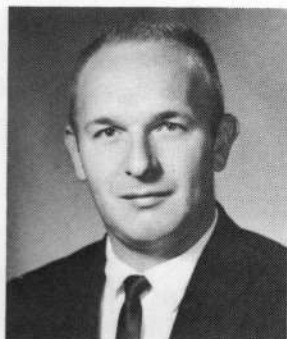

During their final year at PHS, the senior class spent most of their time earning money and planning for "Graduation Day."

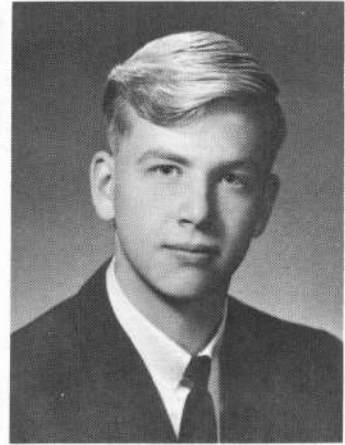
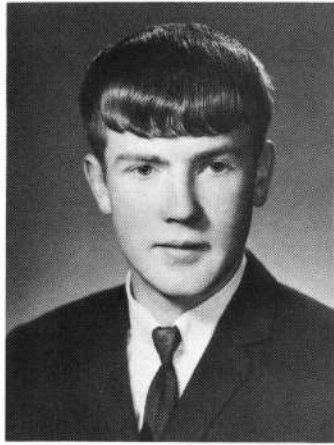

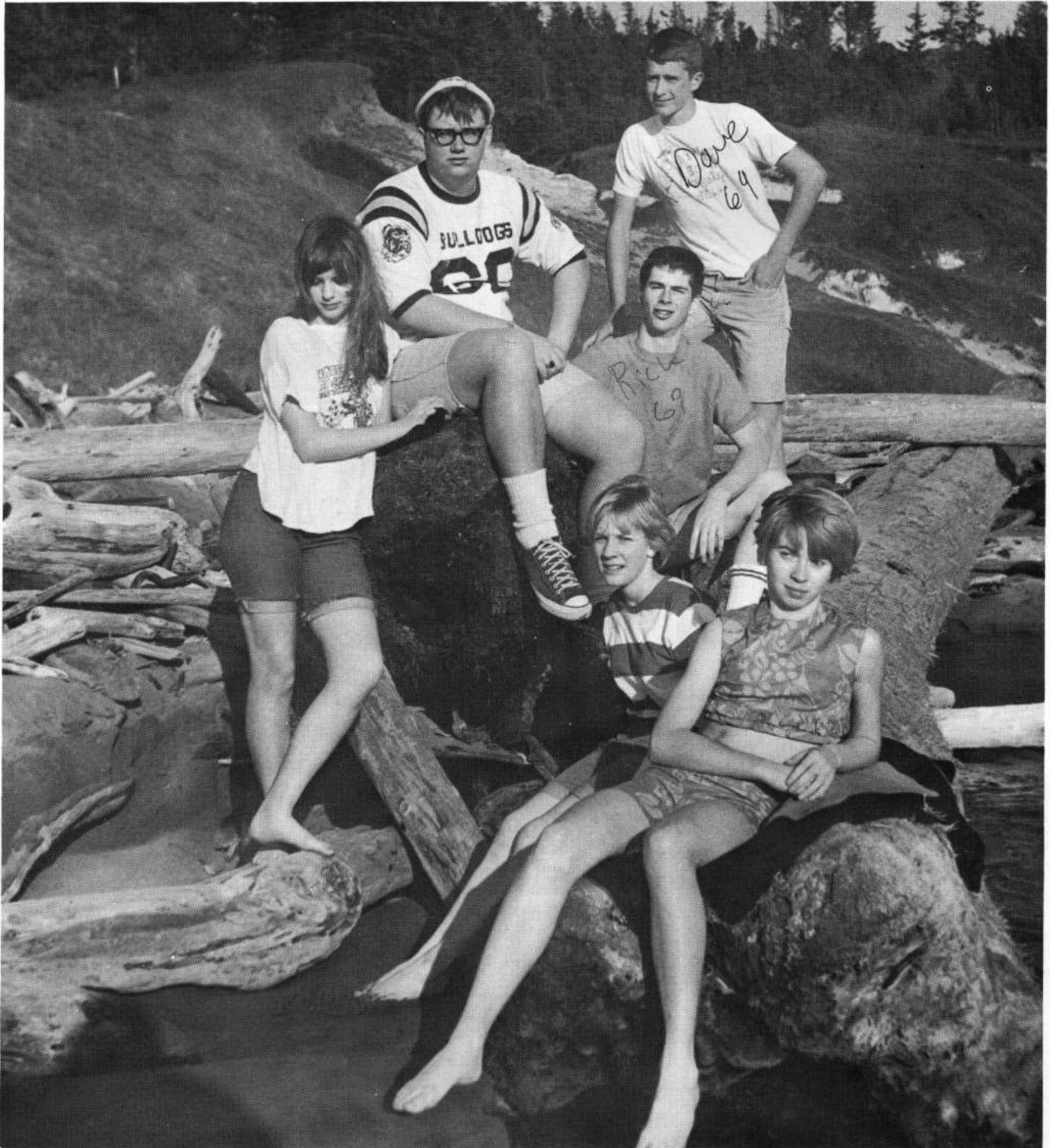

The GO-GO class of '69, known to the rest of the student body as the sophomore class, had a rather inactive year. They sponsored a soc-hop after the football game with Toledo.

