The Junior Varsity Volleyball team completed a year's experience with six players.

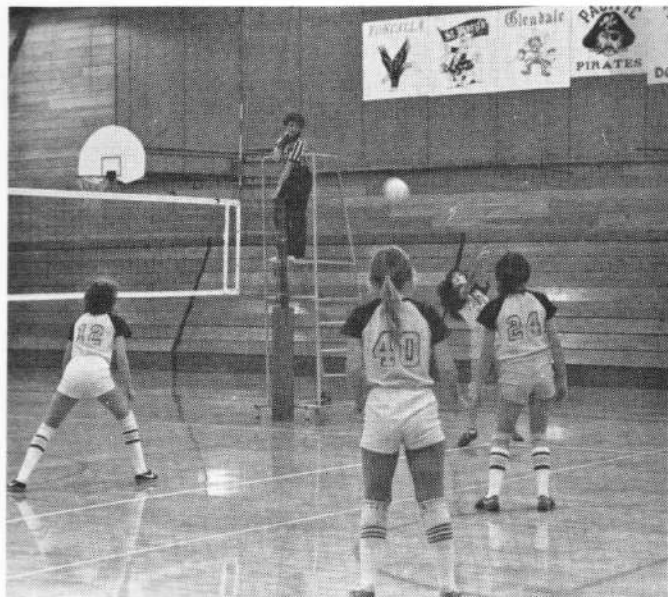

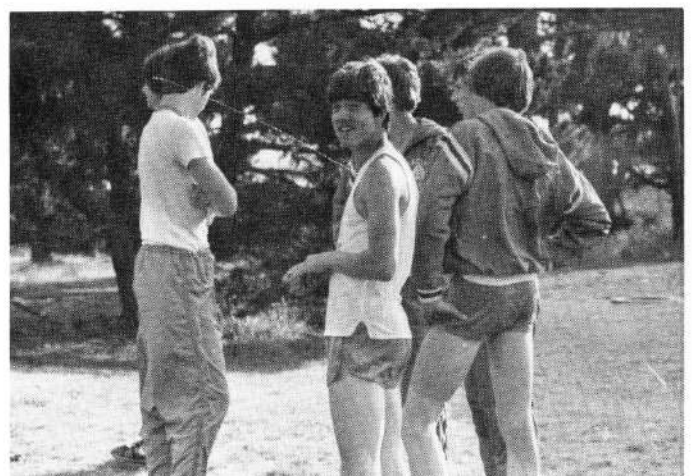
The girls were successful in making it to State, which was a big surprize and the first time in four years. They qualified by beating out Oakland by two points.

The team showed a great deal of unity and spirit throughout the year.

