And More Teachers

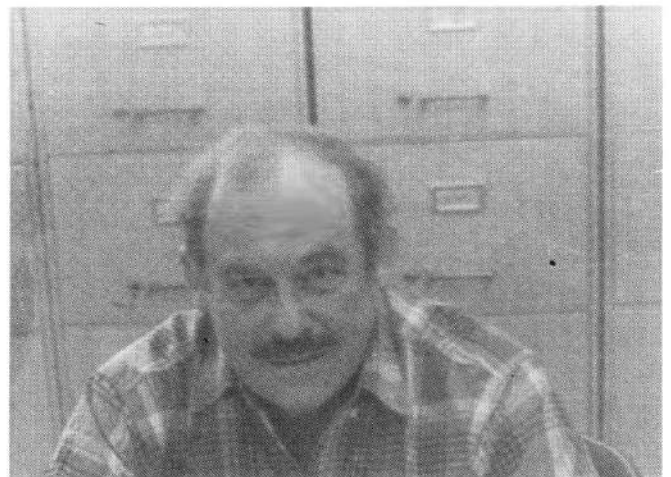

Among his hobbies he enjoys skiing and fixing his kids cars. His wife Ruth is a registered nurse at Willamette Falls Hospital.

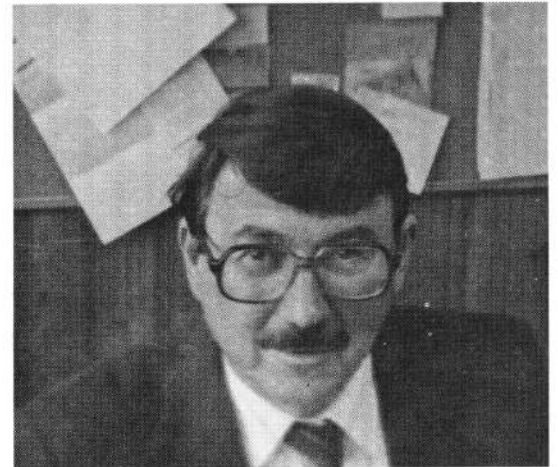
He thinks the teachers and students are incredible here. "The students support each other, and the teachers are very committed to teaching", he said.

Who's That?

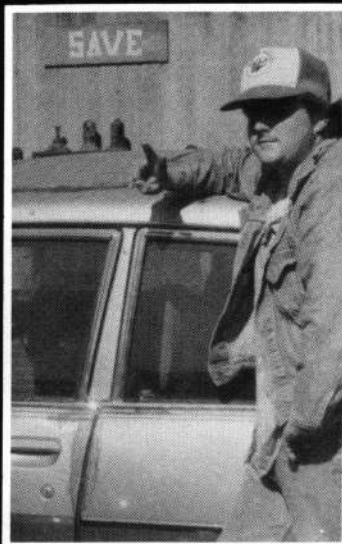

Honor Roll

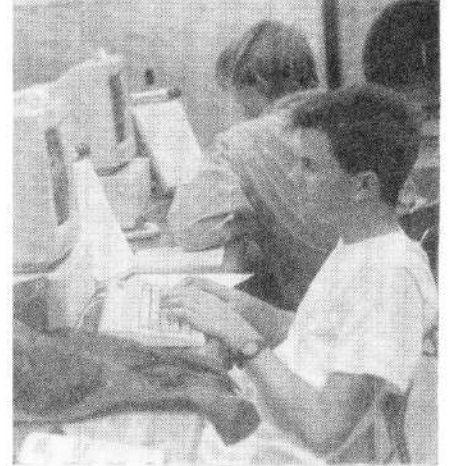

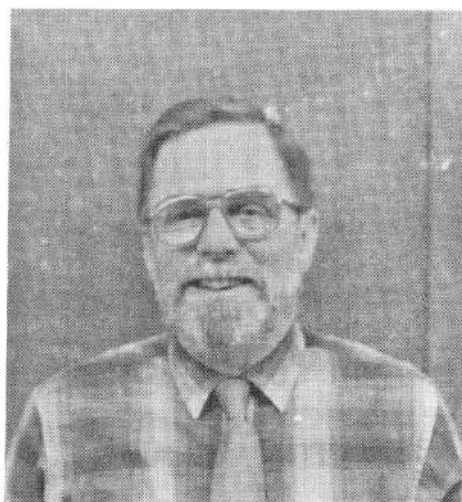

In order to raise funds for a number of activities, the members of the FBLA sold their famous hamburgers at a variety of school functions.