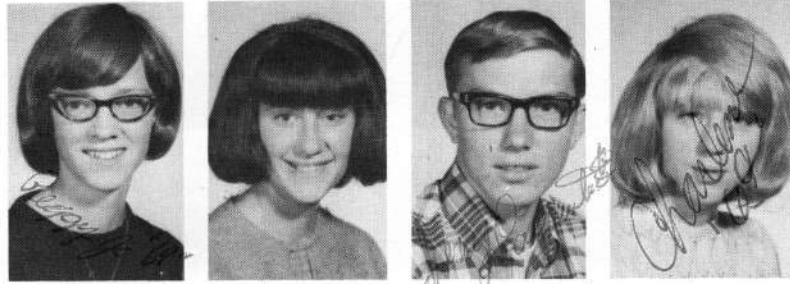
They were well-represented in sports. They had four boys on the varsity football

team. They had three boys wrestling with the varsity, with one going to state. At the time of this writing, the regular track and baseball seasons were not completed.

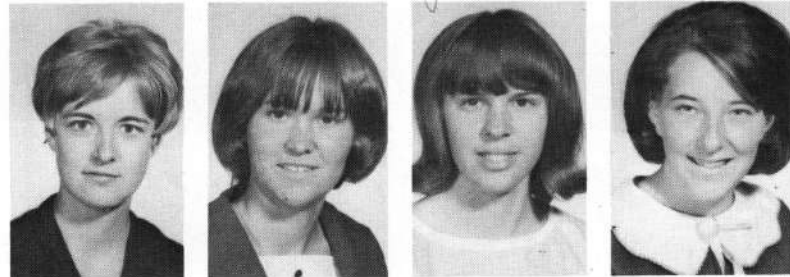

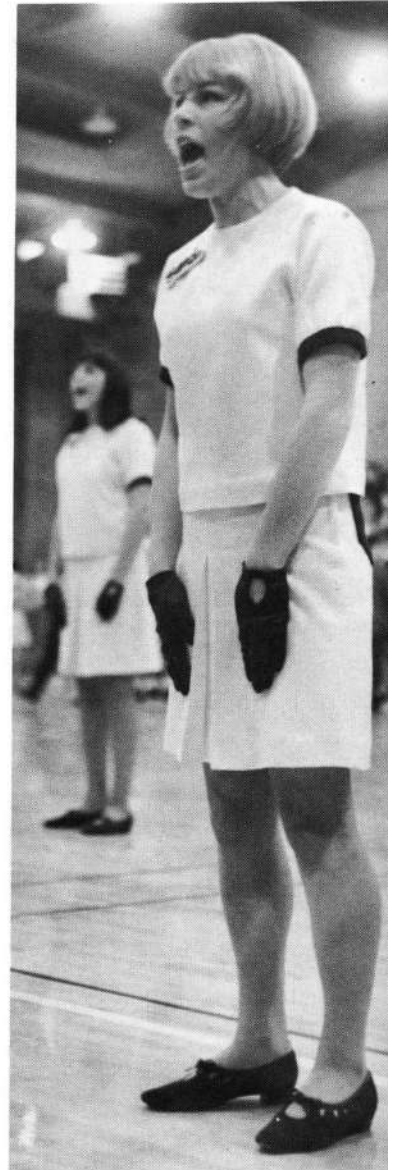
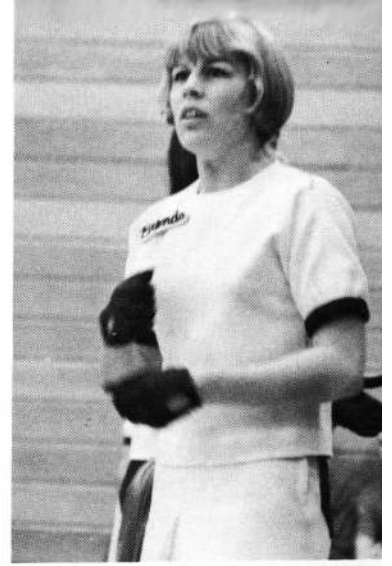


