---

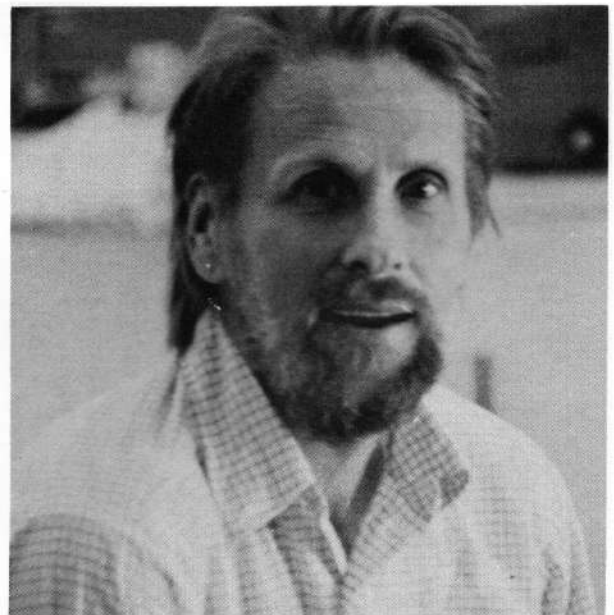

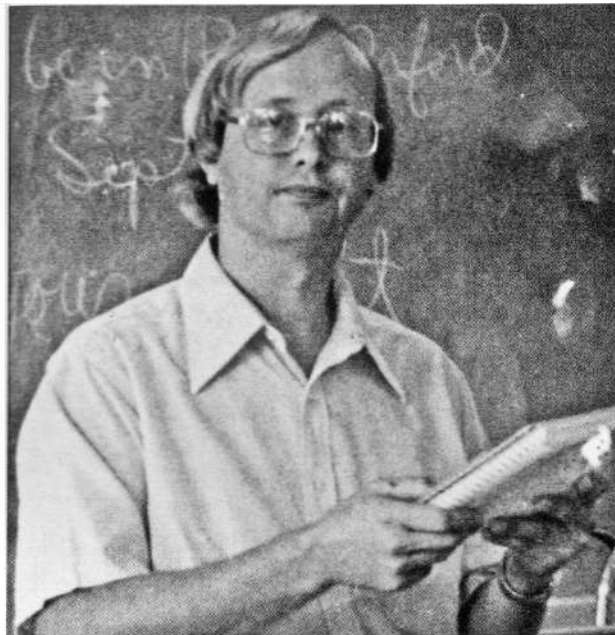
## For All

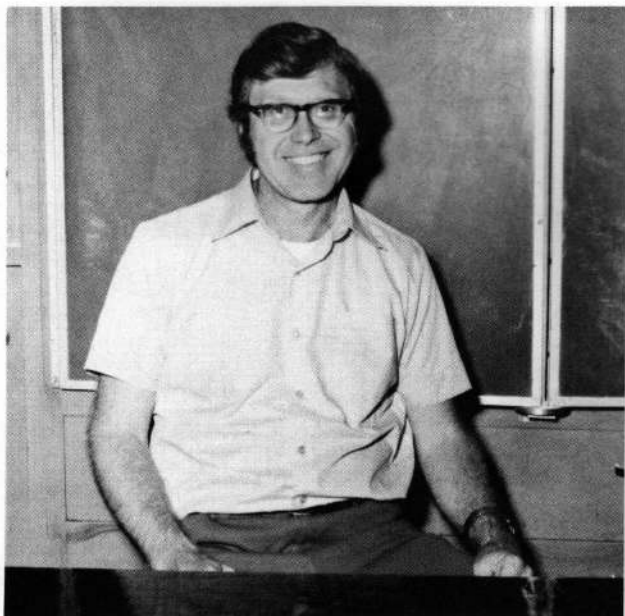


# Classes Are Required

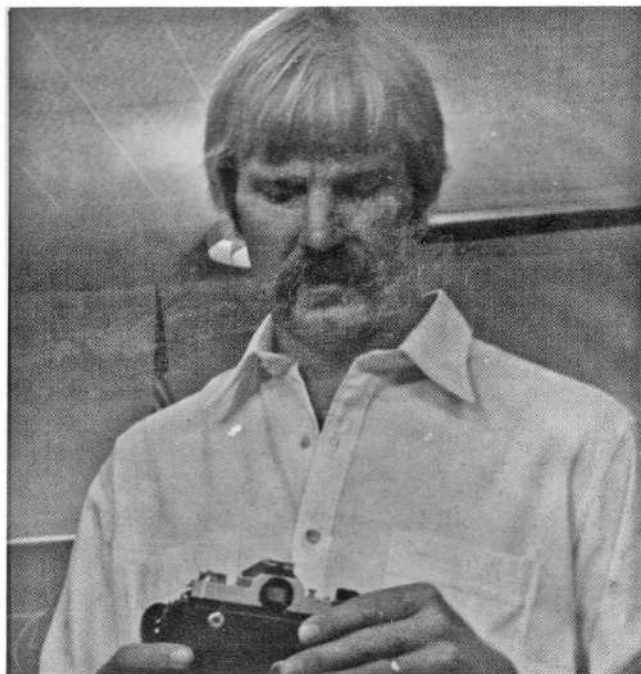
## Taken By

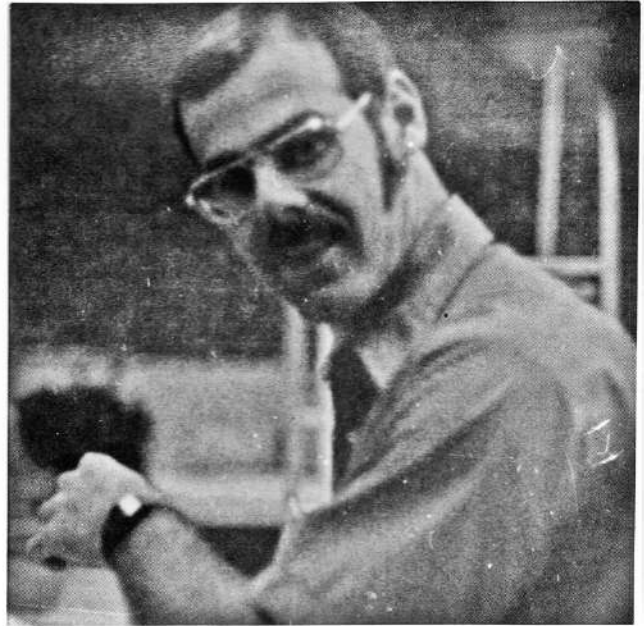