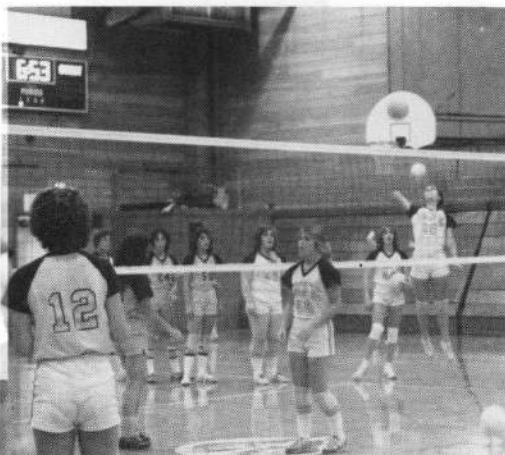
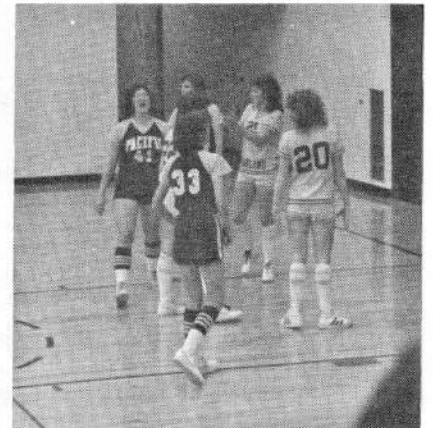
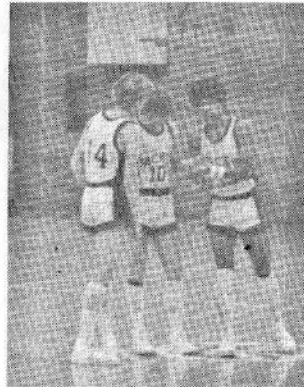
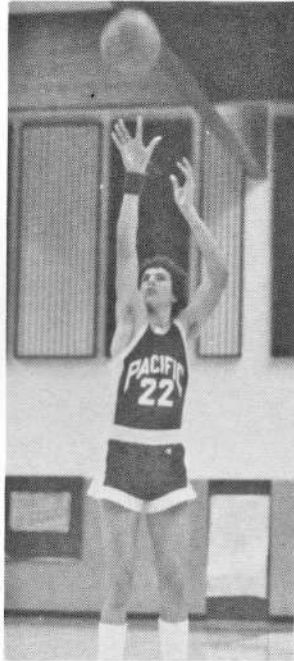
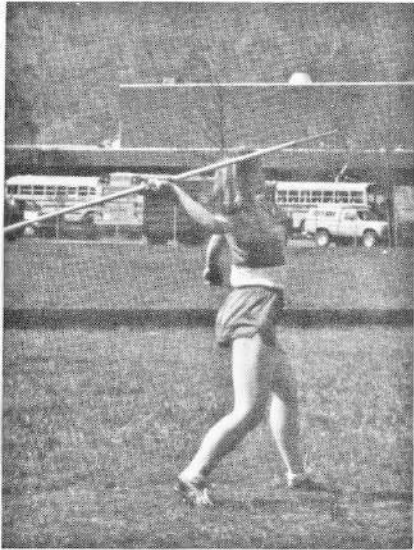

