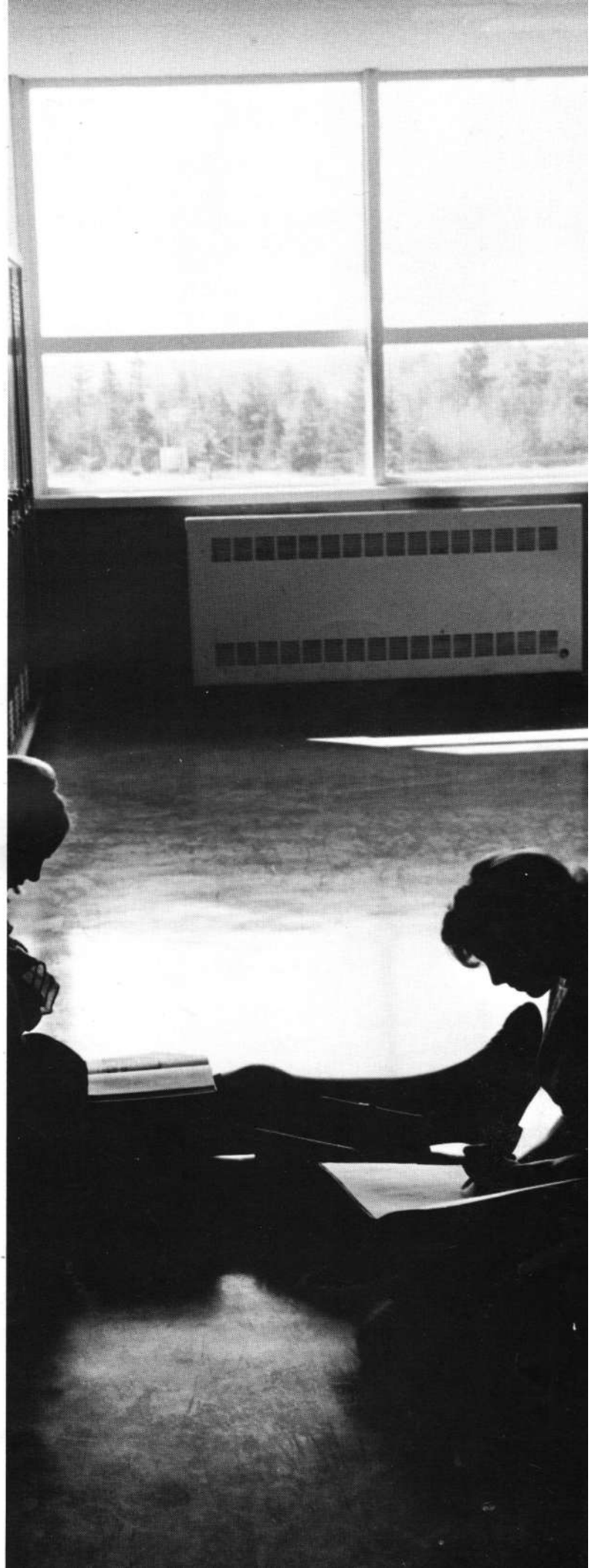

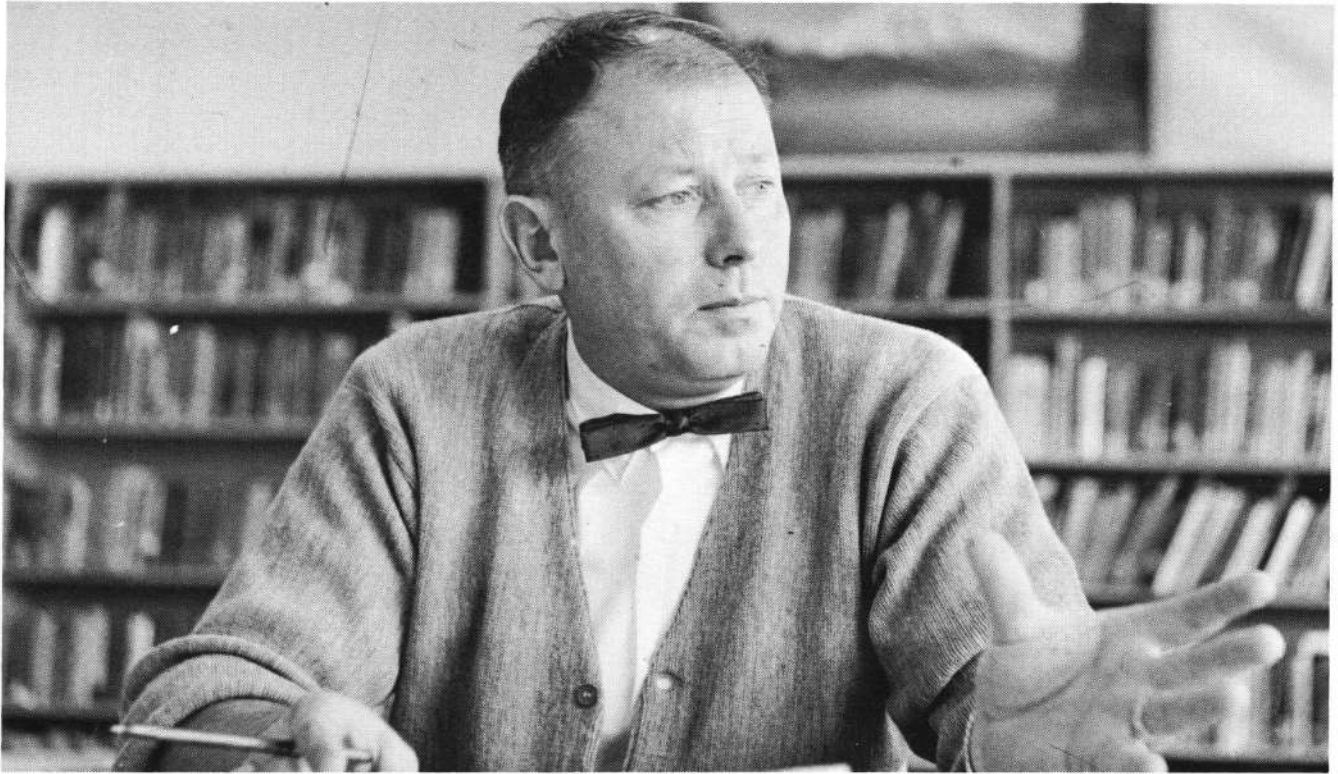

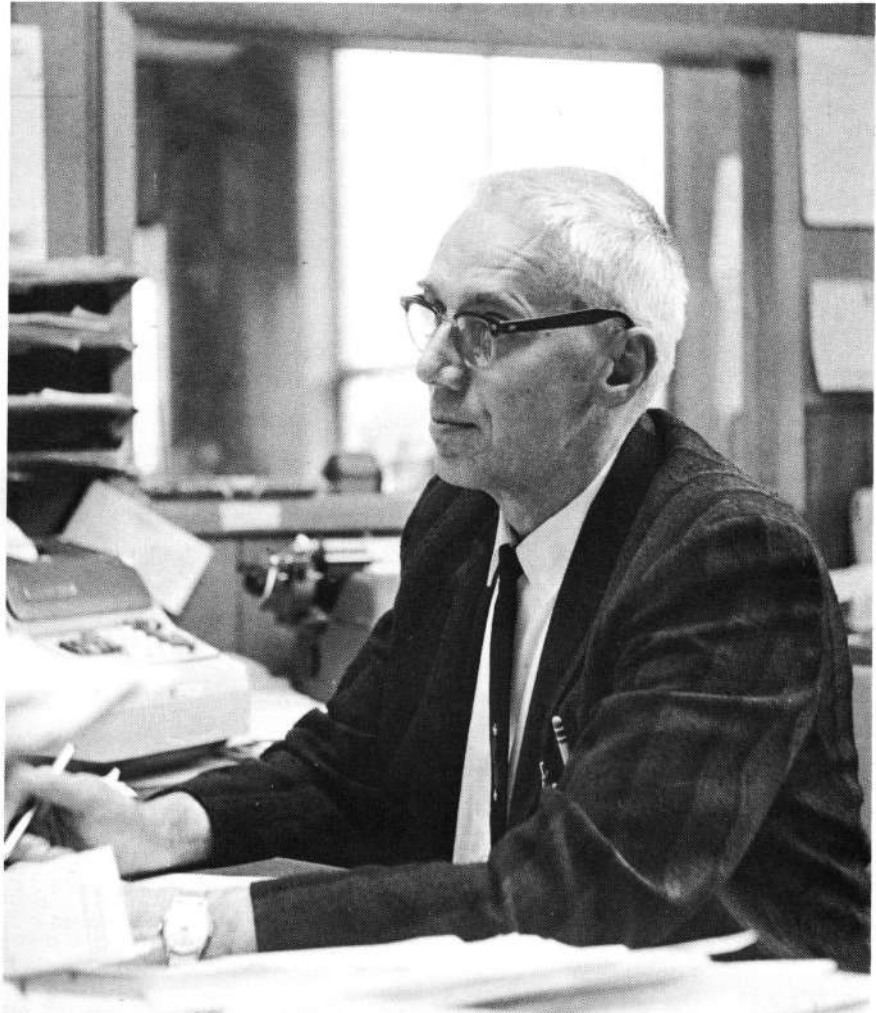
Johnson Is Liaison: School District, Patrons

The work of Superintendent Johnson and Mrs. Slocum keep the district going at full speed.