Varsity Cheerleaders

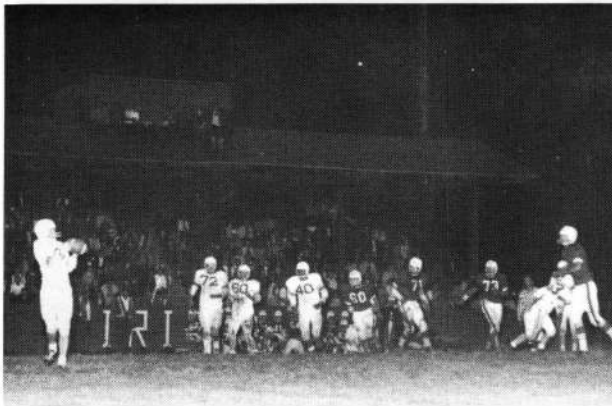

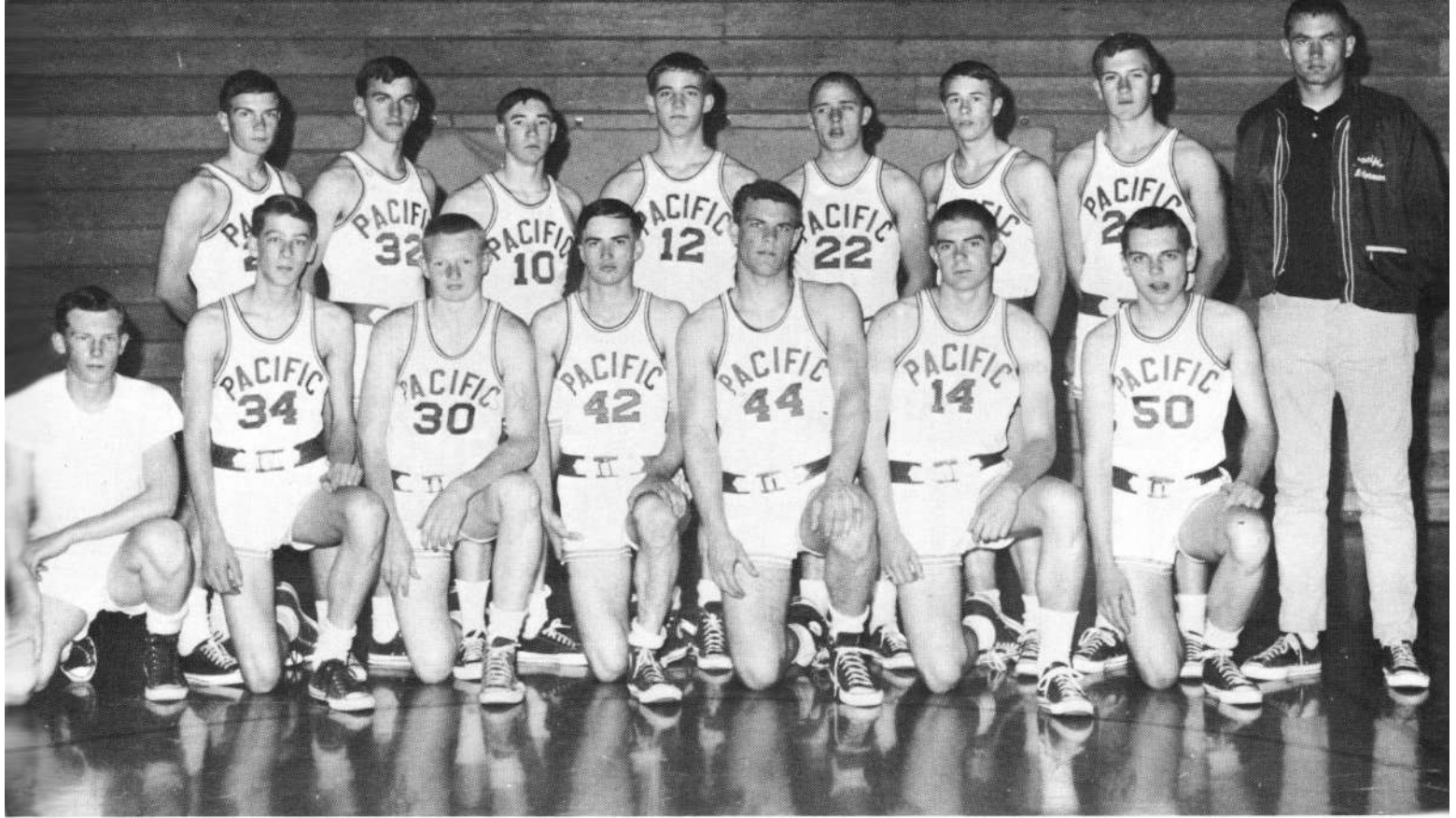

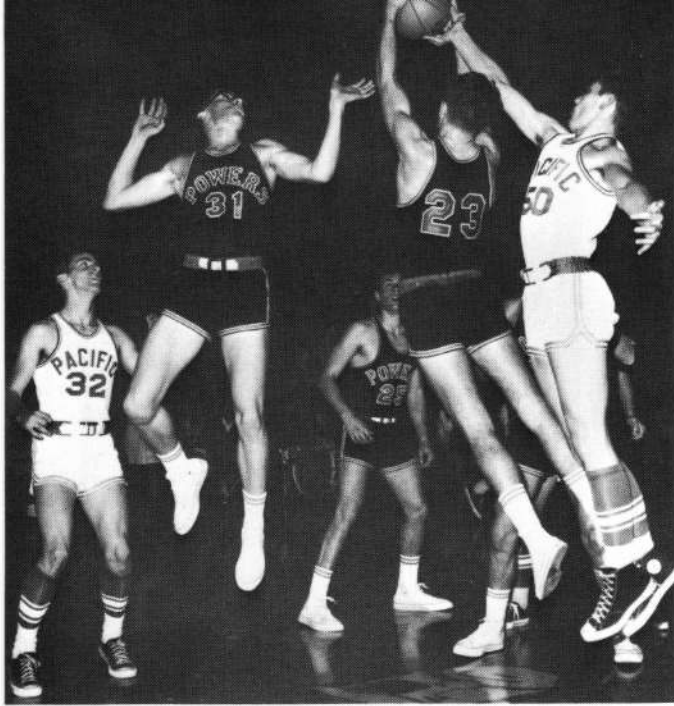
Coach Law's 1967 hoop squad was considered by many to be one of Pacific's better teams, even though it lacked height and experience.

The excitement of the season opener was quelled as the team was drubbed by a future Class B State champion Powers team.