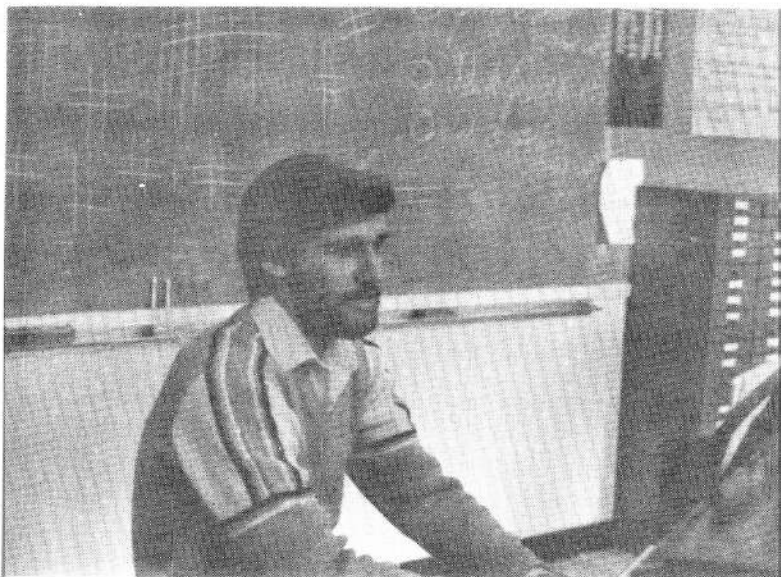

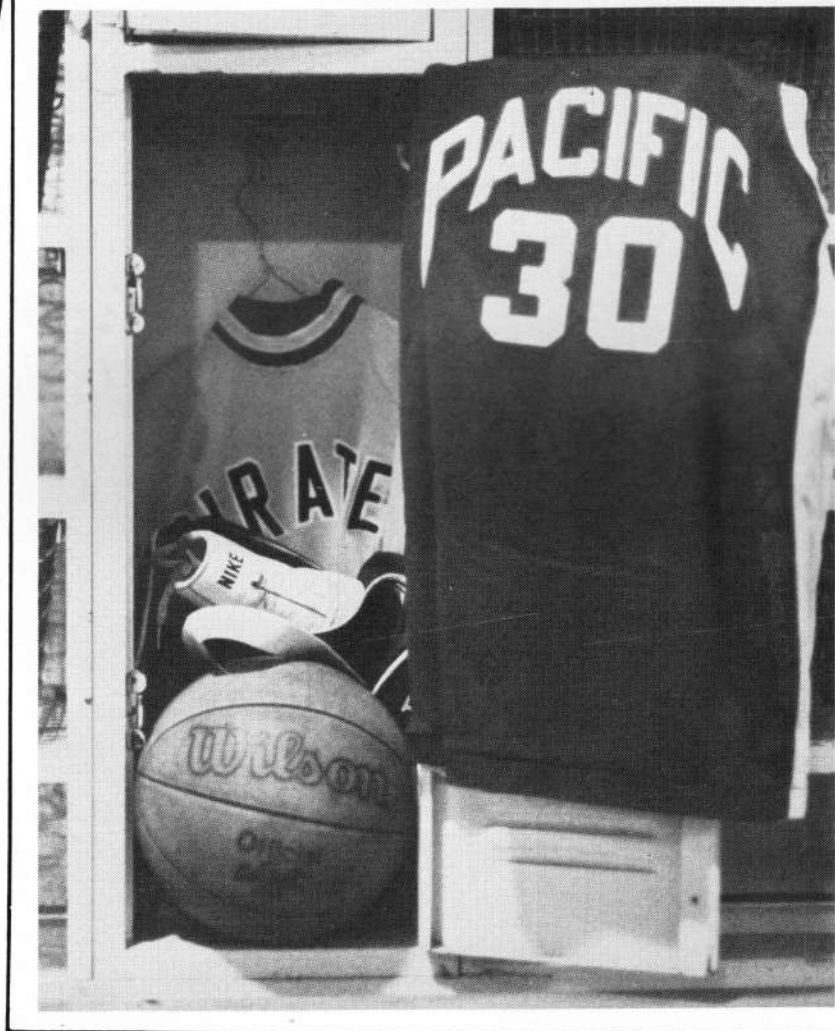
The Computer Club, named F.L.W.C.T. (Future Leaders in the World of Computer Technology) has tried hard this year to make money