# Practical, And

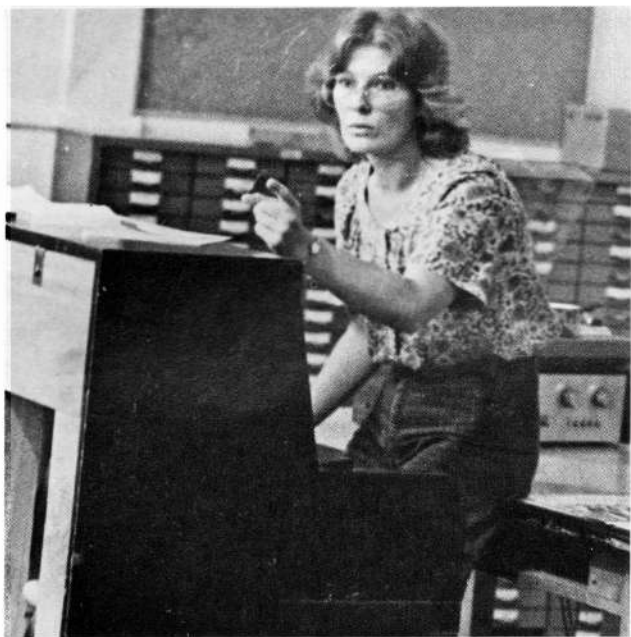
## Enriching

# Counselors And Aides

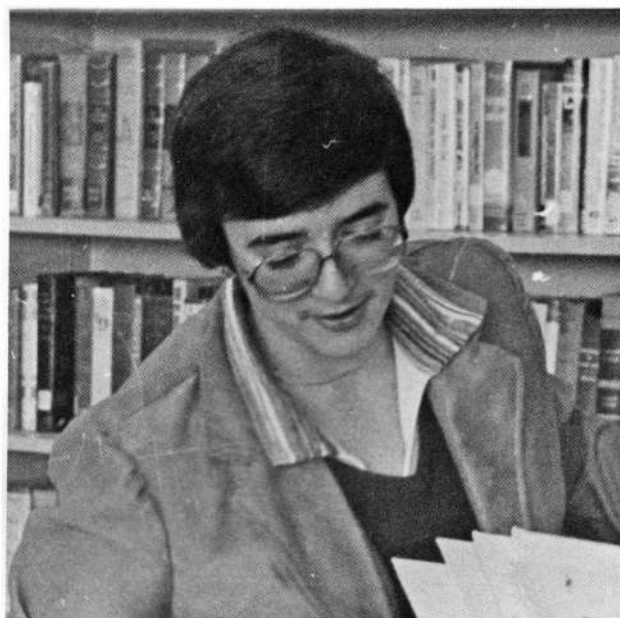

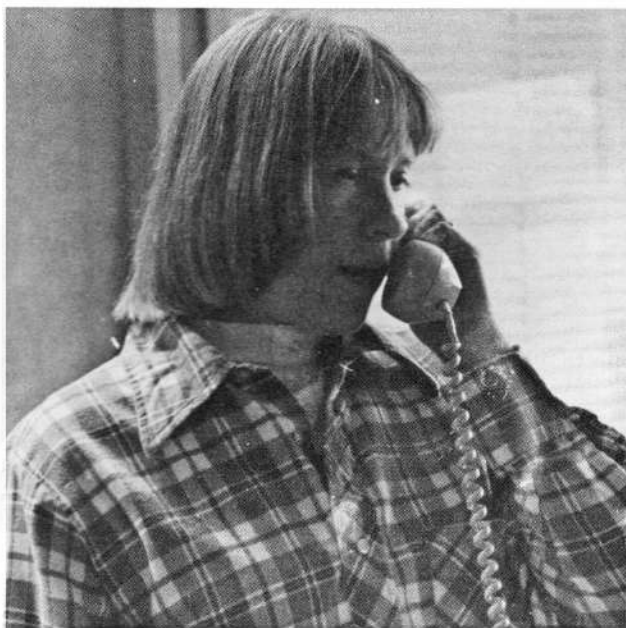
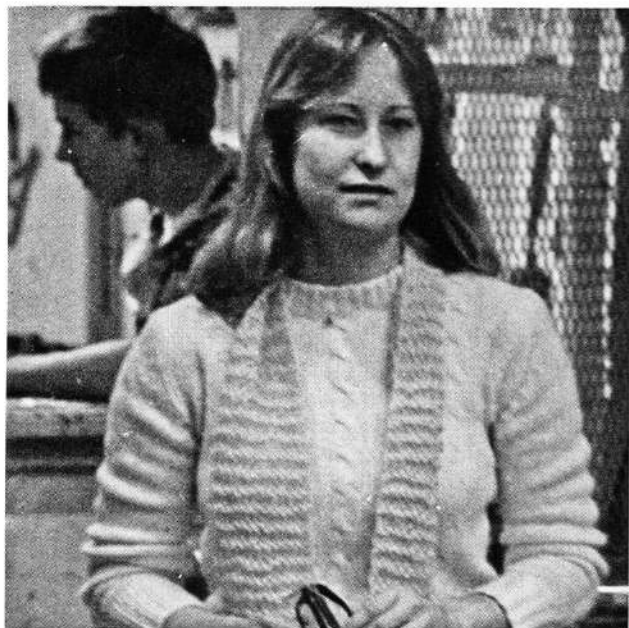

