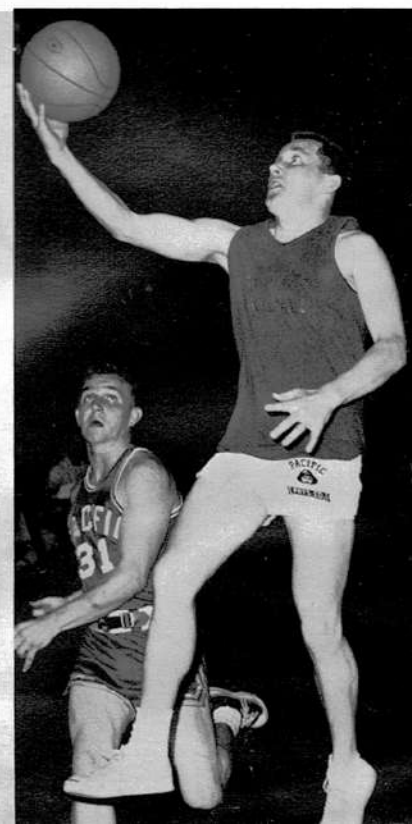
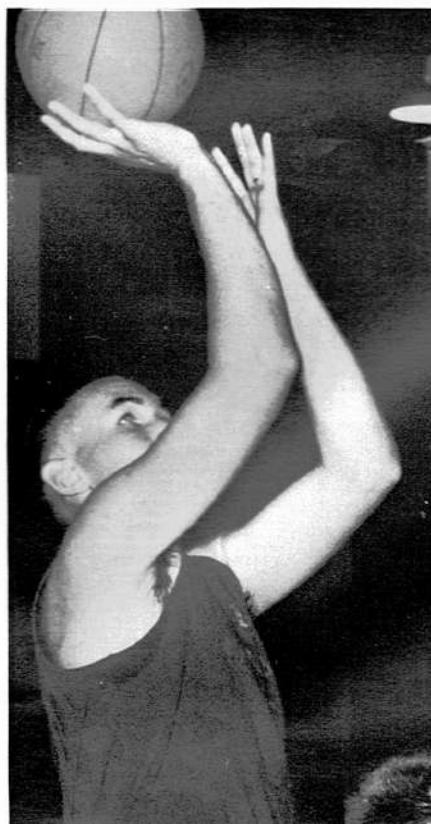
Faculty - Varsity Basketball