and also to change the image of the computer club.

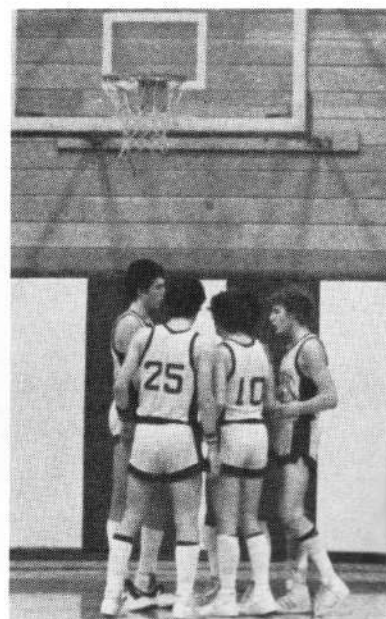

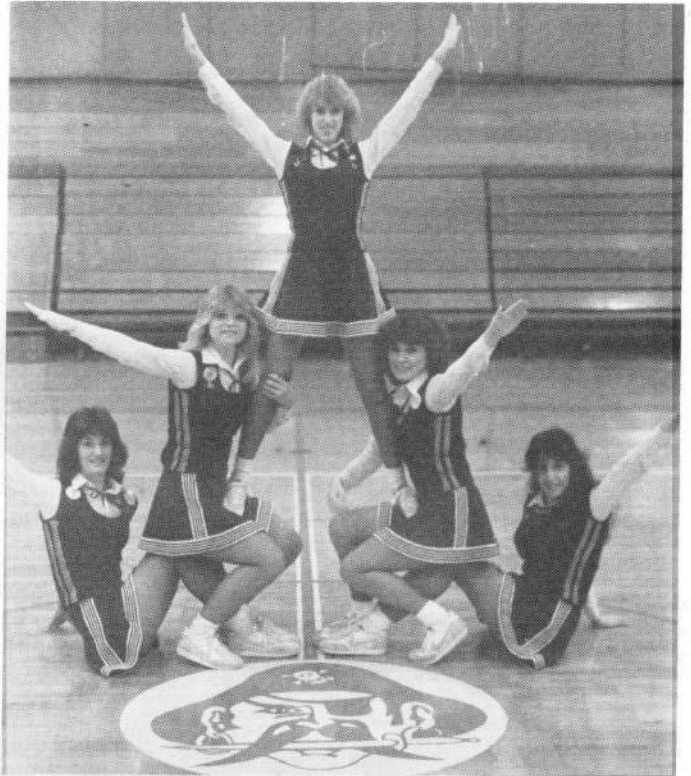


Pirates set up to inbound ball being thrown in by Sr. Dave Caughell.