# District 2CJ School Board

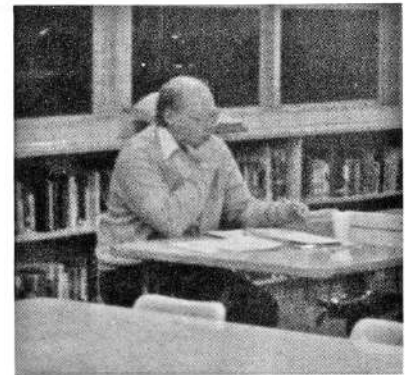
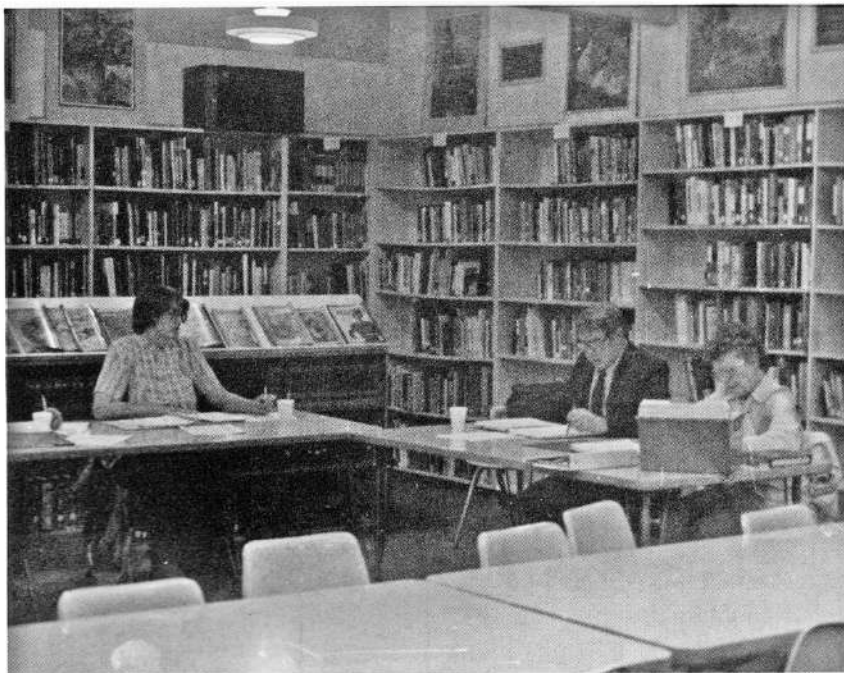

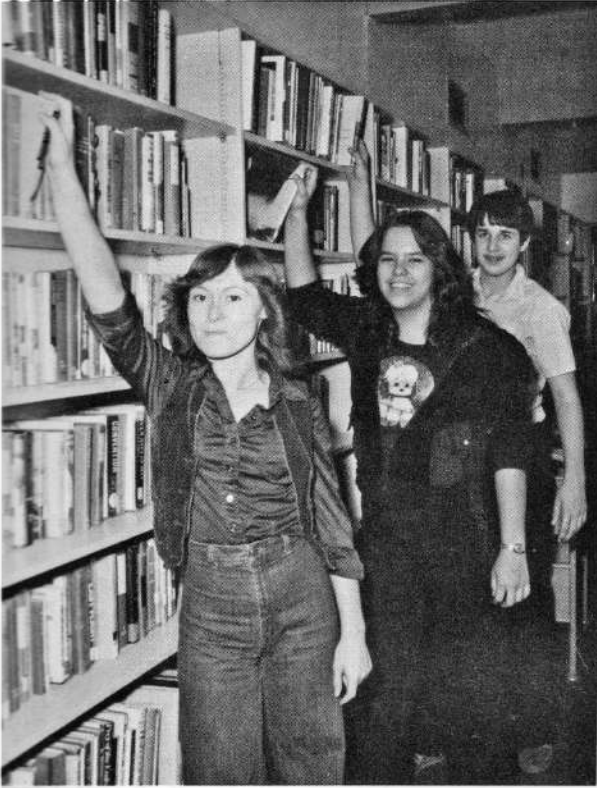
This year the board considered many controversial subjects, as well as the routine business of the school district. Among the things acted upon were the following items:

Typing is also one of the main jobs of office aides, as well as filing and answering the phone.