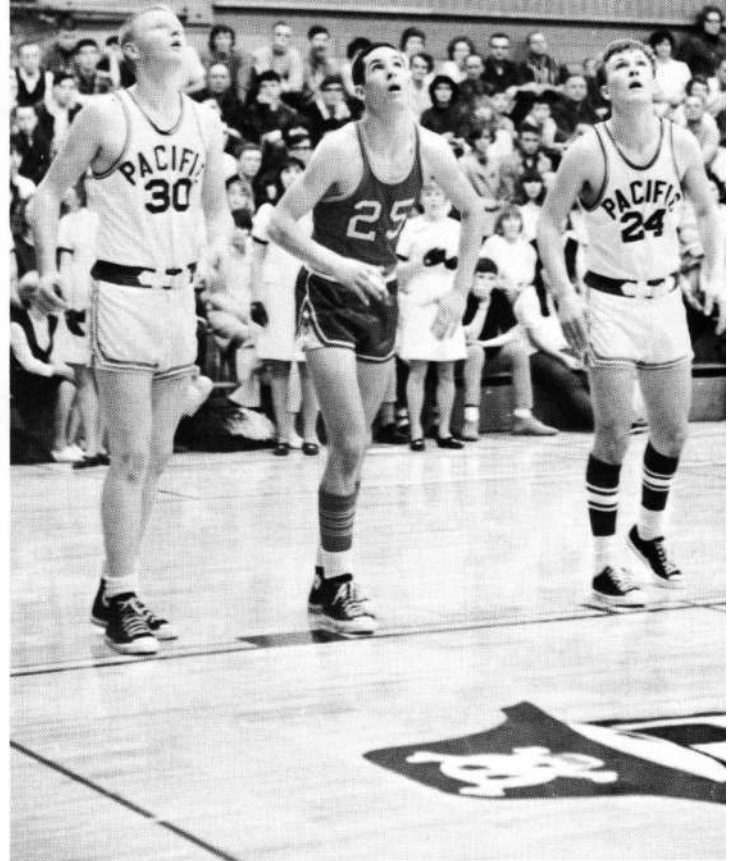
The following week the Pirate quintet evened their record by knocking off a visiting Douglas team.

The remainder of the pre-league games spelled defeat for a hard working Pirate team.