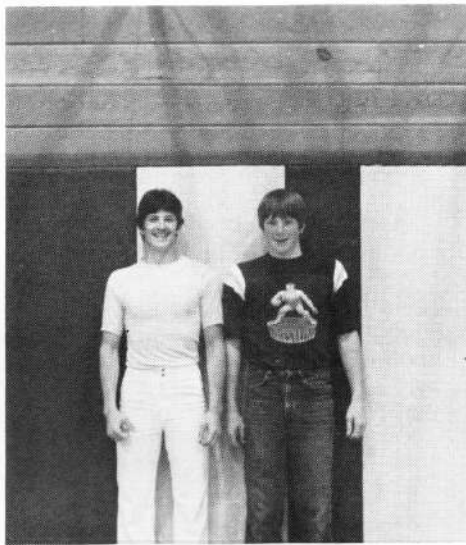

Homecoming week at P.H.S. this year was held during the week of January 24-28. There were a number of activities during the week which culminated in a noise parade.

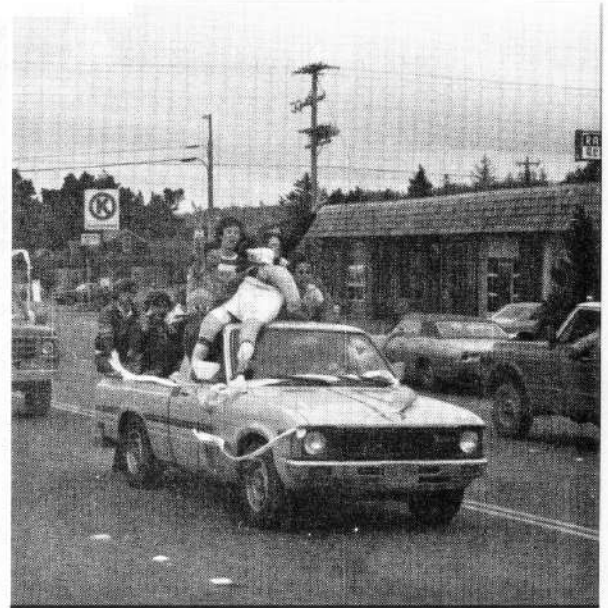
Each class had an entry in the air band competition. This was a pantomime to records. The Sophomores won; the Juniors were second; the Seniors, third; and the Freshmen were last.