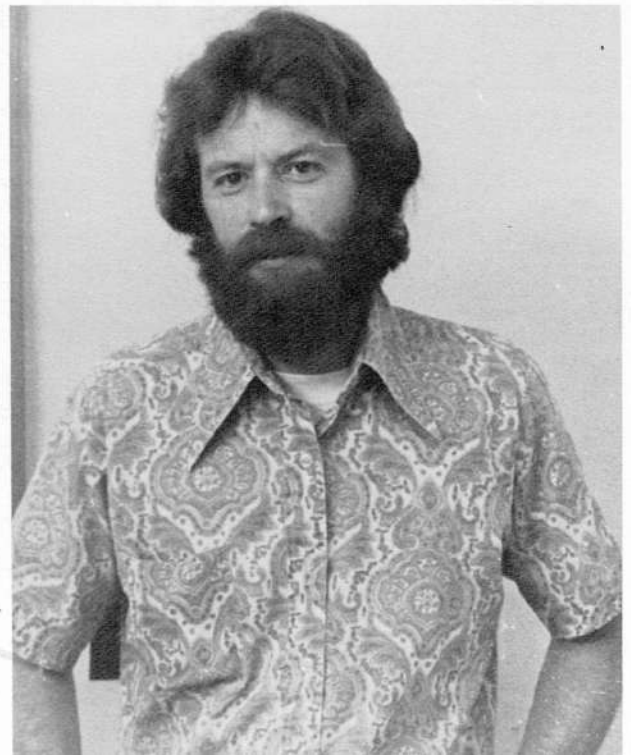

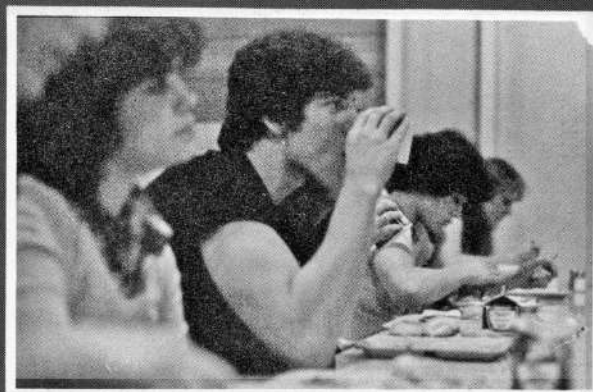




# Lunchline, Student Store Gets Us Through Noon

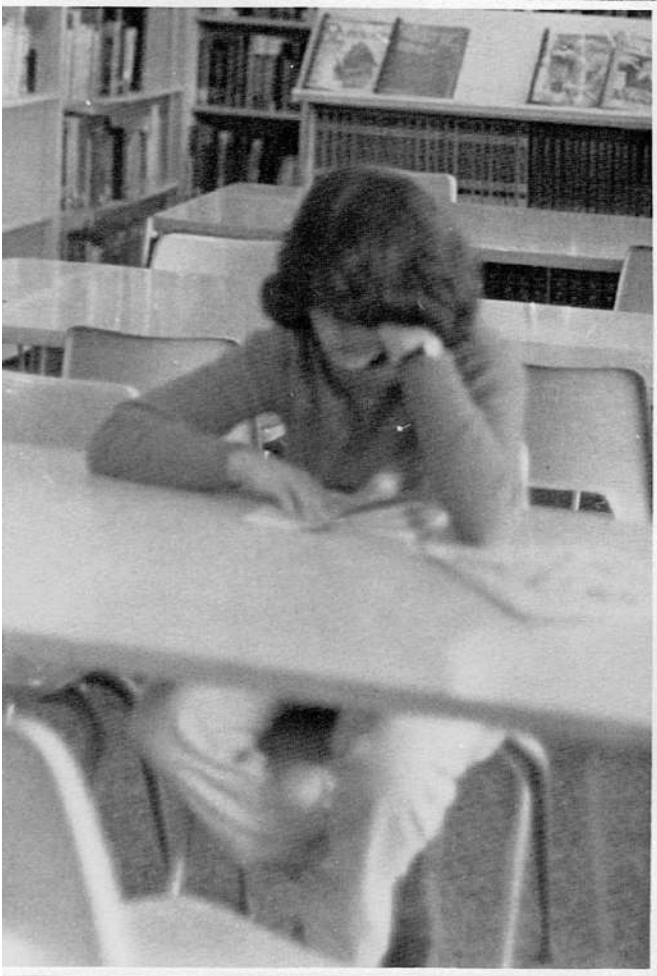

## Council Leads Quiet Year

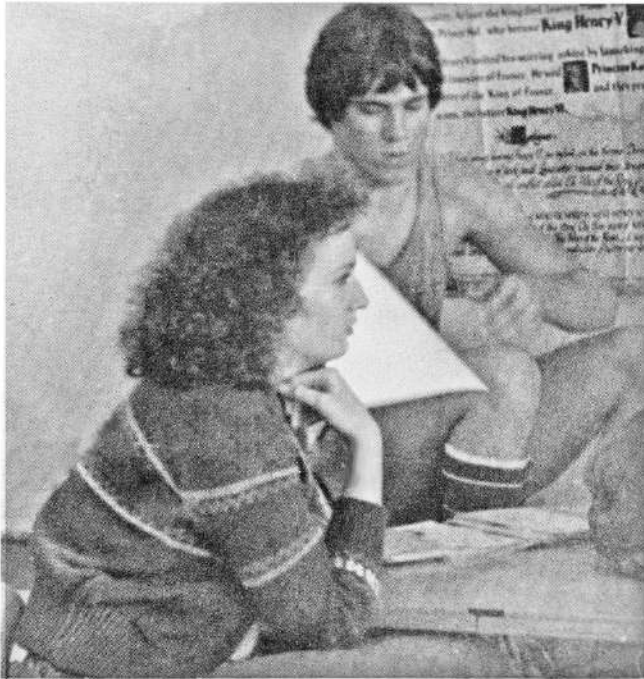

The Future Business Leaders of America is one of the more active clubs in our school. It has the largest memberships of any club here at Pacific.

