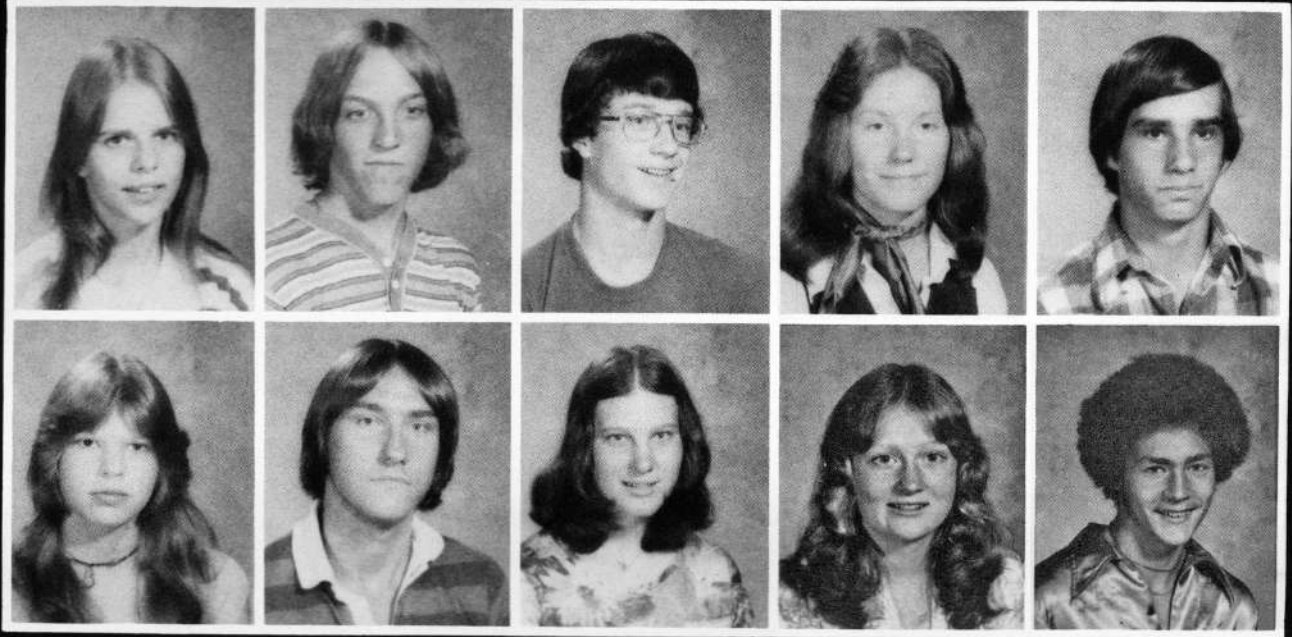

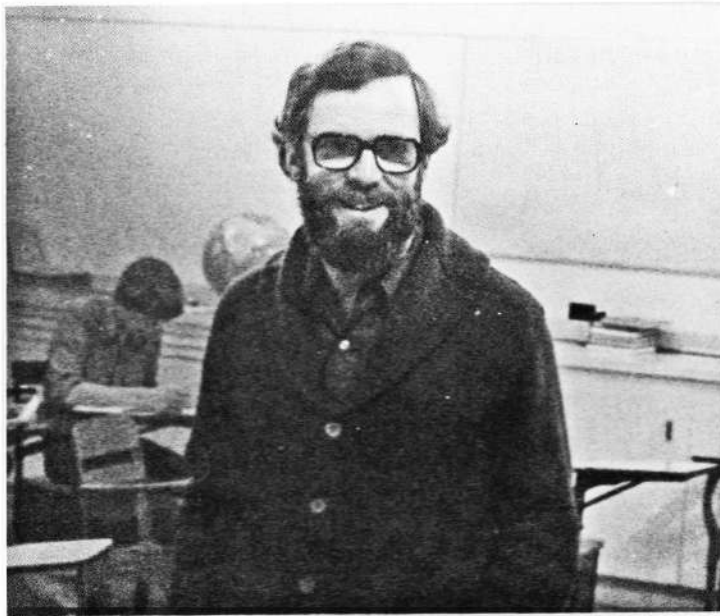
## P.H.S. Gains Six

# Career Education



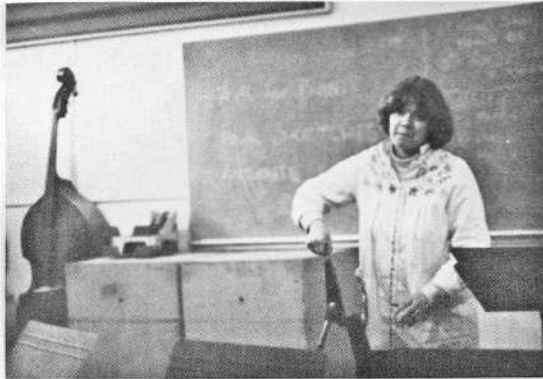

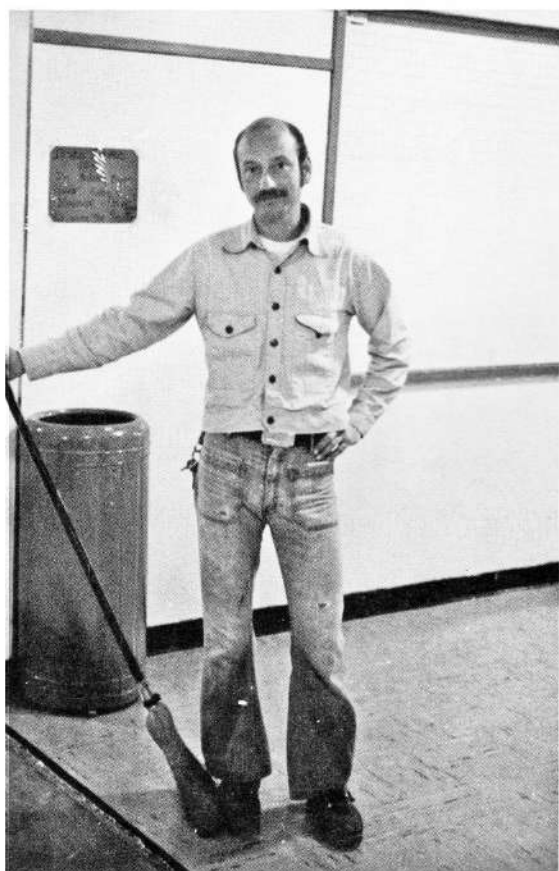

## Students Participate

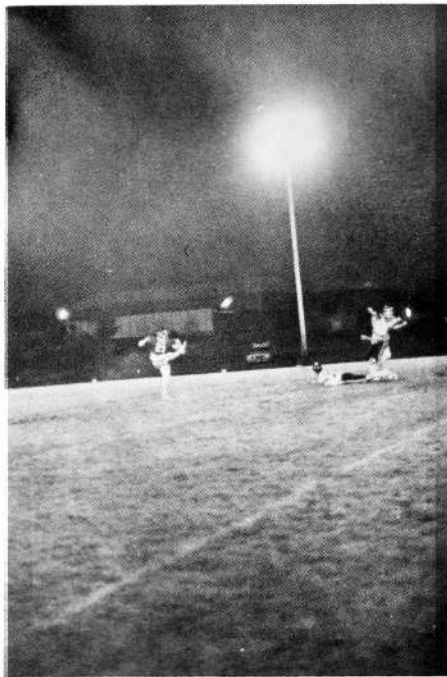
During the week of October 17, the Senior Class sponsored homecoming activities at Pacific High School. This was the twenty-first homecoming celebration.