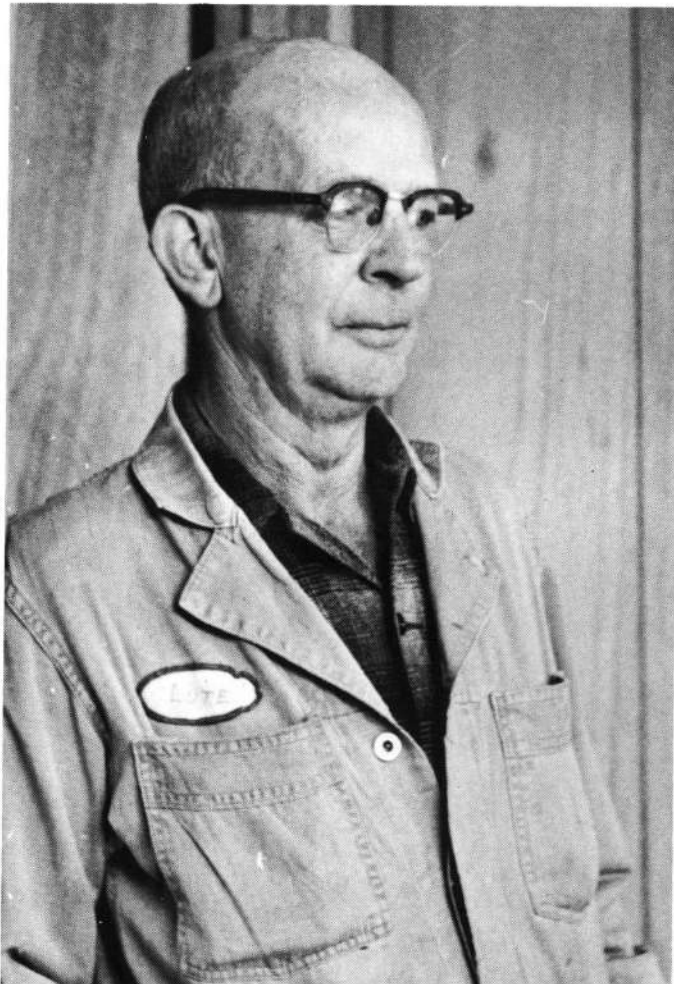

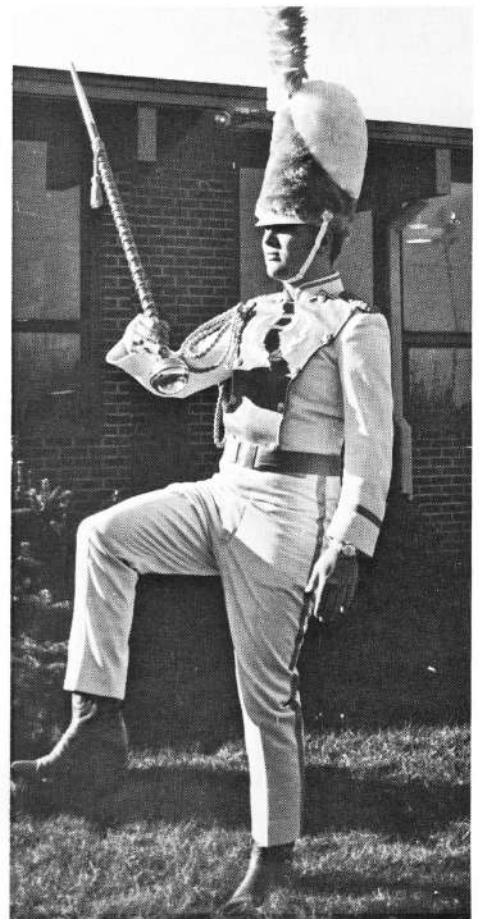

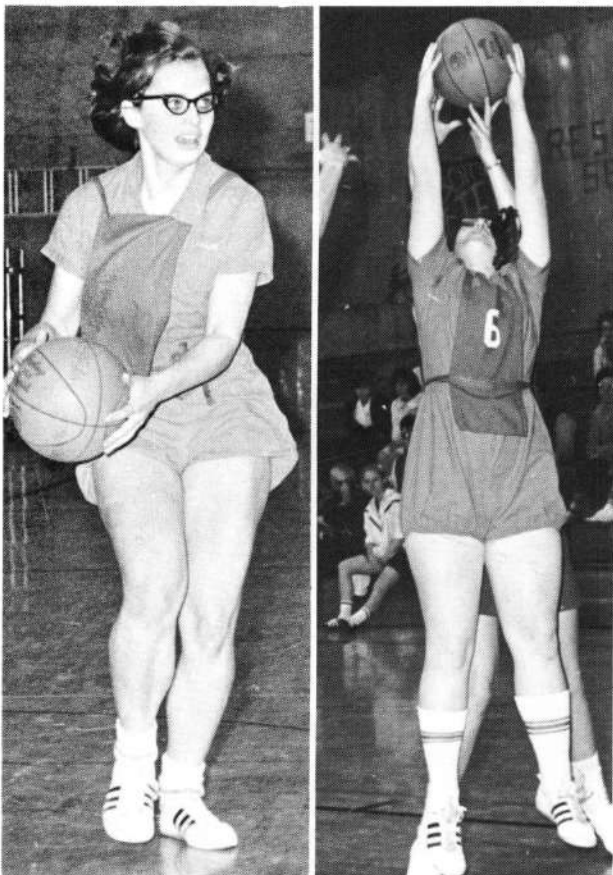

The Lettermen's Club, among other activities, rewrote parts of the club's constitution.