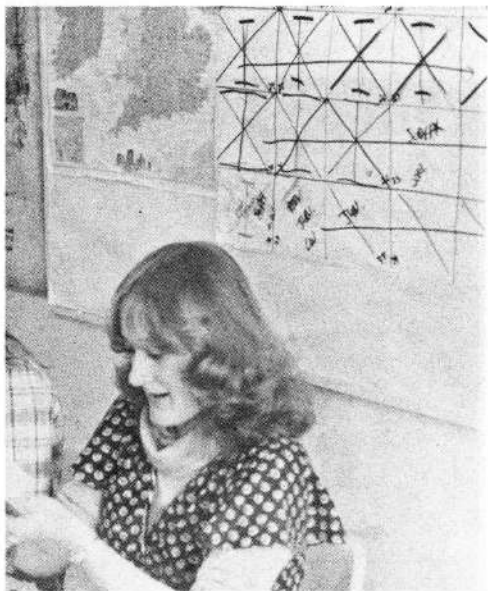
The main purpose of the club is to make better business leaders of its members, and prepare them for the future.

This year the class got off to a slow start, but by the end of the year had everything running smoothly.

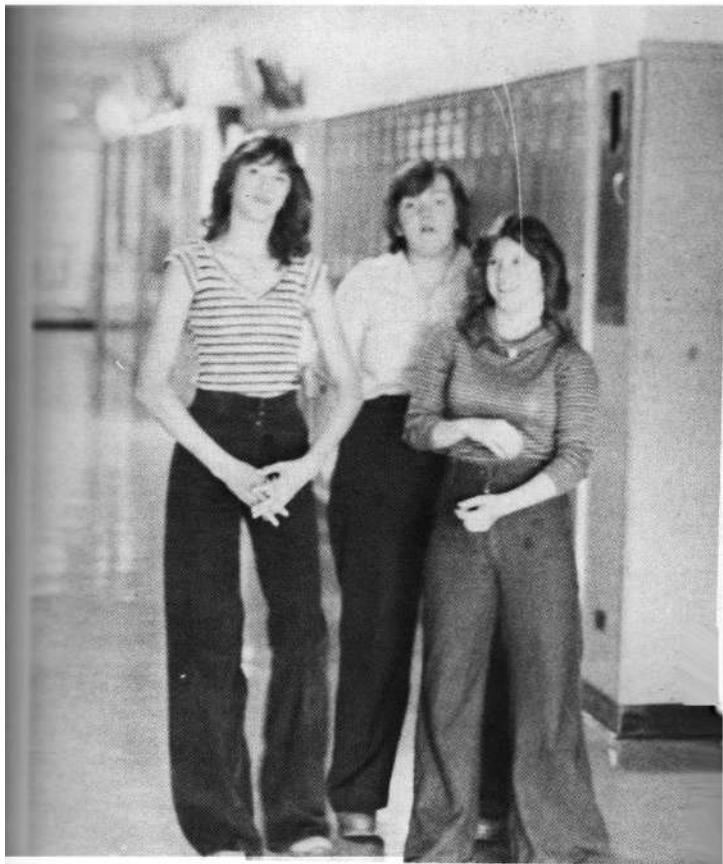

During this week the counselors had several field trips to study plants, animals, and water-related organisms. There were about eight students in each cabin and many new friendships were developed.