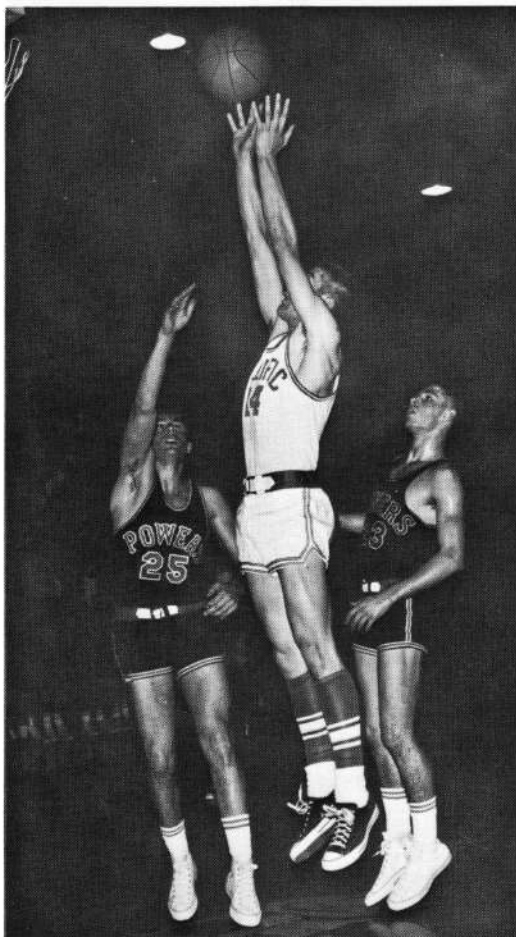

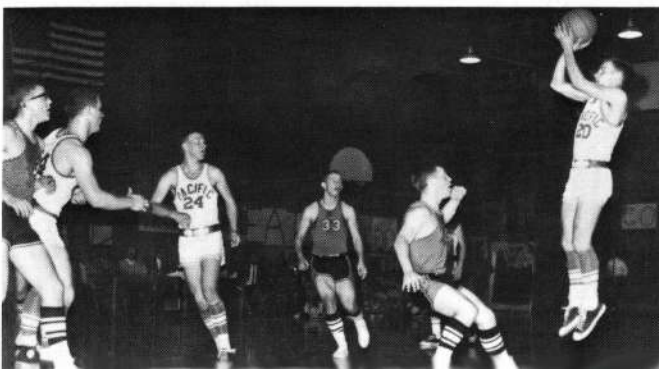

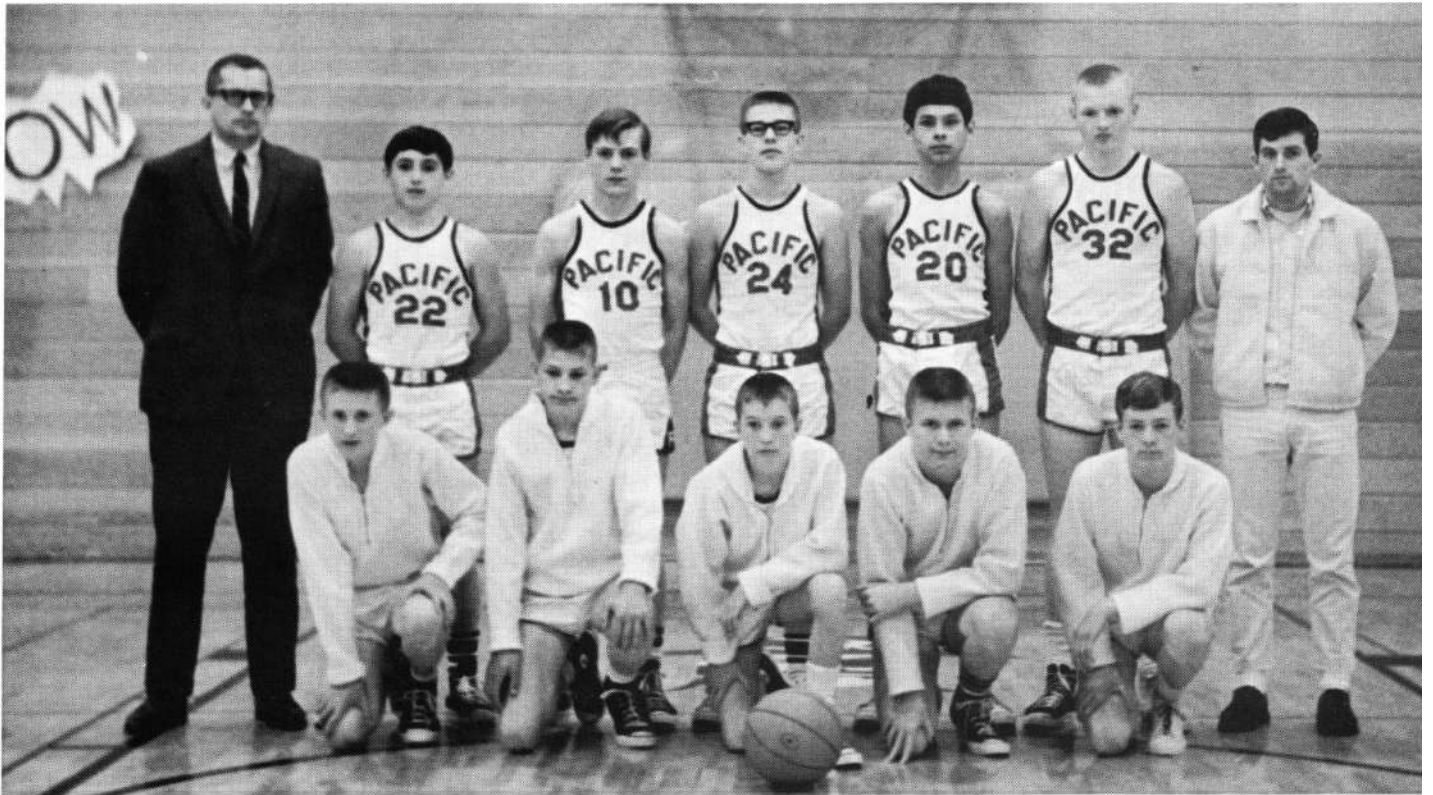