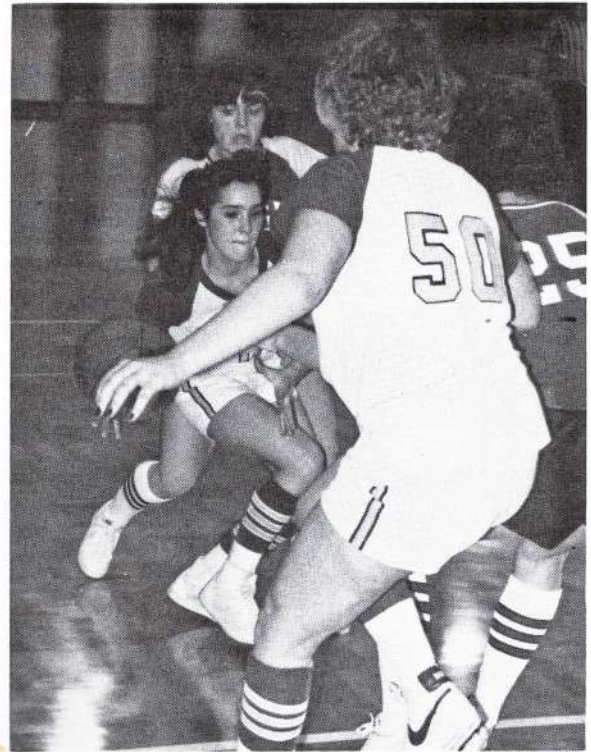
# Pacific Wins Homecoming Game

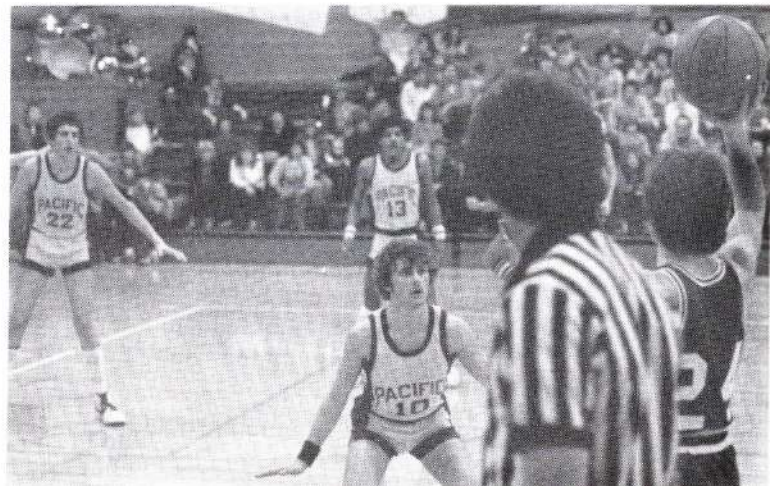

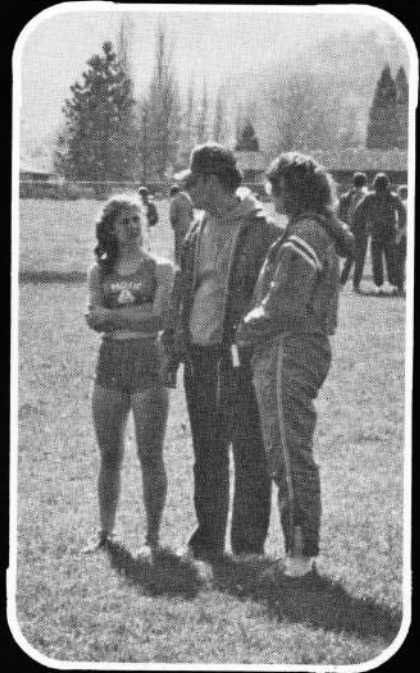

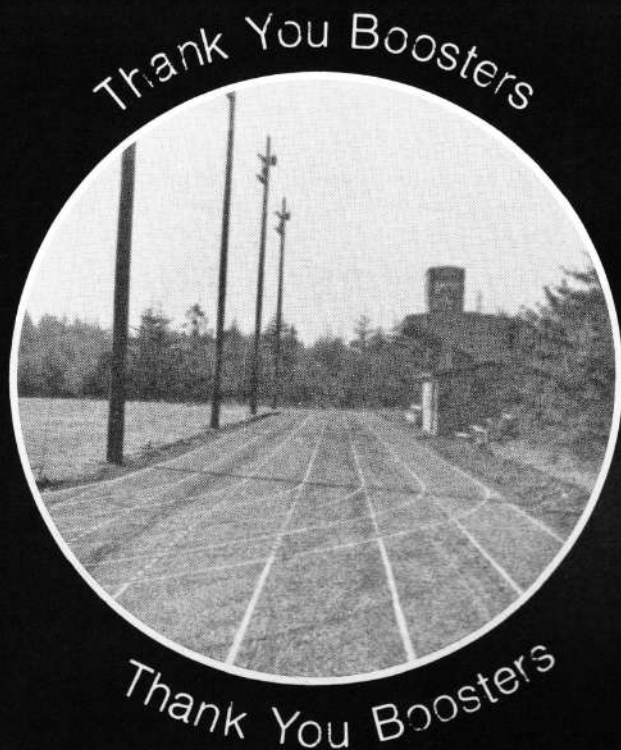

Unfortunately, at the time of writing this copy, the team has not yet competed at League, District, or State. If they continue to improve and compete as they have throughout the season, they should do very well.