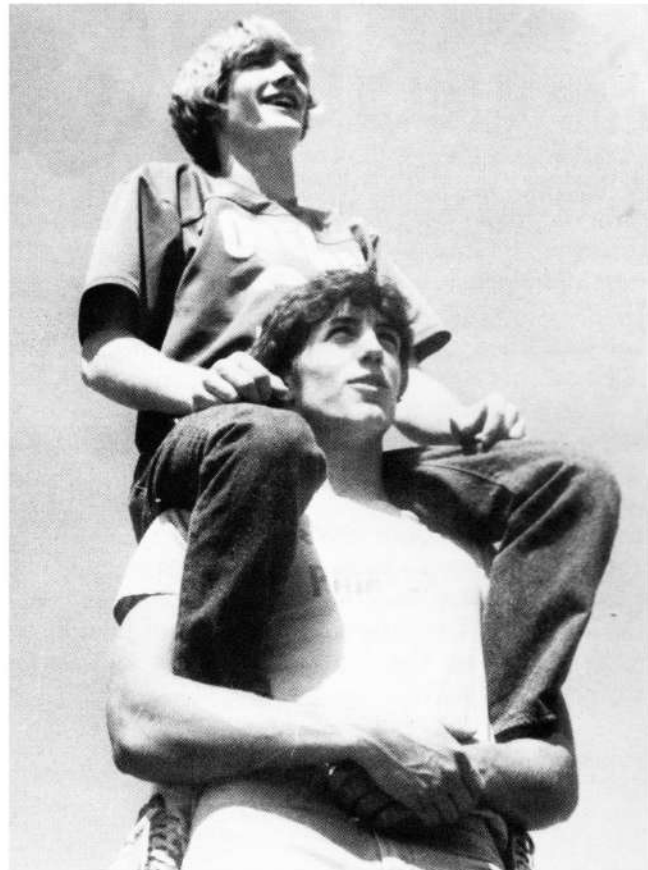

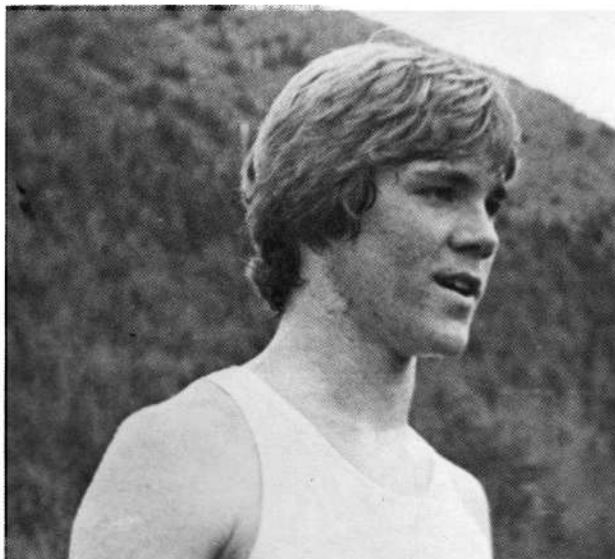
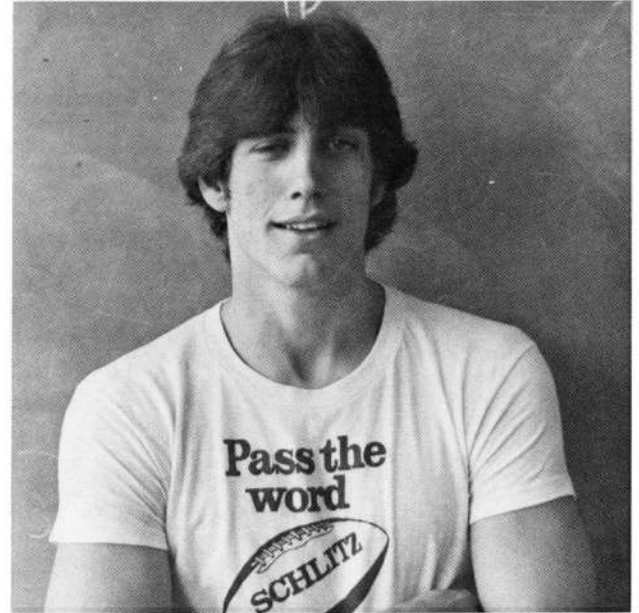

This years seniors carried the victory, placing first in most events, with Juniors, second; sophomores, third; and Freshmen, fourth.