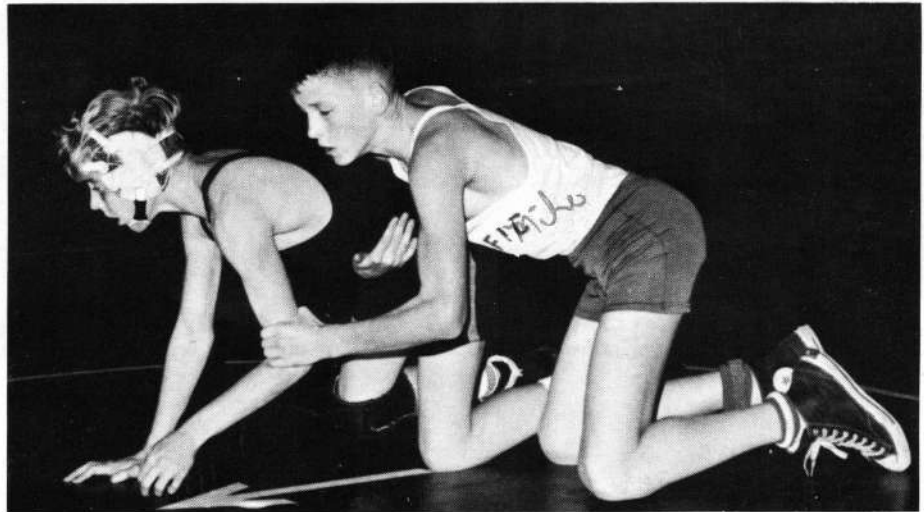

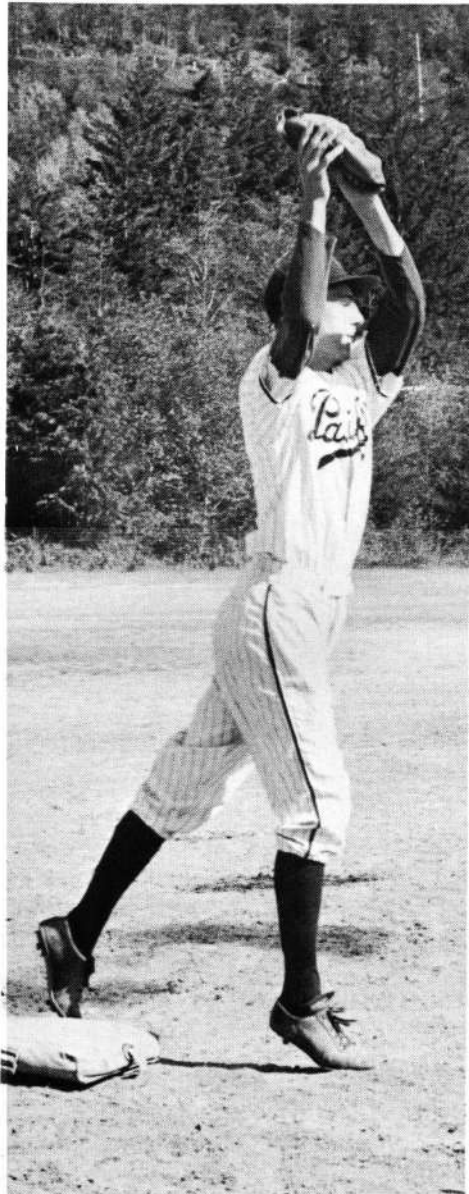

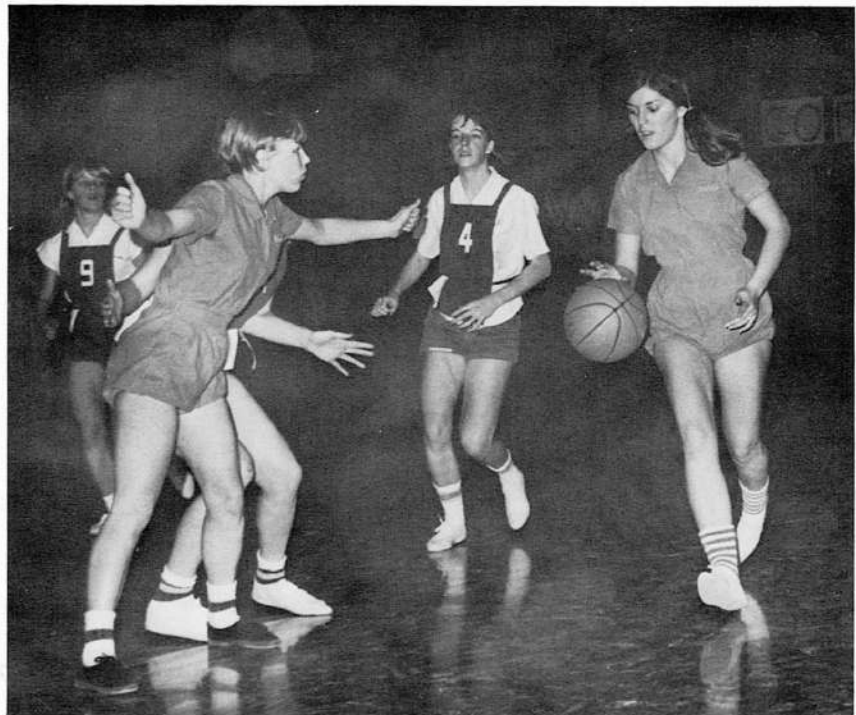