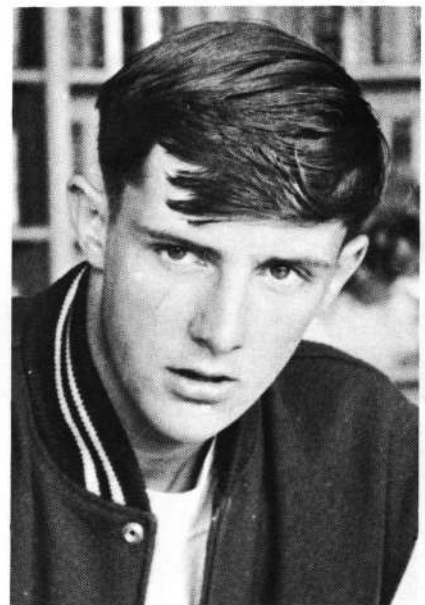

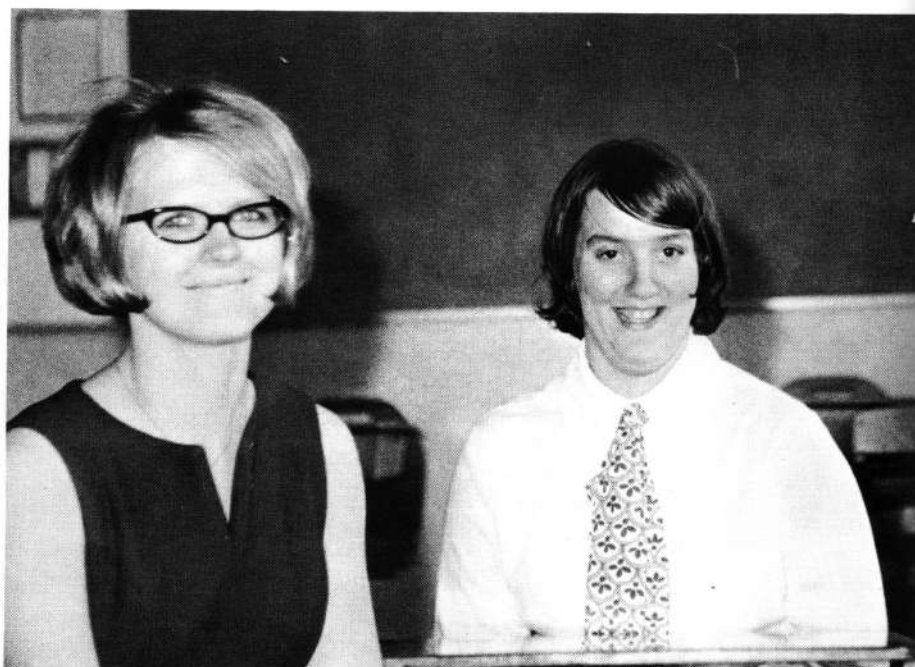

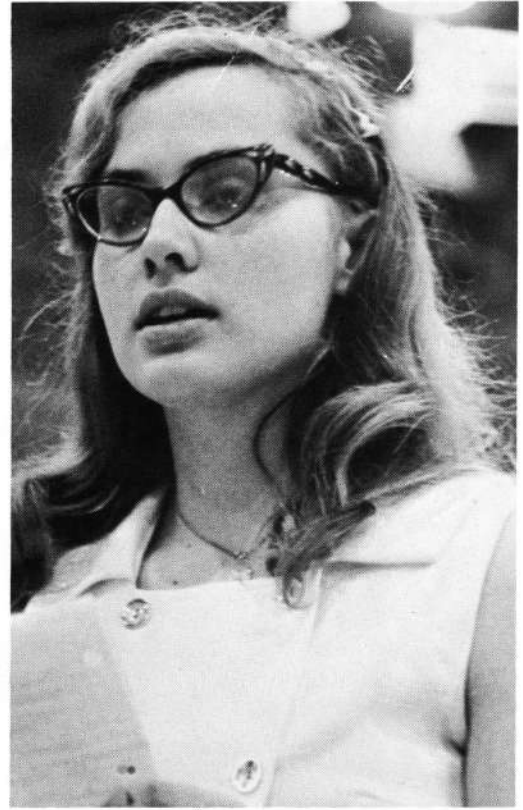

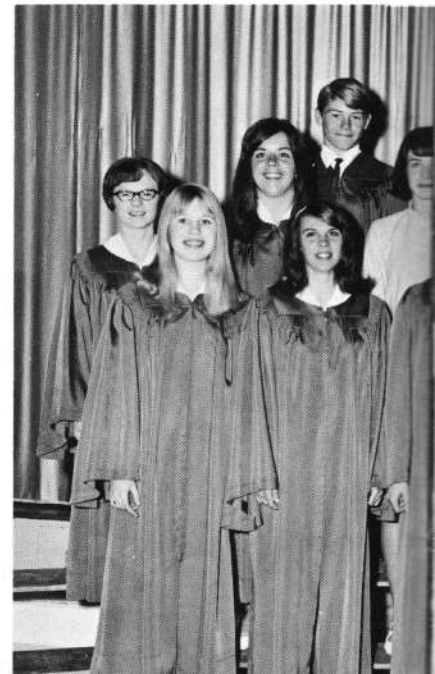

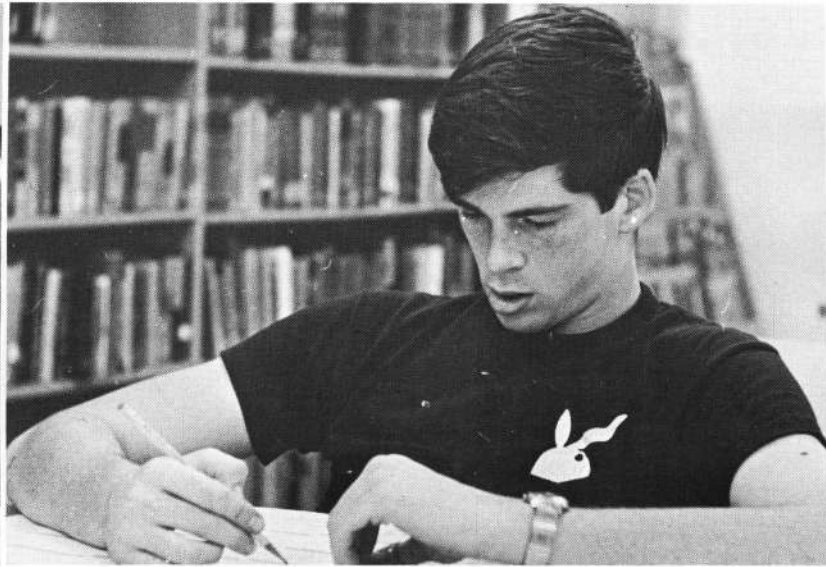

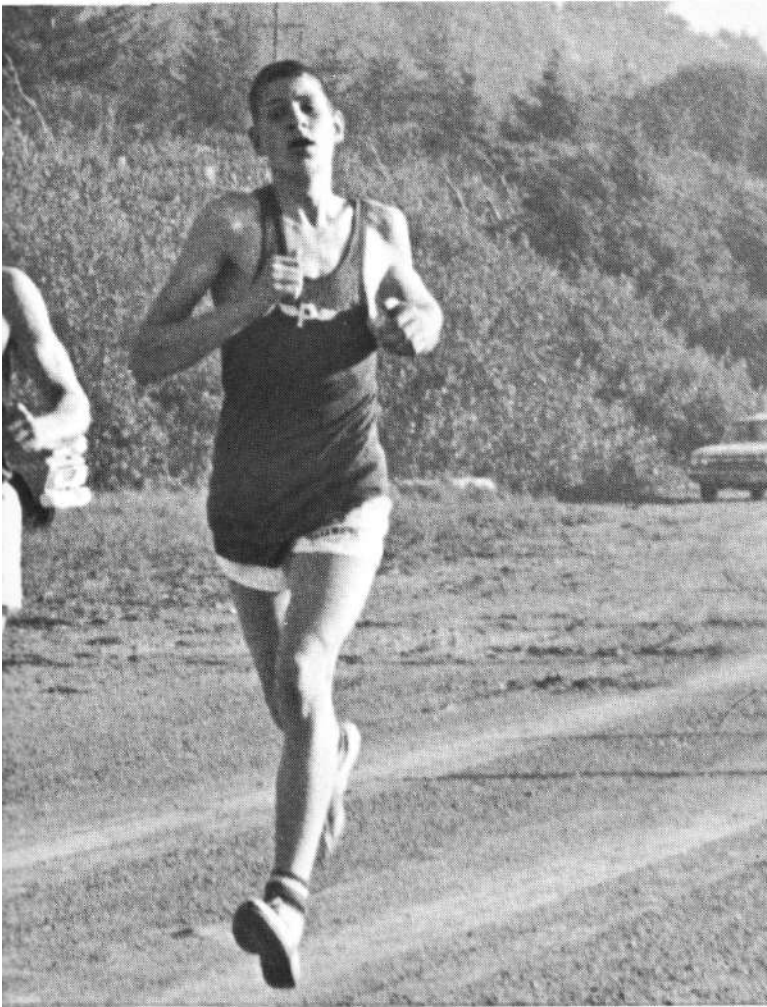

Sports at Pacific has always been something the students look forward to participating in, but usually something in which Pacific has not always excelled. The Pirate teams felt they had a successful season if they managed to come through with a win or two.

This year may have been a breakthrough for Pirate squads. Pacific may begin to climb the hill toward more victories.

The Pirate grid squad captured only one game, but also tied one and had numerous other close contests which could have gone either way. The opponents seemed to get the big play and squeak to victory 6 - 0.

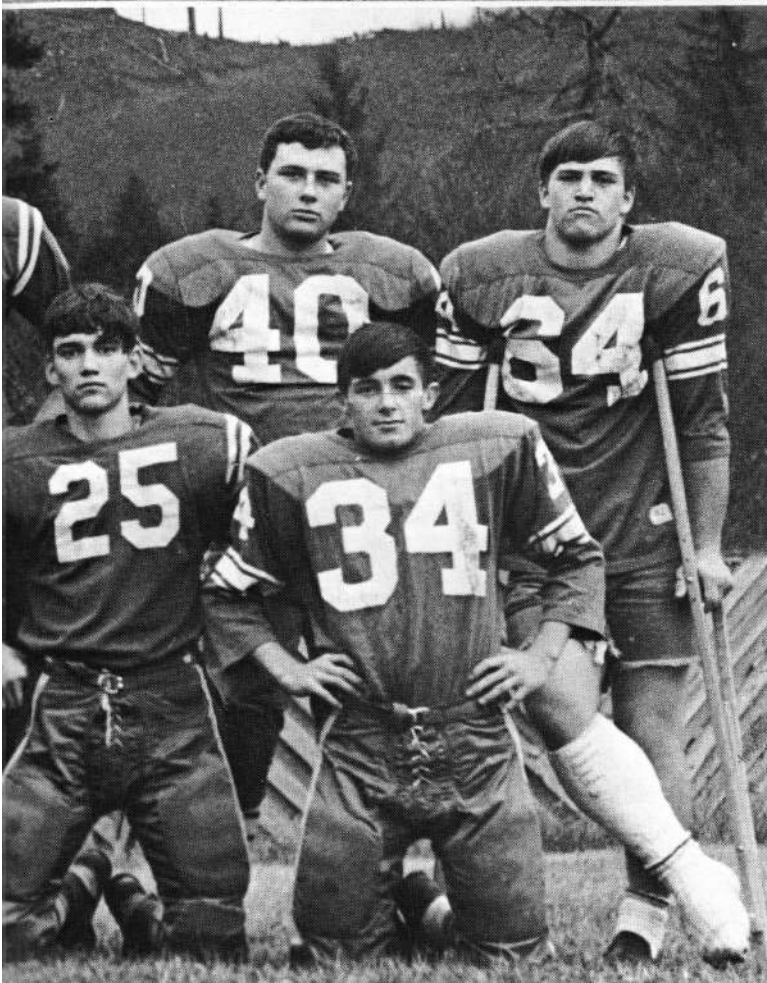
The cross country team placed second in district and became the first Pacific team to go to a state meet.