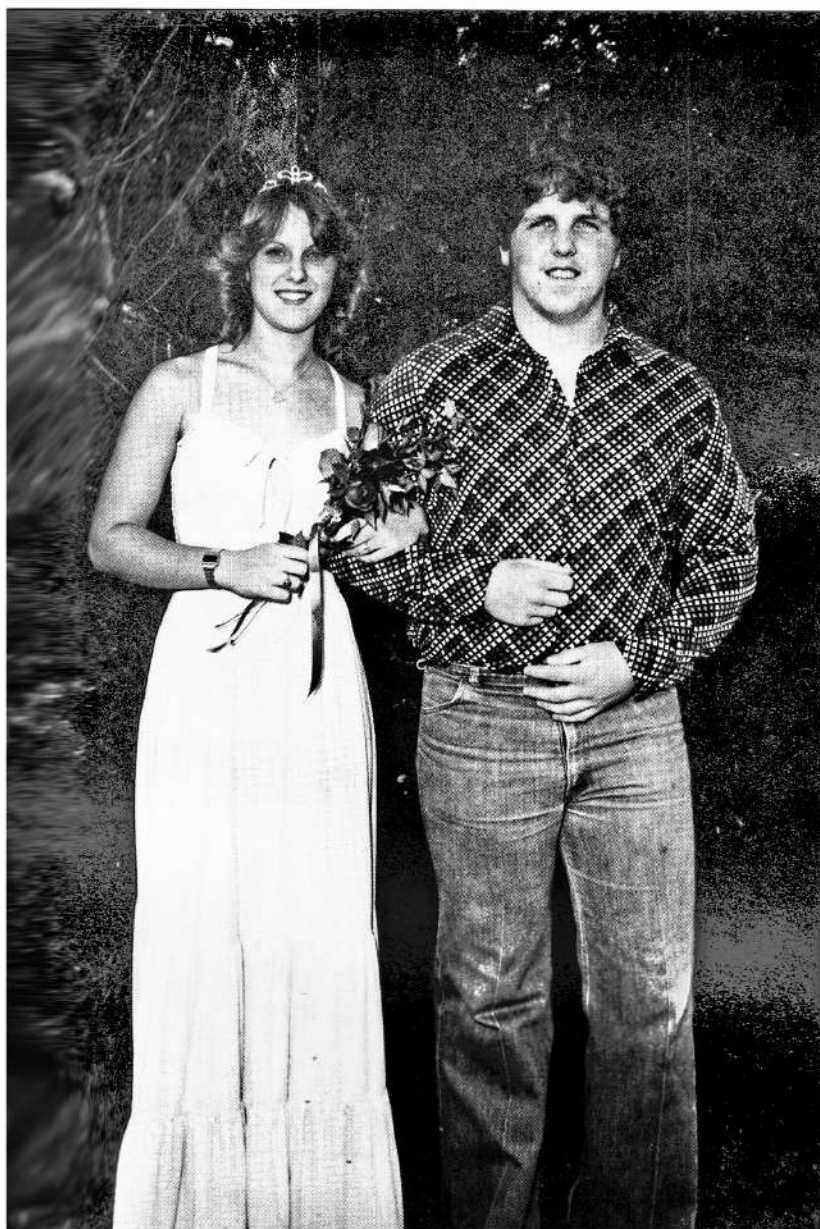

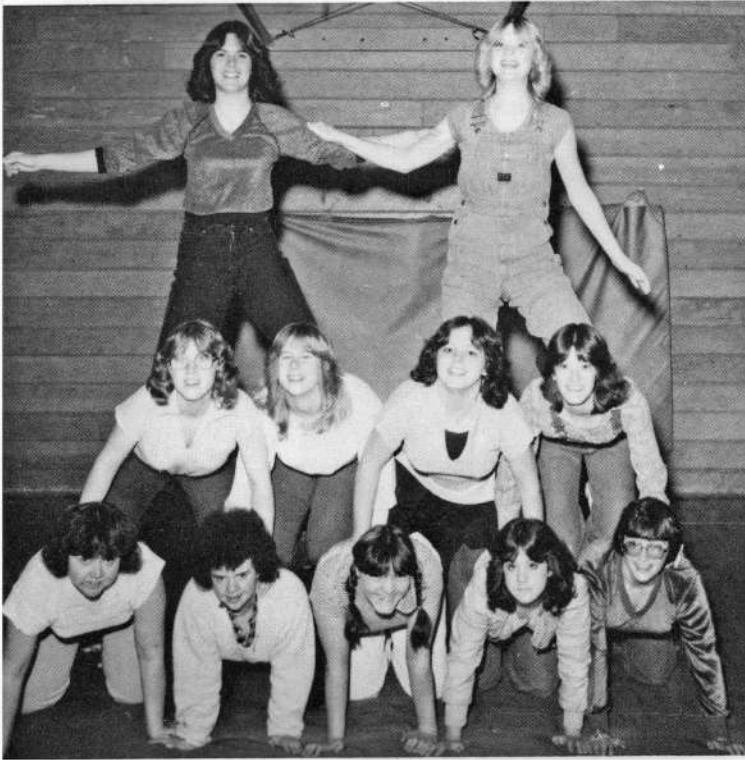


This year's wrestling team at Pacific High School did not do particularly well, although individual participants greatly improved during the season and were tough competition in some of the meets.