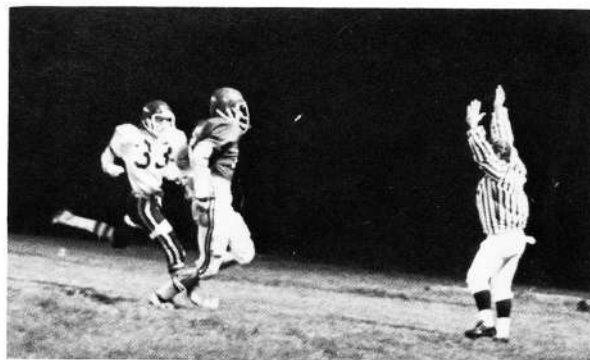
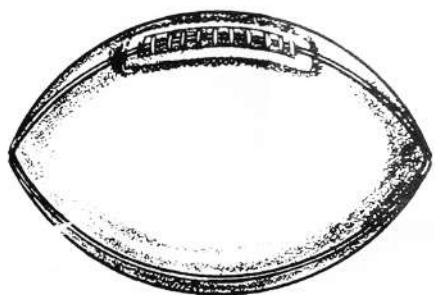
## 2nd In League

The Pirate team has improved over the past three years to become recognized statewide in class A football.

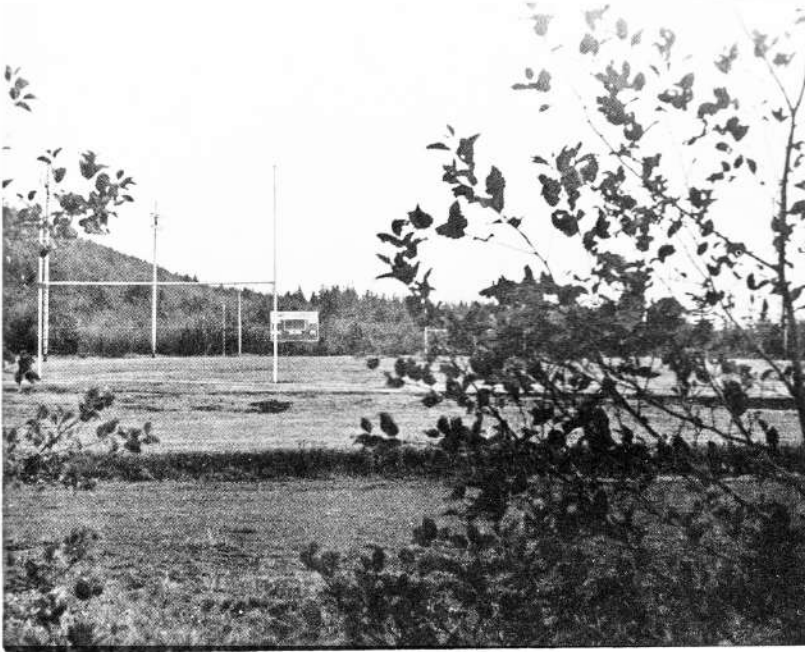

When we first arrived the cabins had been sprayed for spiders, which made the cabins smell bad,