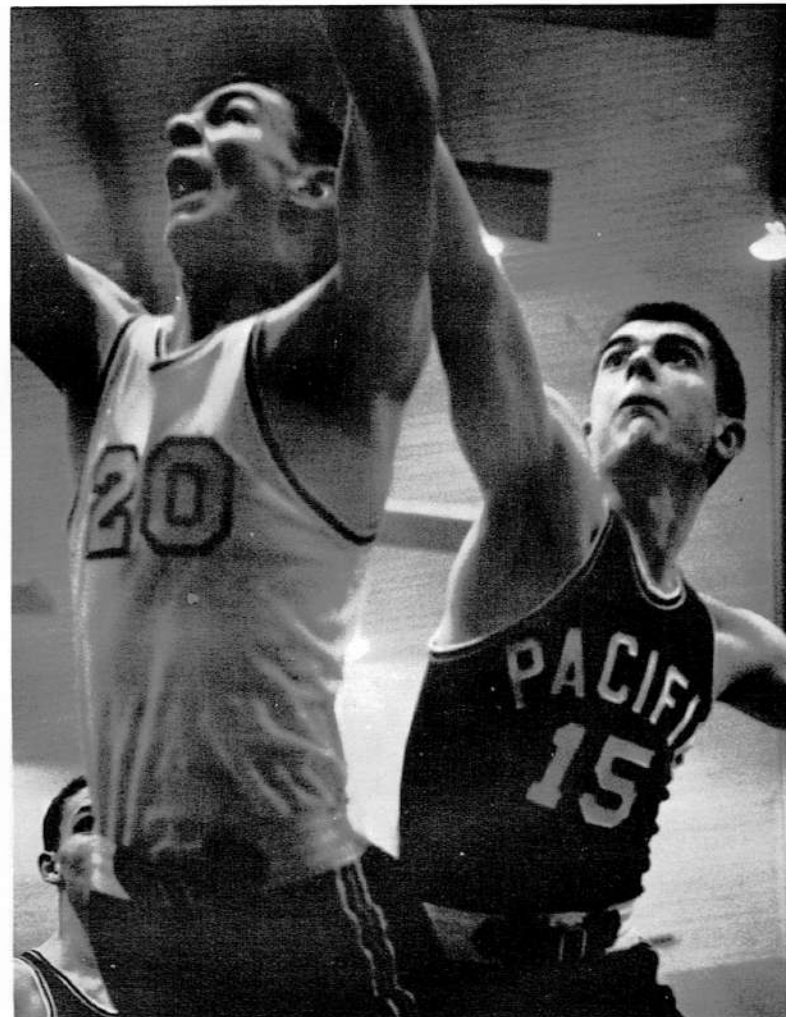

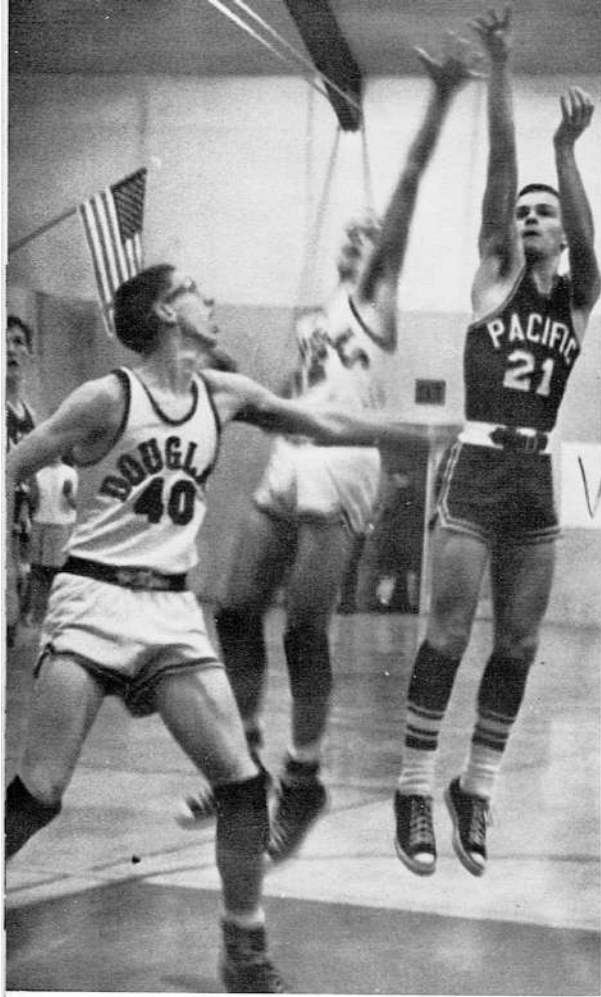