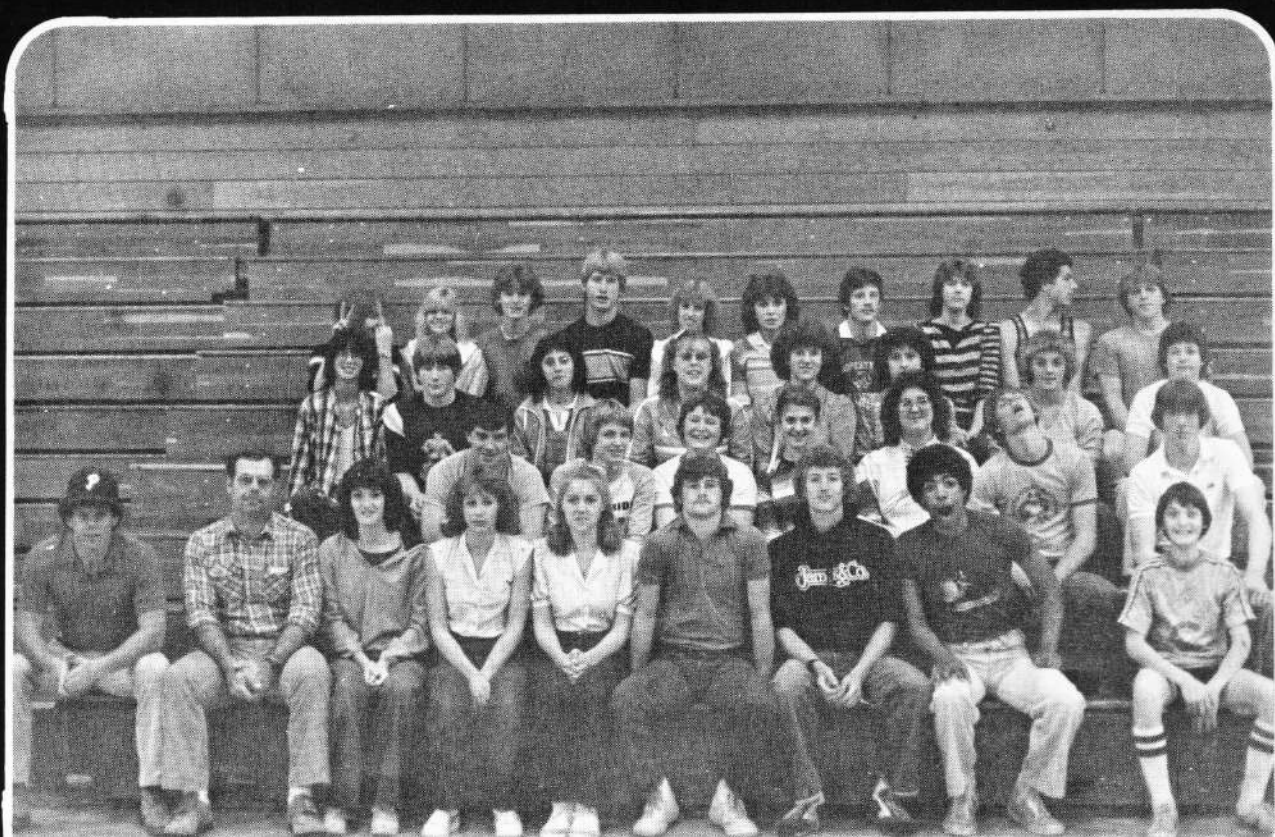

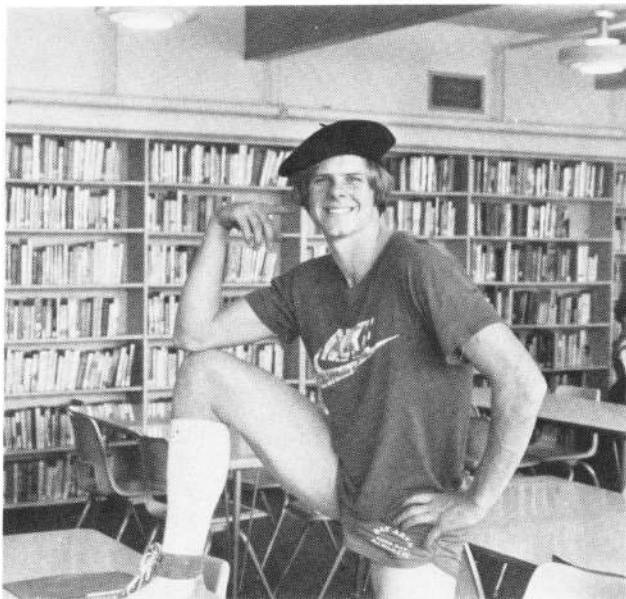
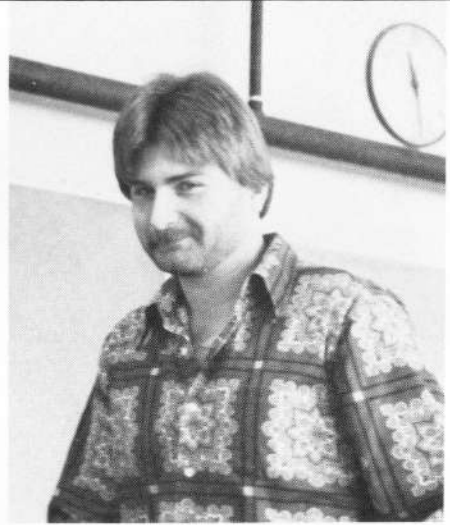
This year's baseball team had a rough season, with a young team consisting of only two seniors and the rest sophomores and freshmen.

The rainy spring made it next to impossible to play all the scheduled games, but the season went on and the team gained experience for next year.