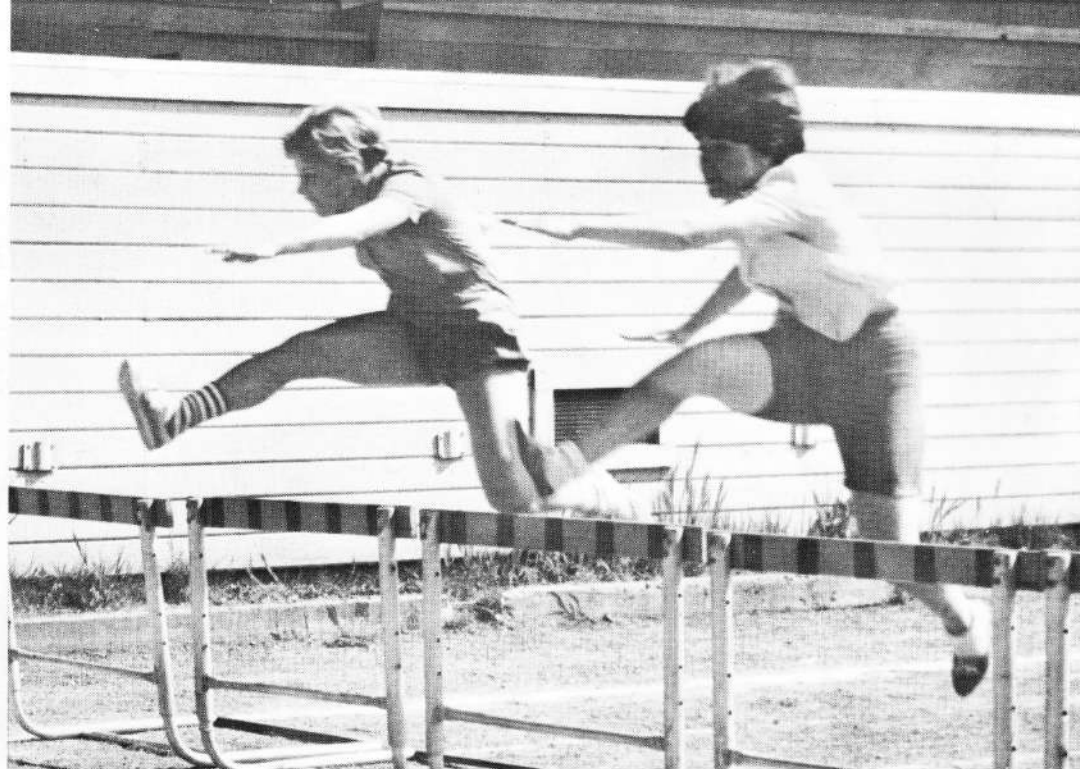

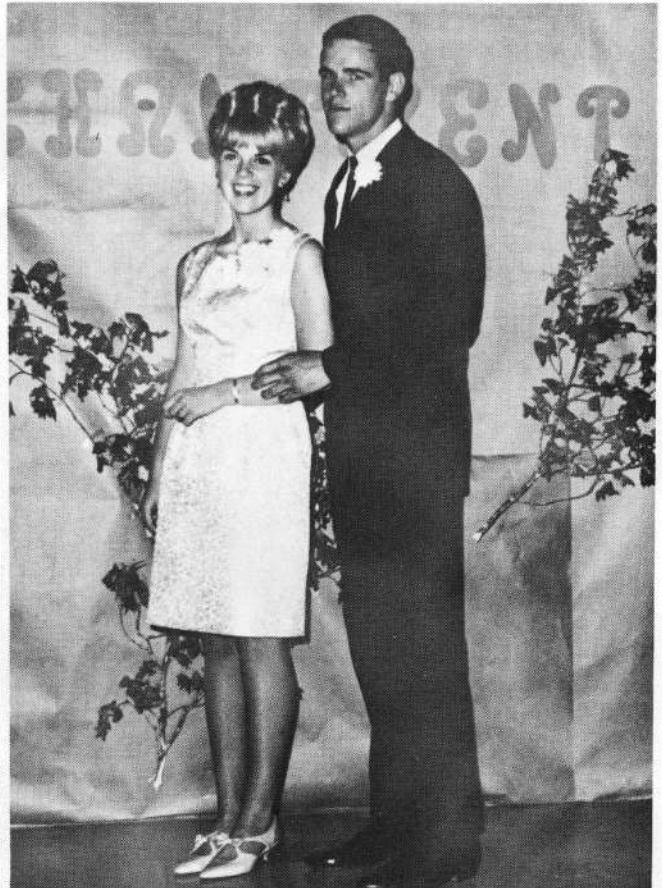

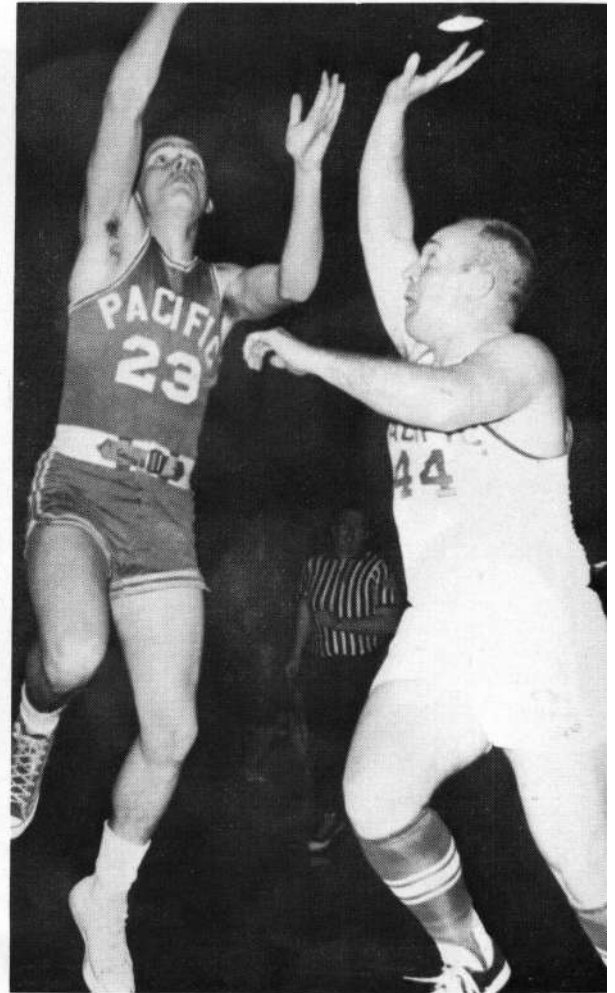