Pacific's senior-led basketball team tied the Buc record for most wins in a season, finishing 7 - 14. It may not seem a fantastic year for other schools, but at Pacific, it is a giant step over last season's 1 - 20 win-loss record.

The Buc grapplers sent four to state and amassed 18 points there, more than any other Pirate squad.

The track squad finished third in the district and sent five to state. The baseball team won one game and lost many a close one.

This was the beginning of the Buc's climbing out of the cellar, the turning point in Pacific sports, a fresh start, and the end of a "let's forget it" past.





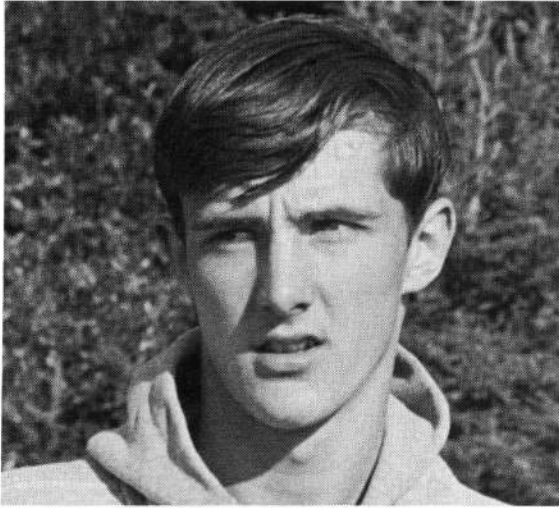

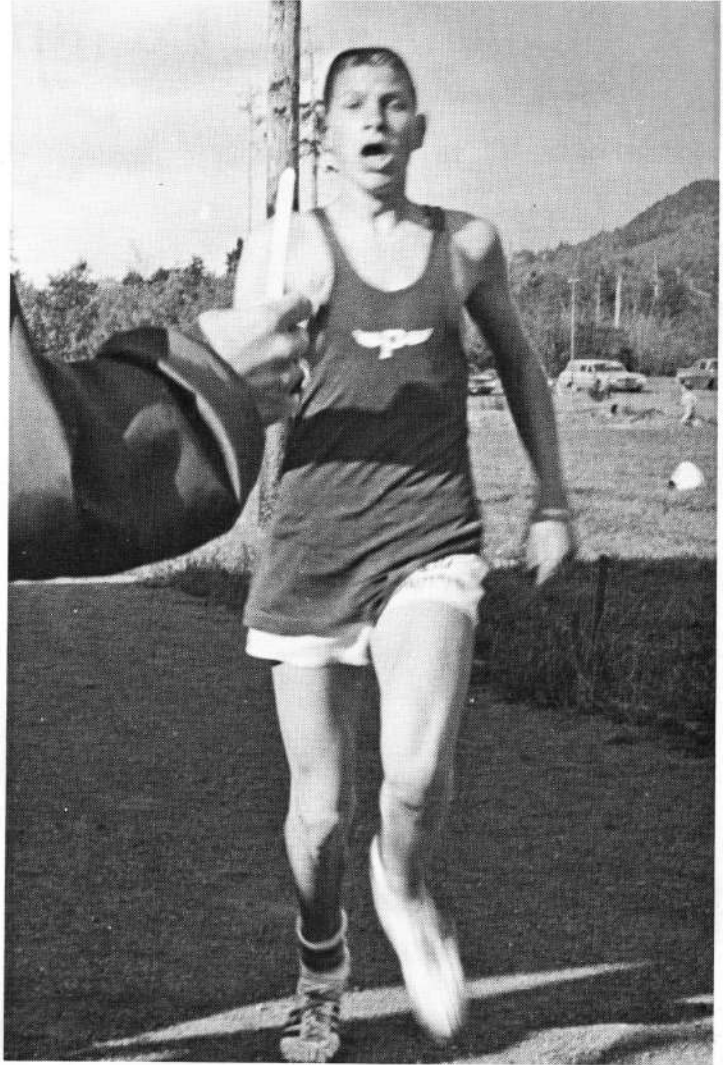

Seniors Lead Exciting Pigskin Season

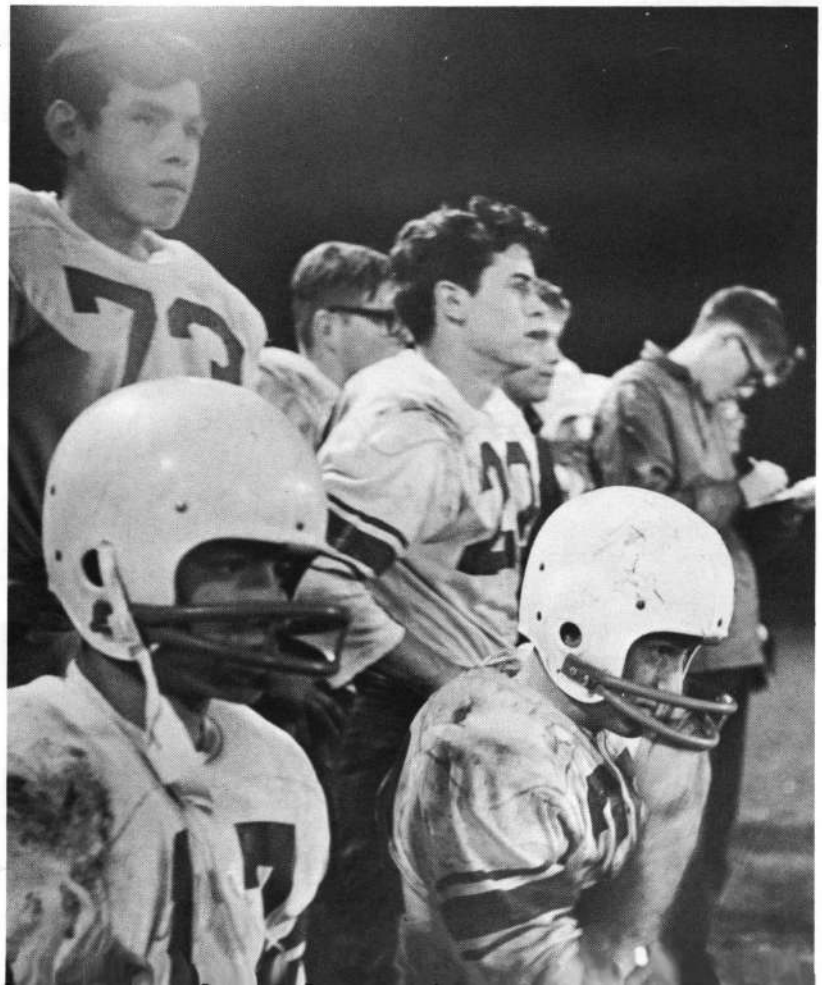


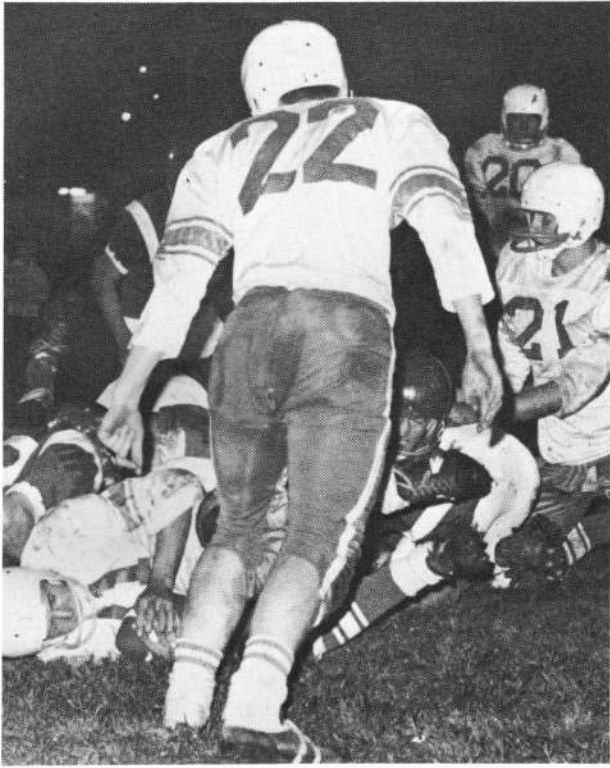

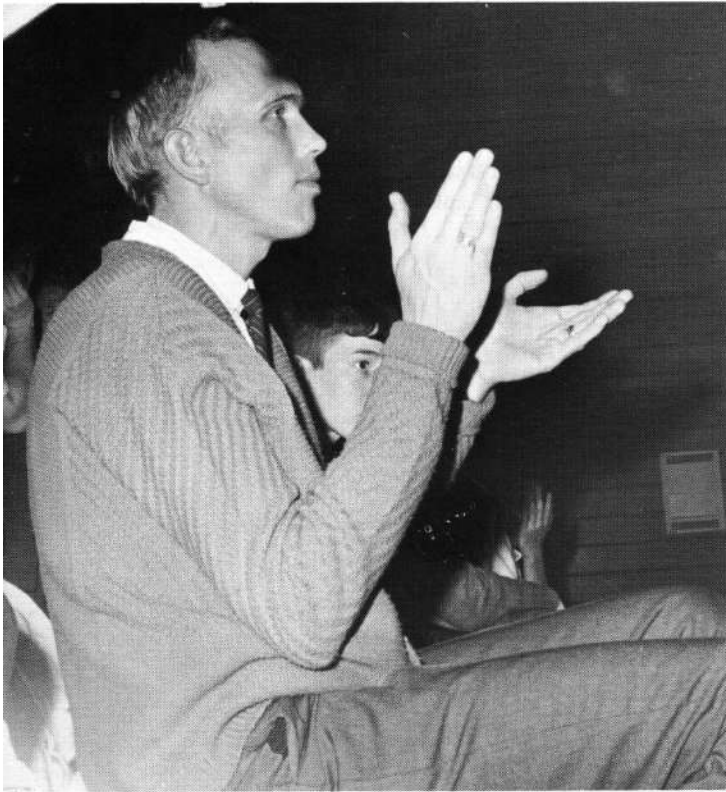

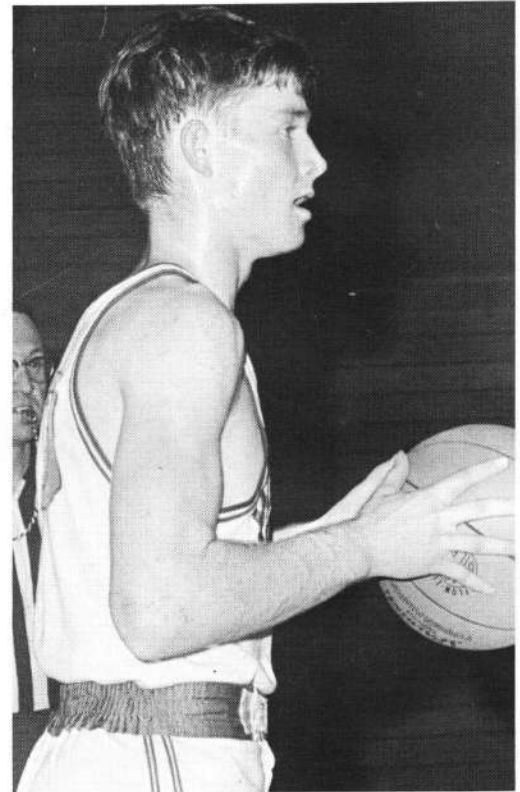

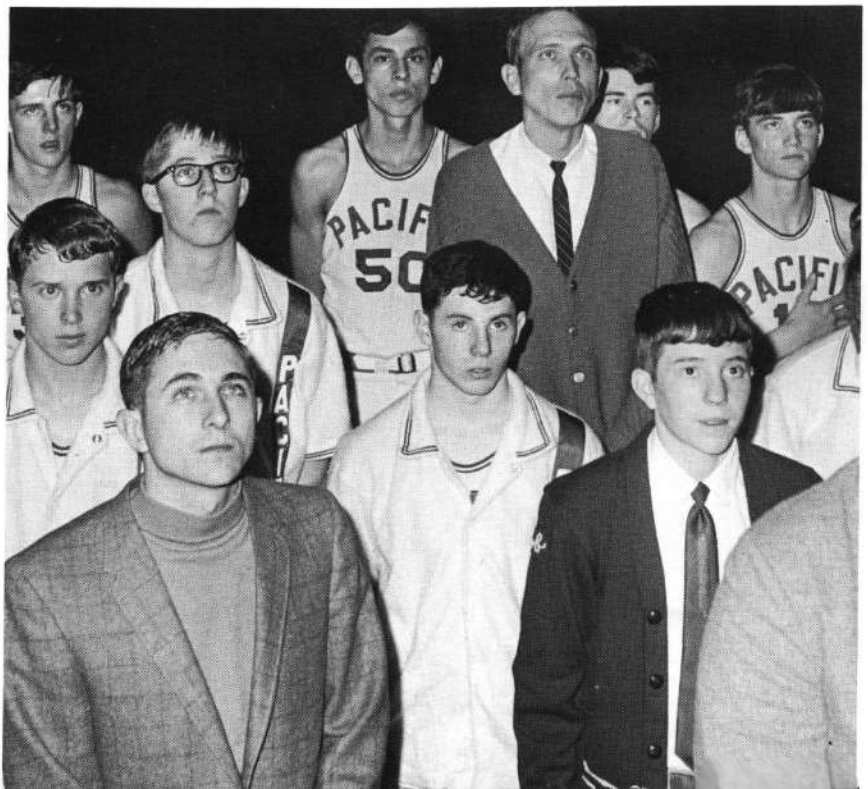