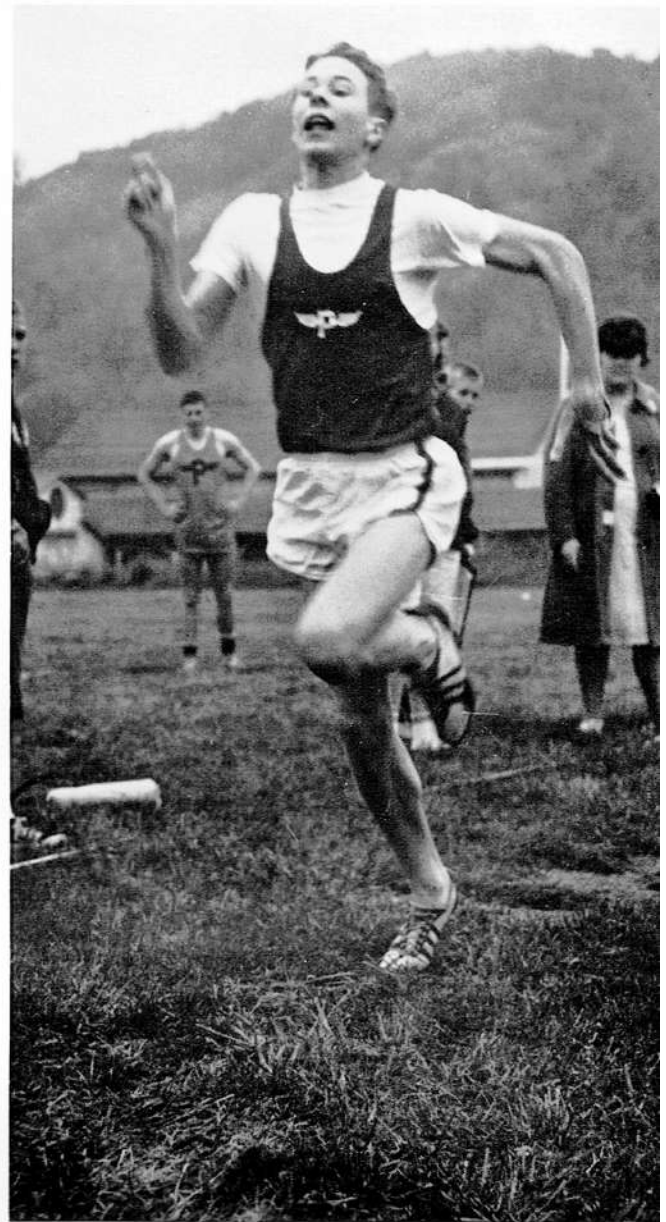

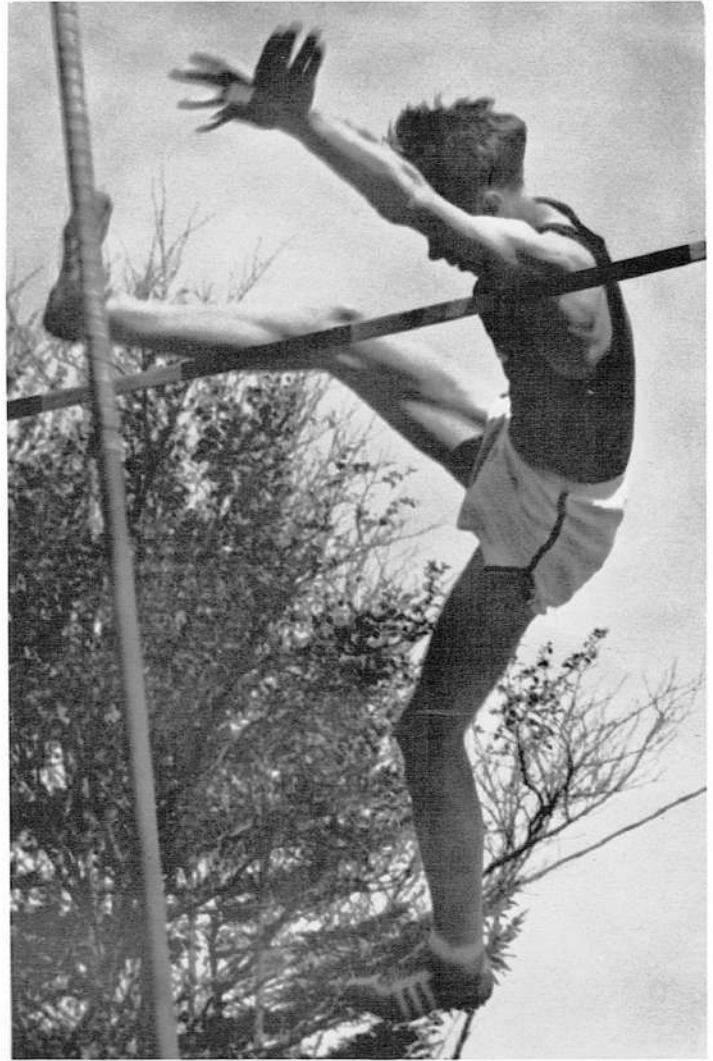

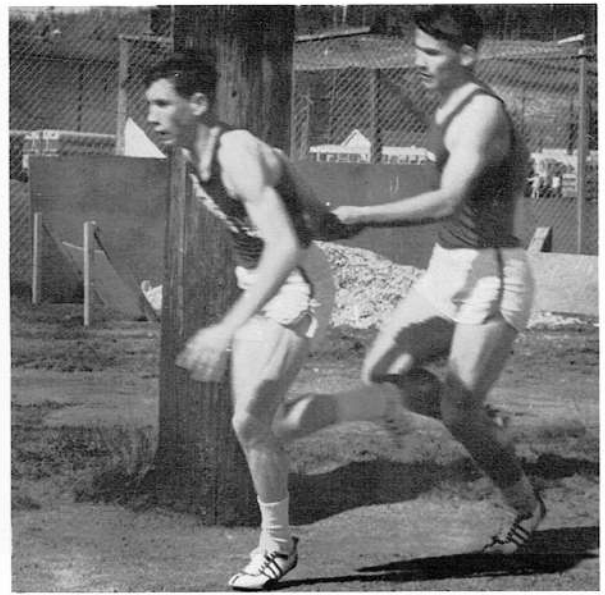