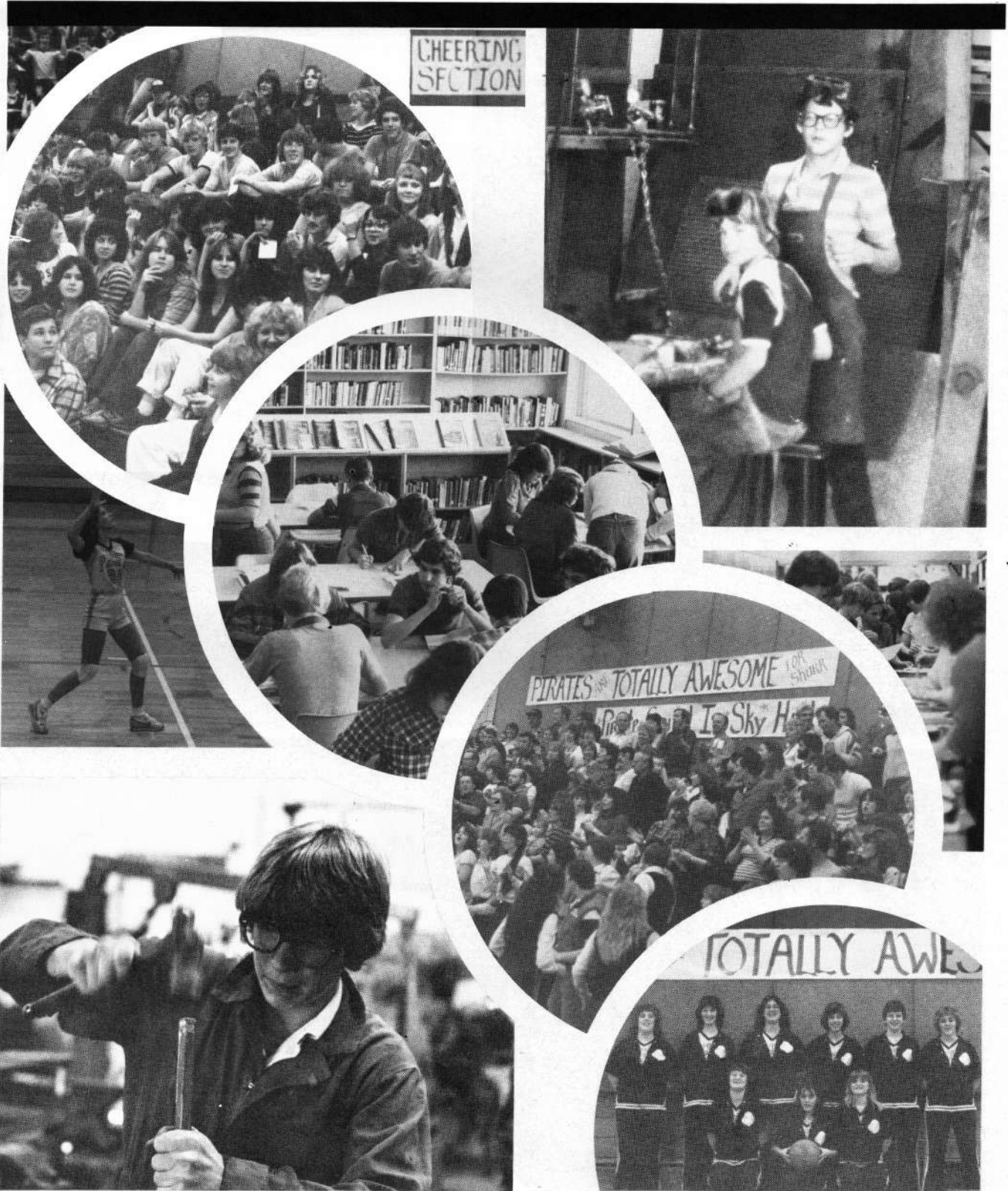

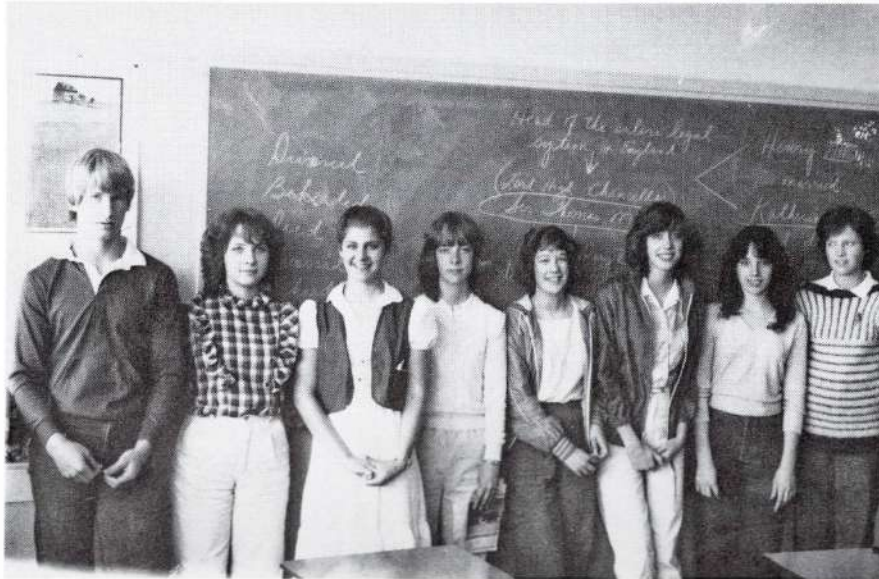

It was great to be in the class of '83.



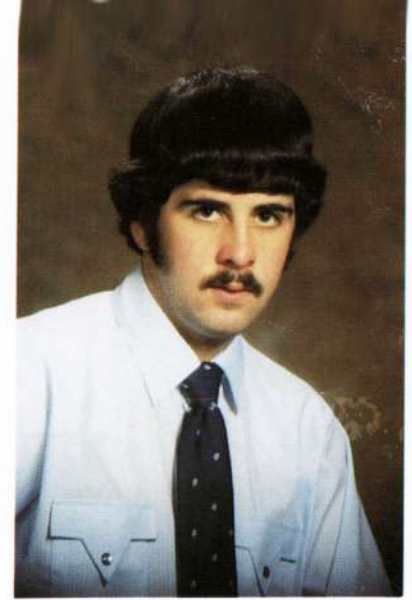