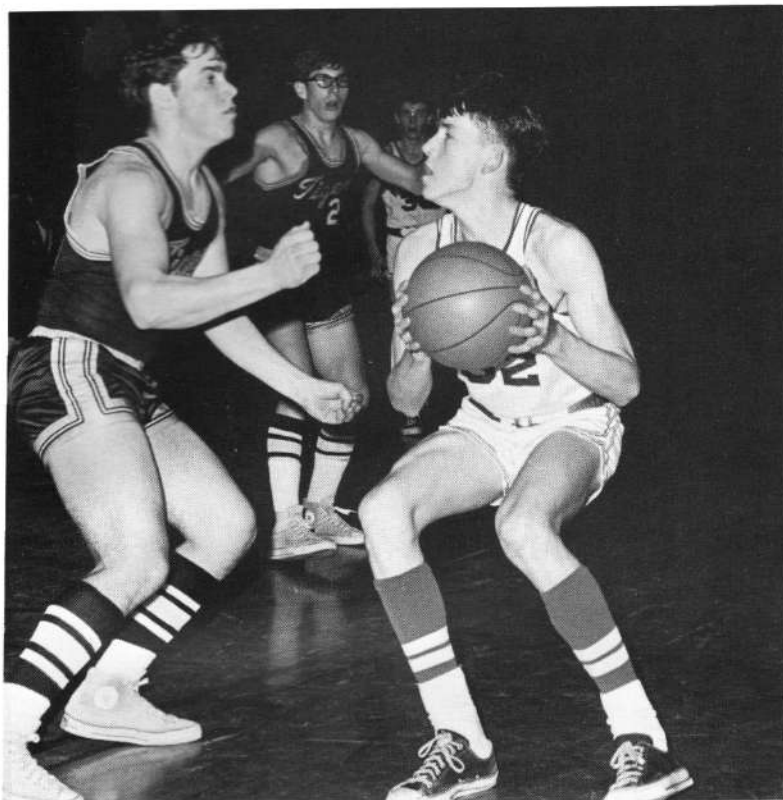

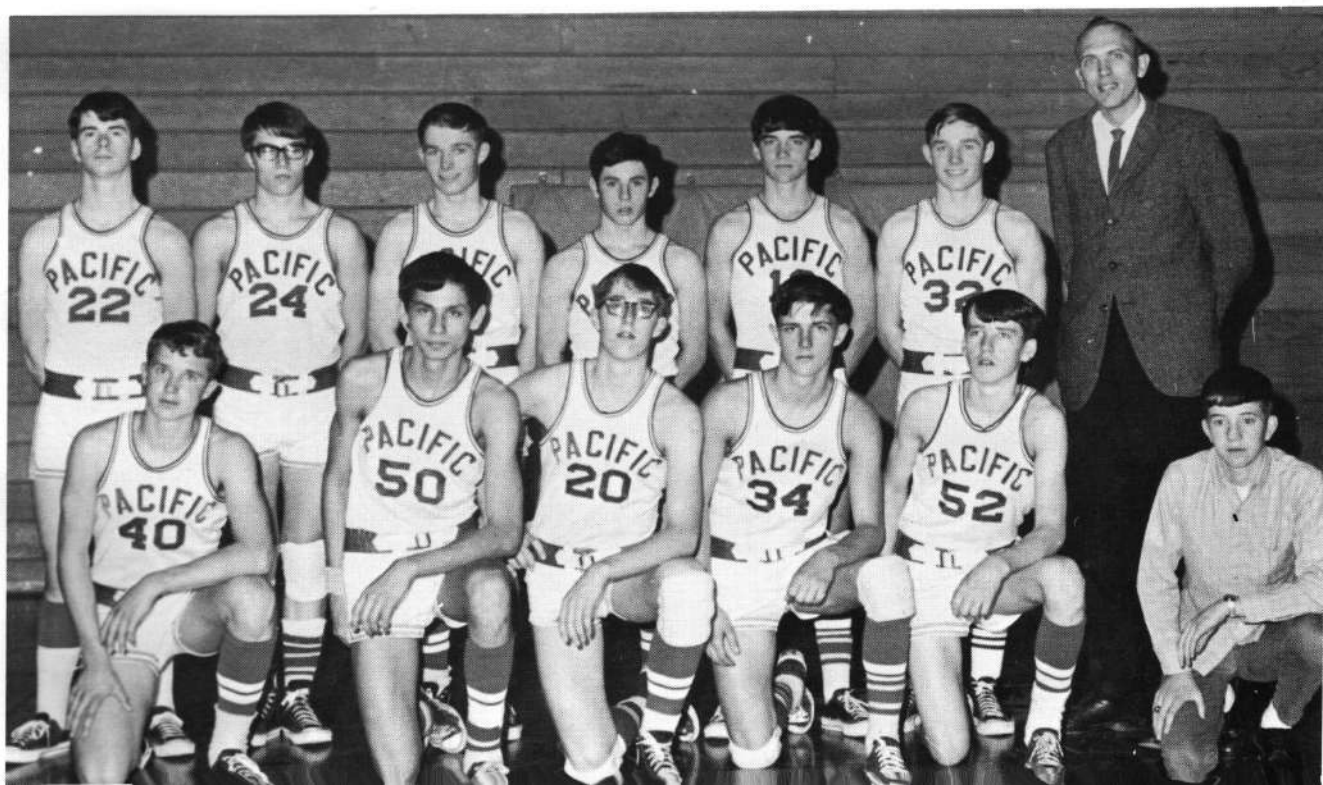

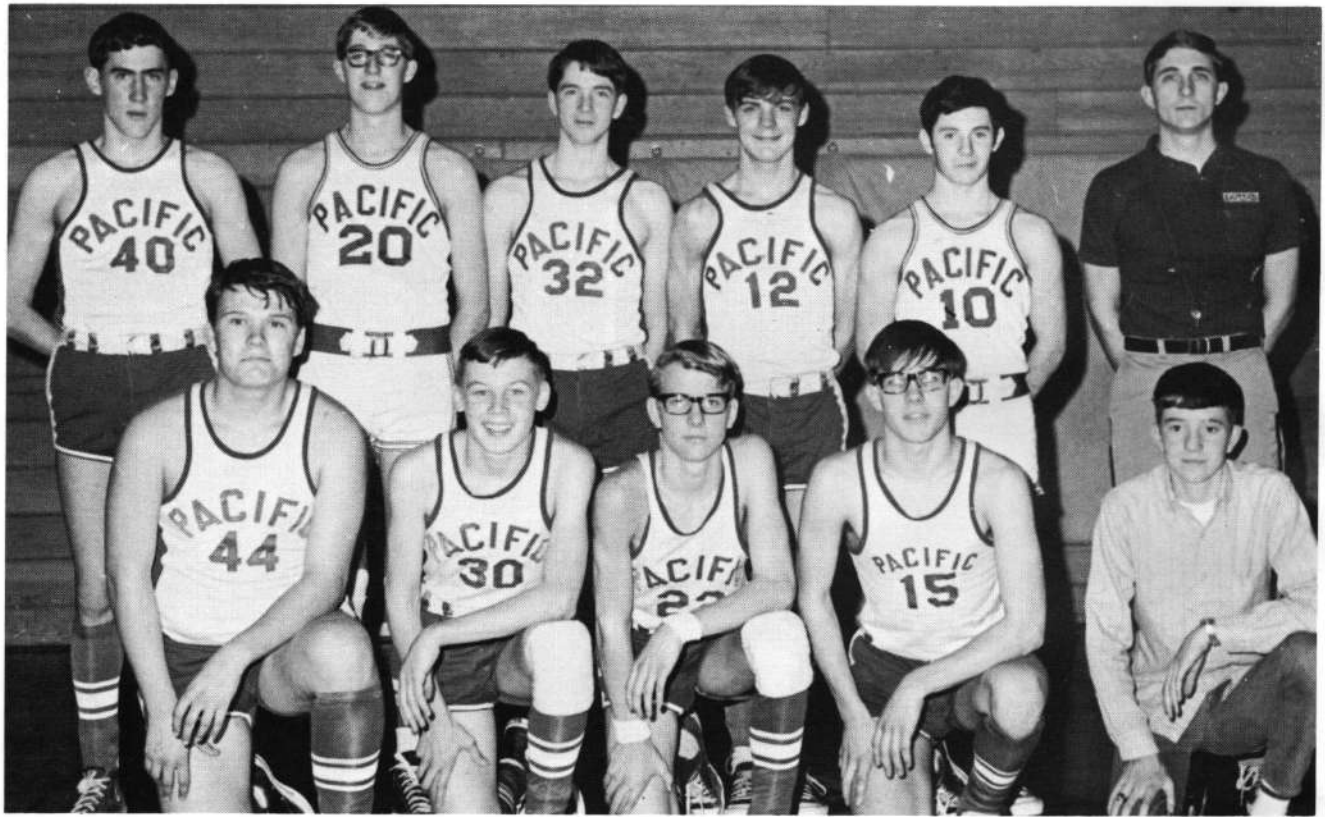

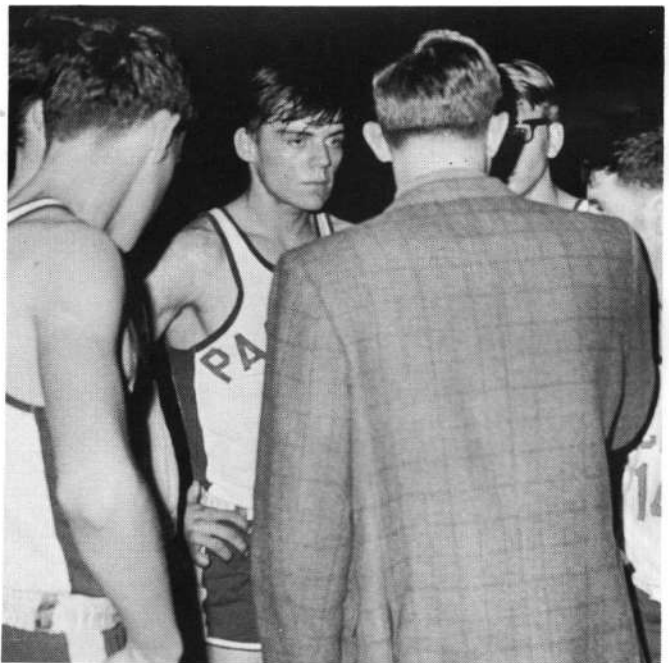

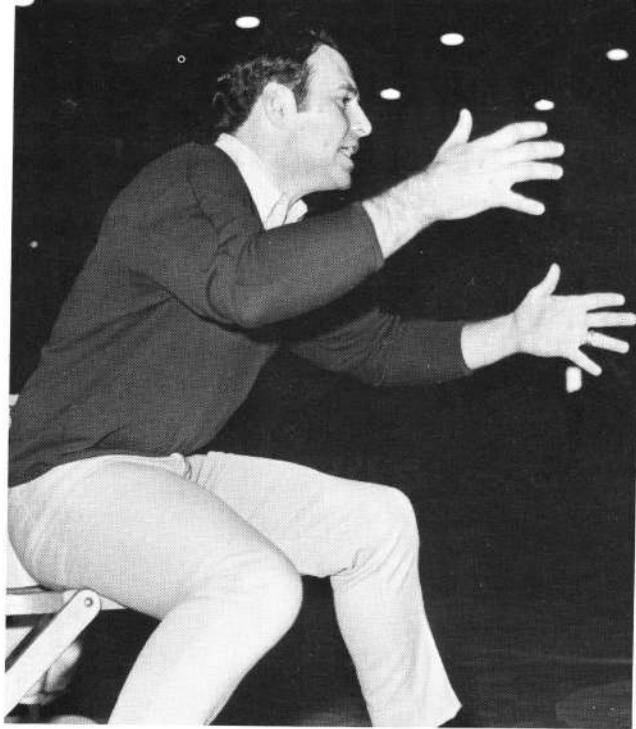

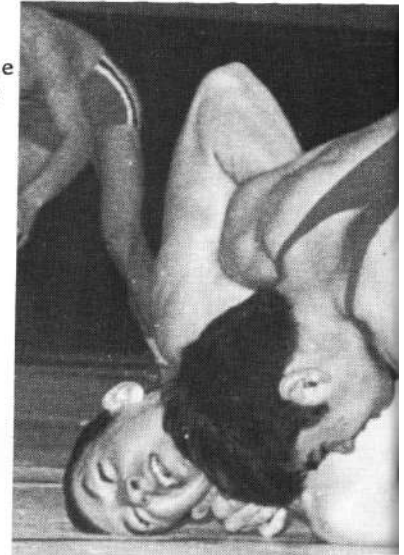

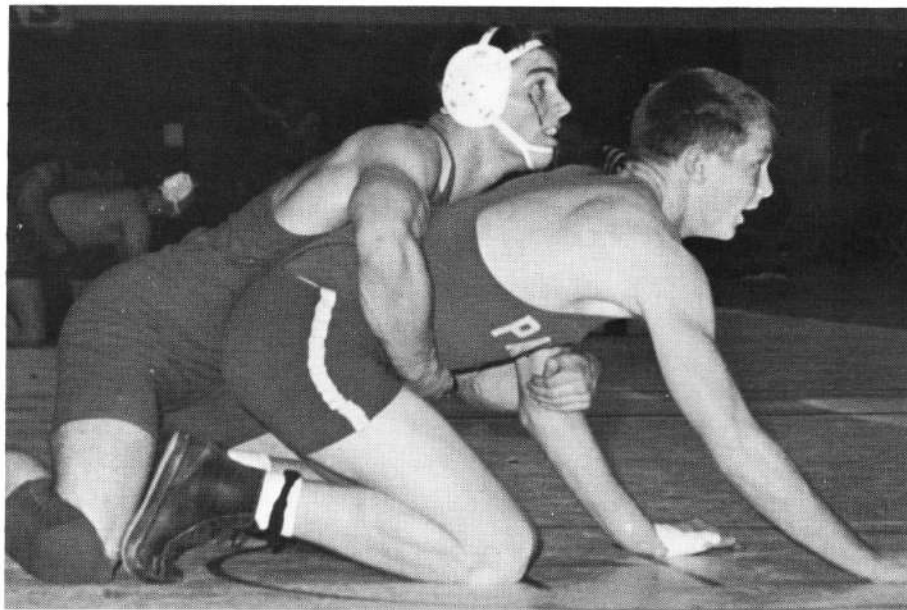

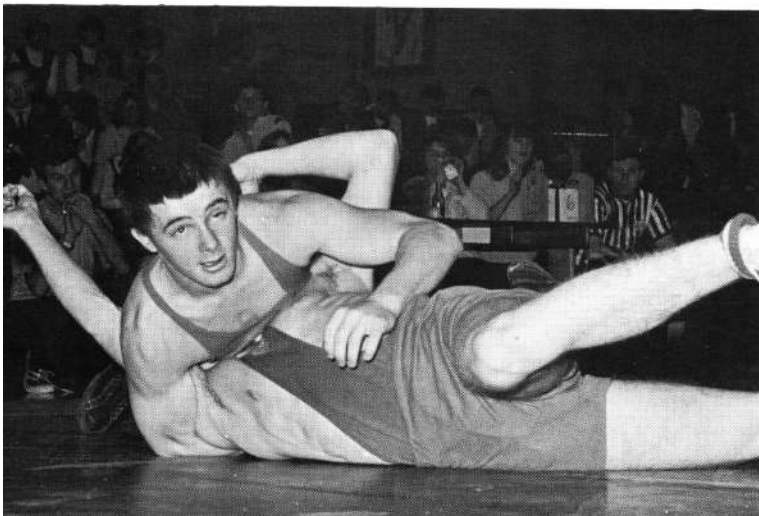

In team standings, Pacific tied for 16th place among the A-2 schools with 8 points, scoring ahead of Coquille and Gold Beach.