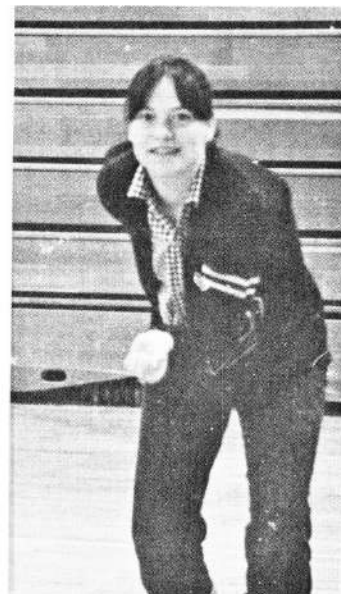
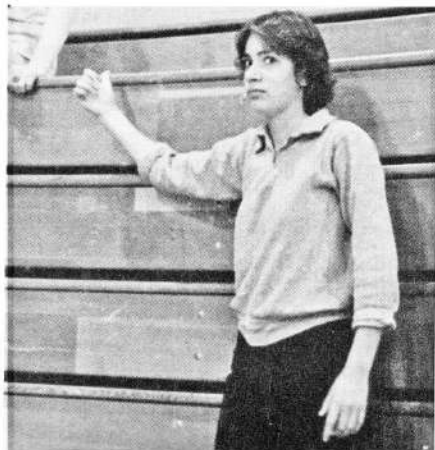

Another decision that affected nearly all students was their sponsorship of Spring Fever Day scheduled for May 12.

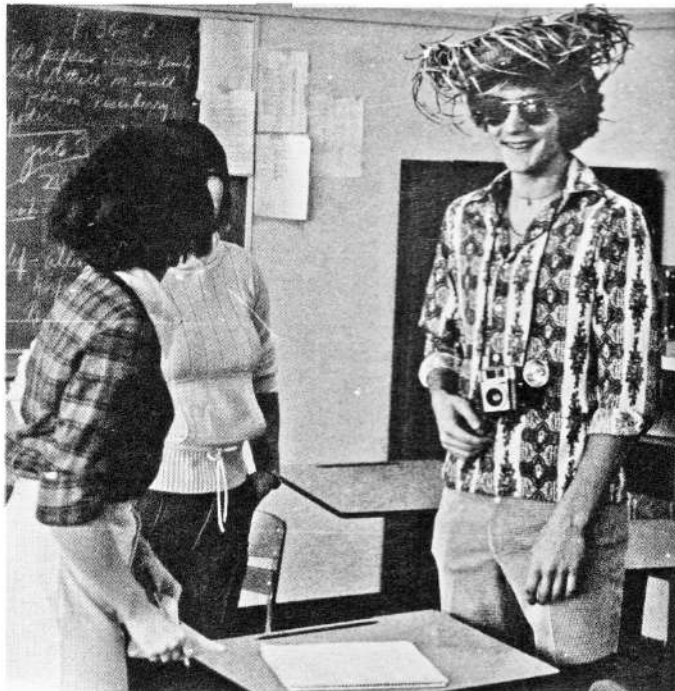

Thank you, Tim Sparks, for always being there with your camera and never failing to show up on Thursday nights to work in the darkroom.

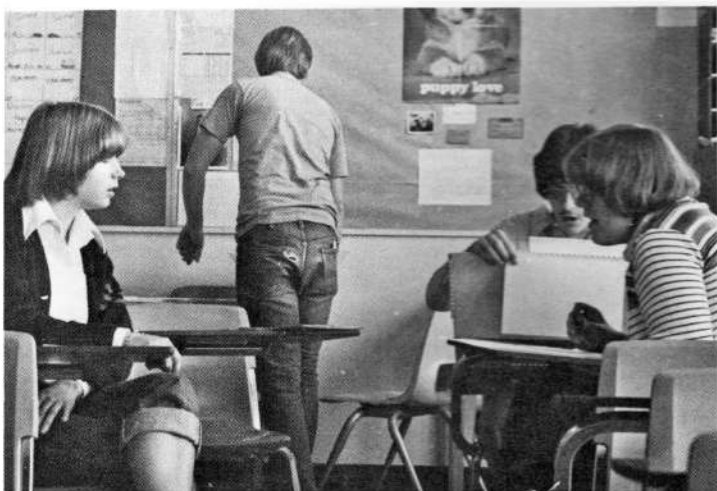