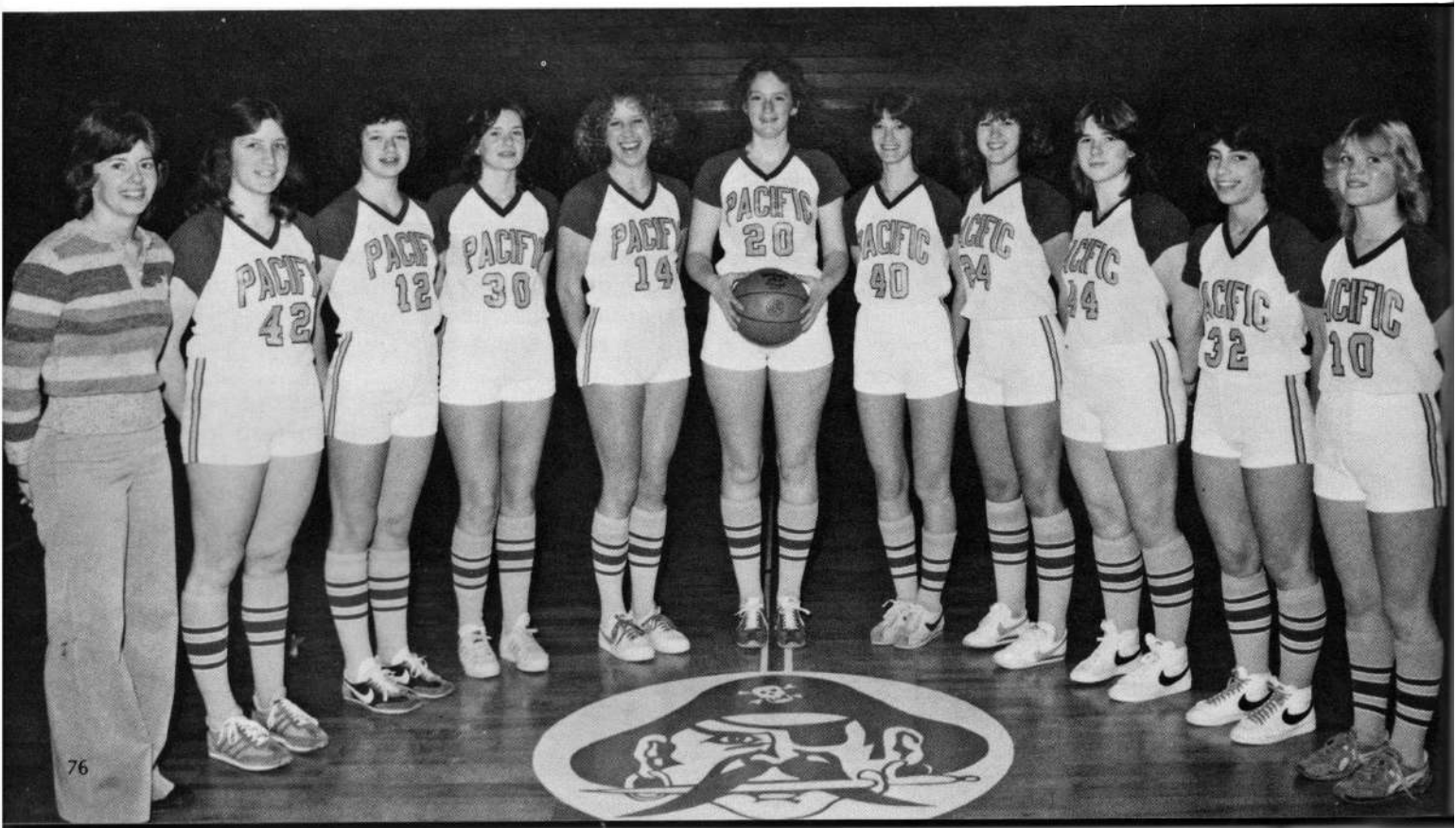

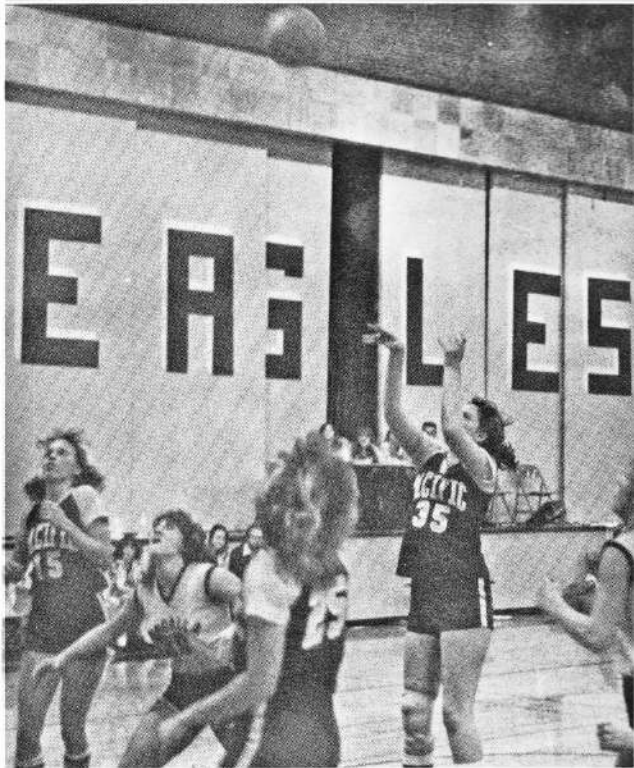

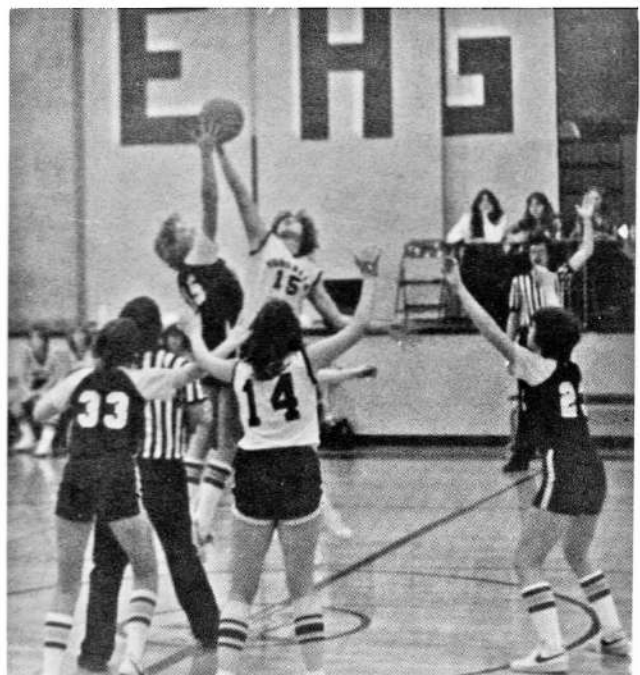
## Varsity Has Good Season With New Coach

Somehow chicken wire, poms, lumber, wires, flowers, (but not black plastic) crepe paper, fountains, etc., had been transformed into a delightful scene.

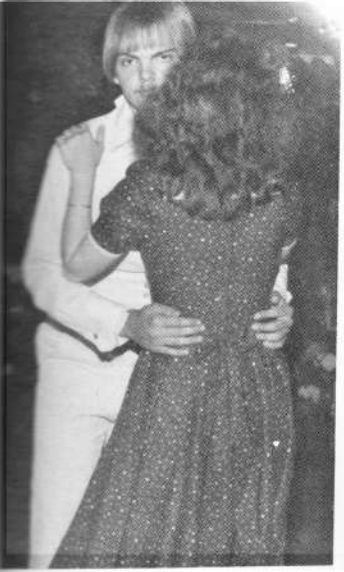
The band was Last Chance, a five-piece group from Washington. The theme was “Always and Forever”.

The salutatorian for this year is Betsy Marstall. She has maintained a 3.84 grade point average while attending Pacific.

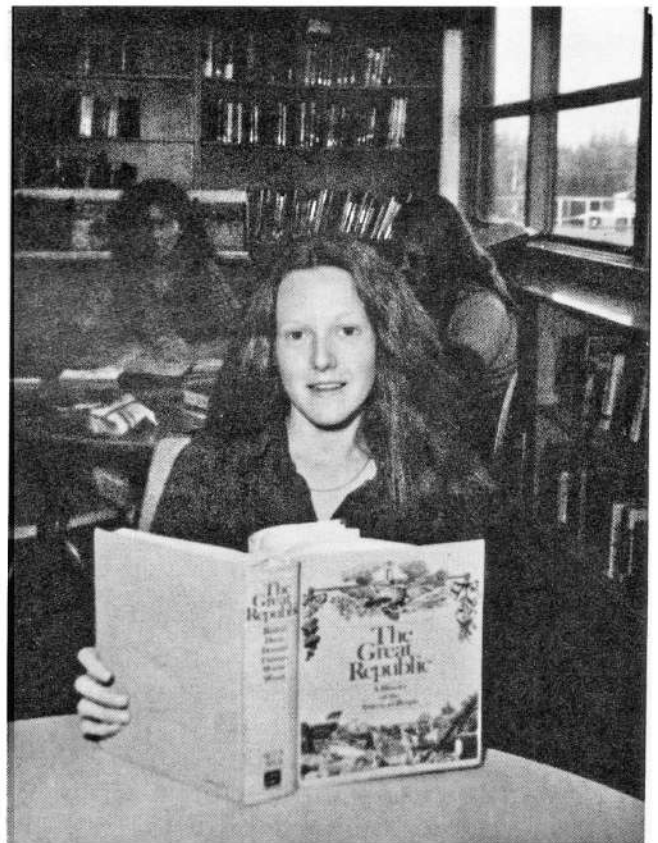
Among Betsy's hobbies are drawing, reading, jogging, cooking, and sewing.