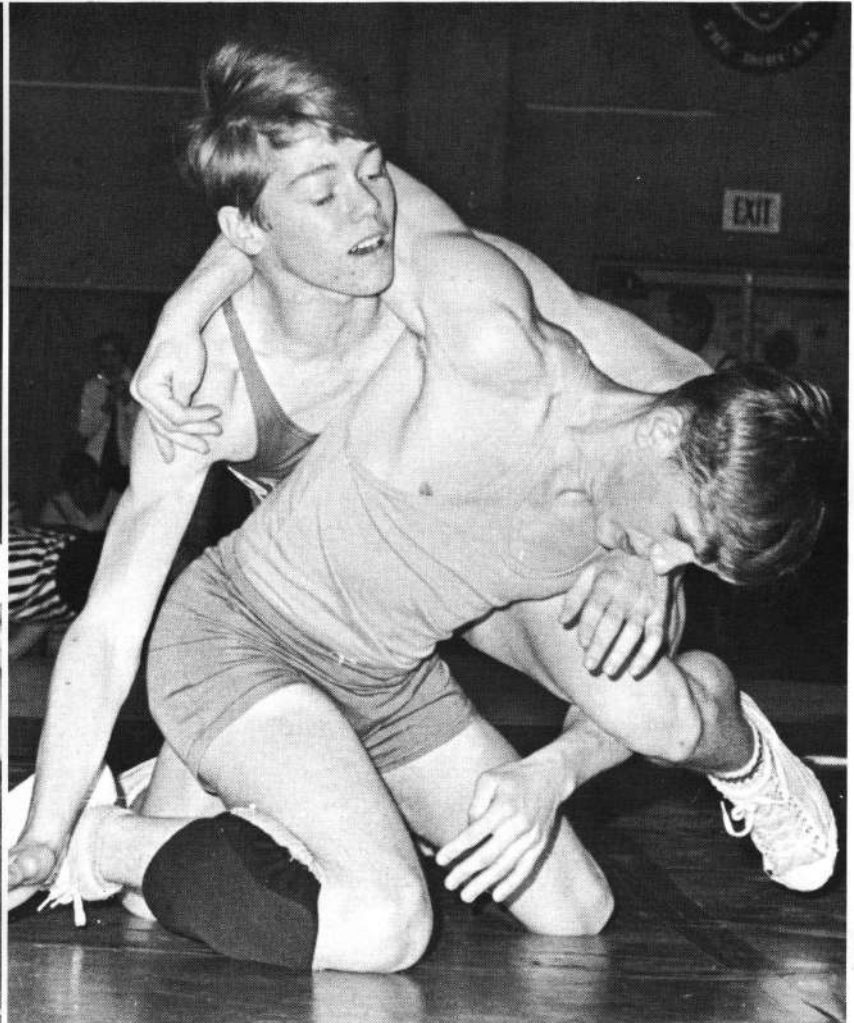

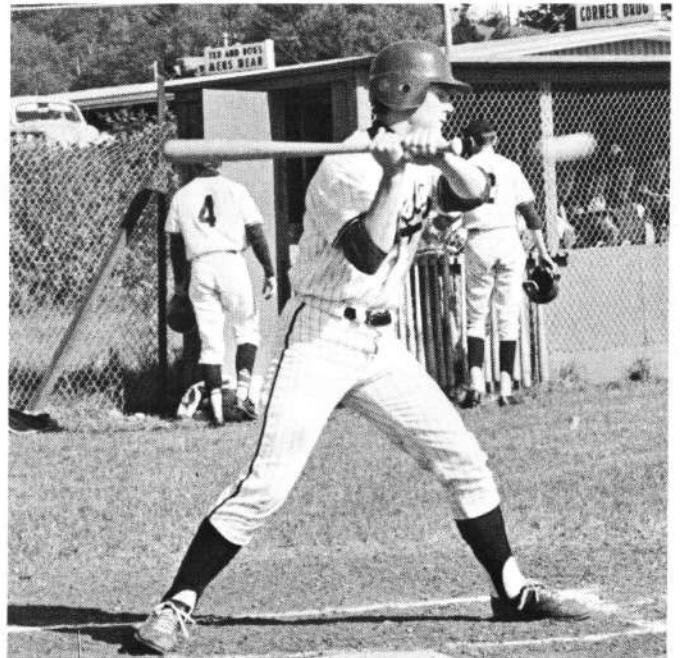

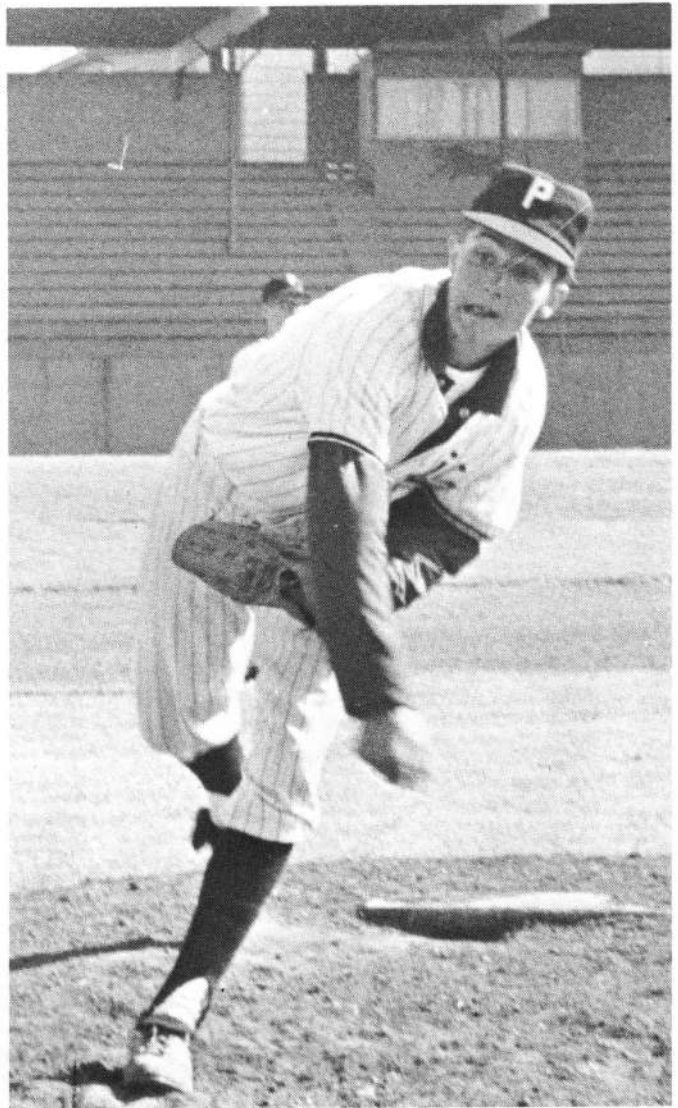

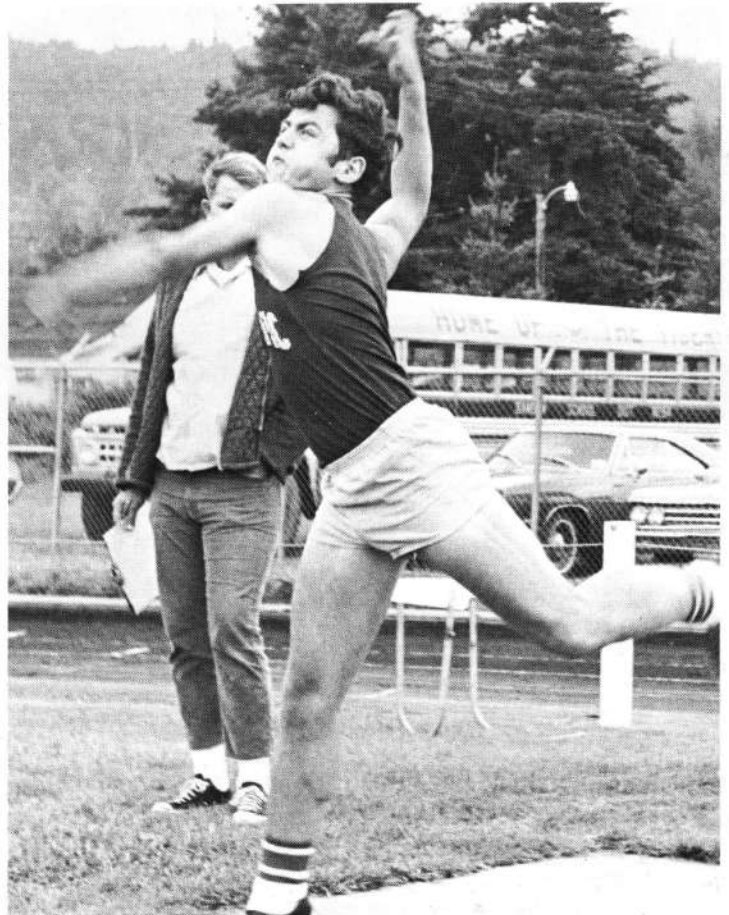

The school day ended with a pep assembly held in honor of the mother's of the senior players. The