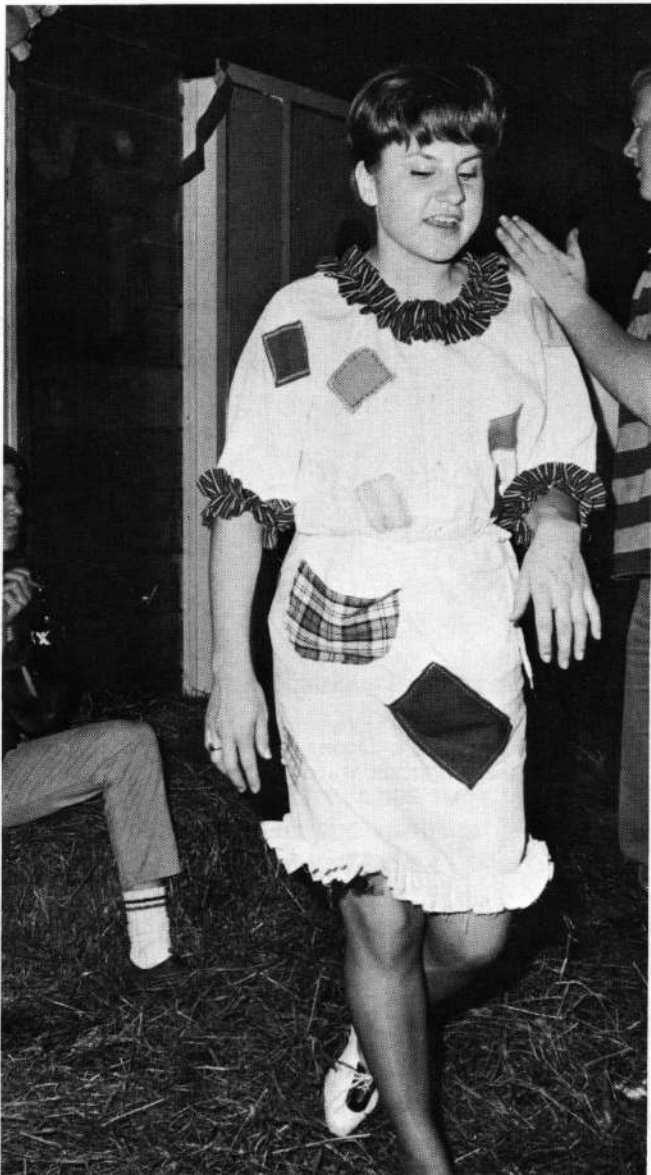

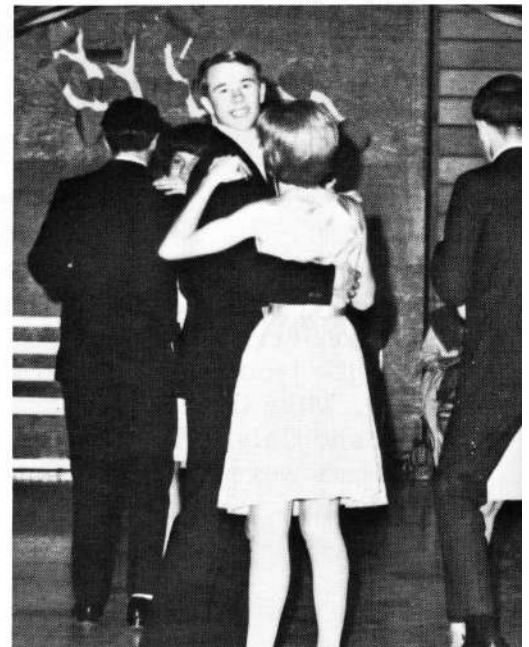

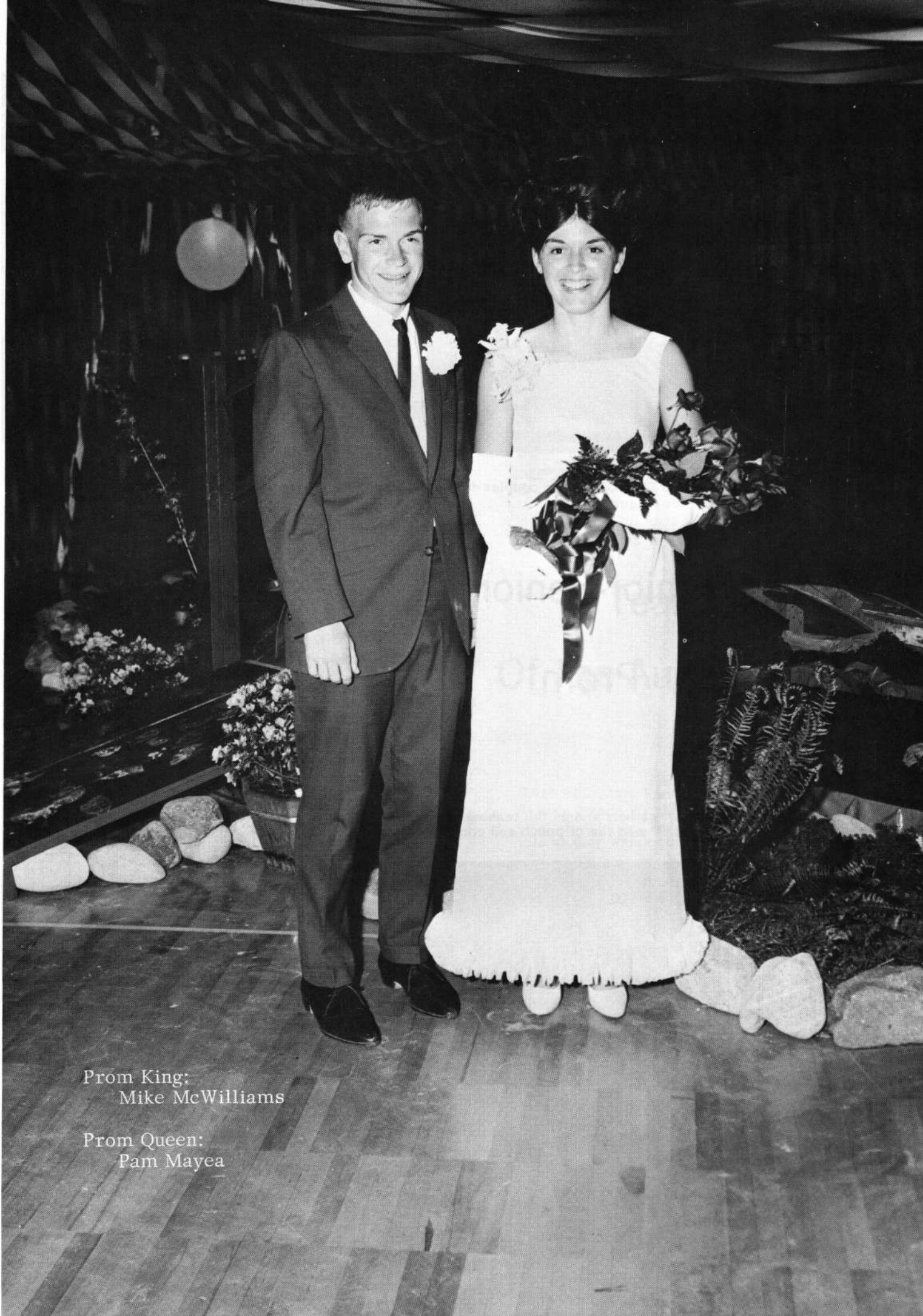