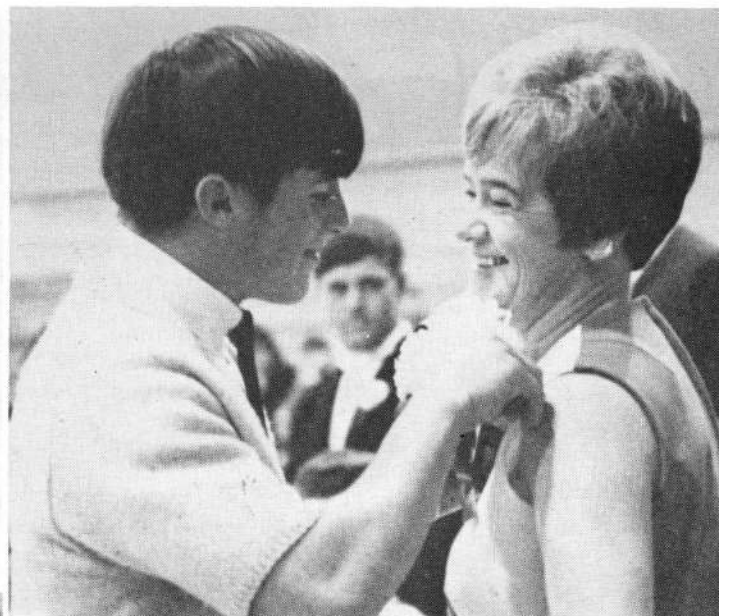
seniors pinned mum's on their mothers, surprisingly without a mishap. Coach McKeel spoke about each senior griddier as the flower was pinned on.

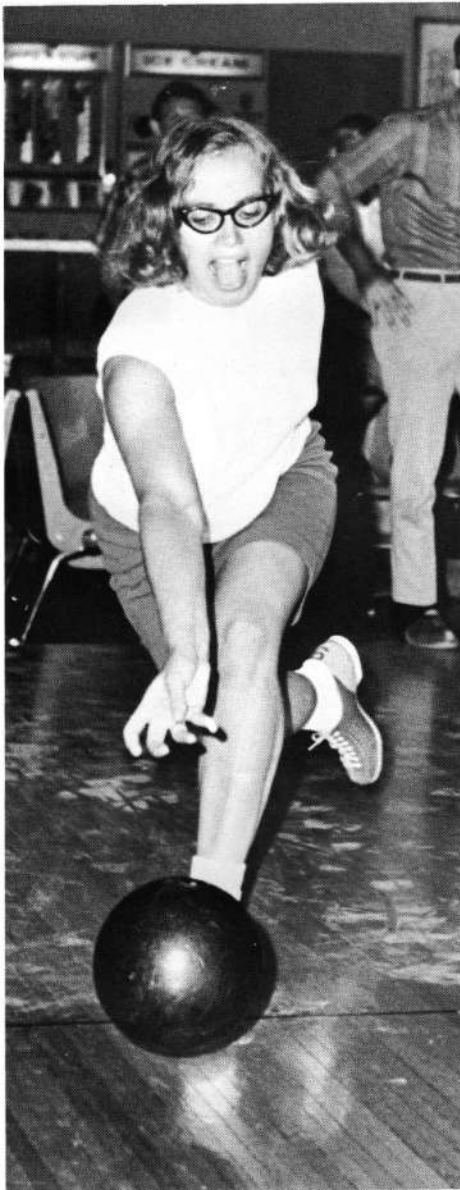