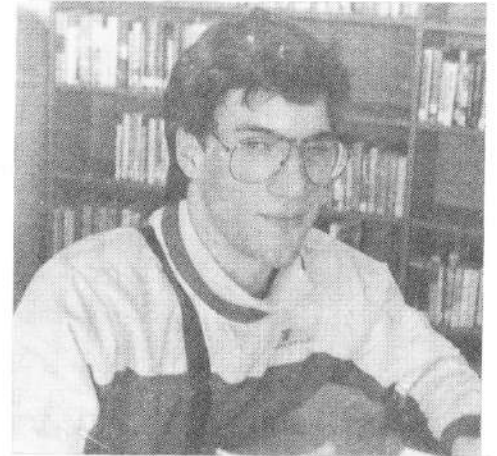

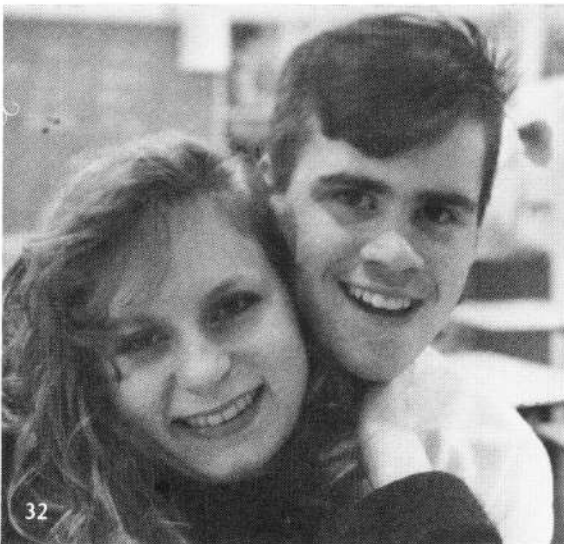

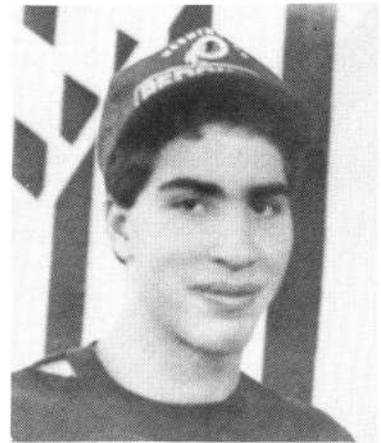

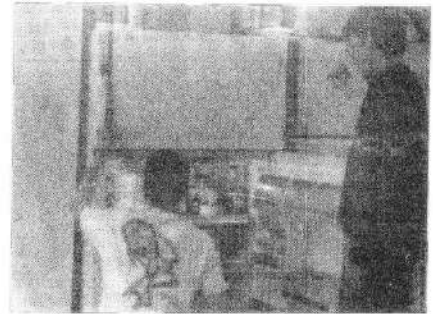
Foods And Crafts

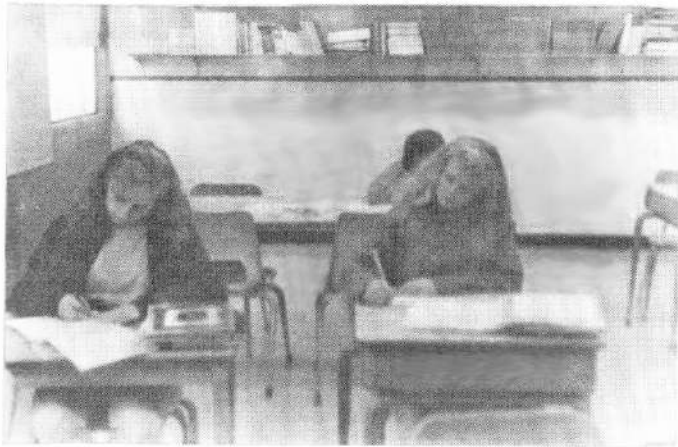

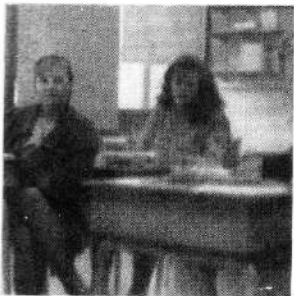

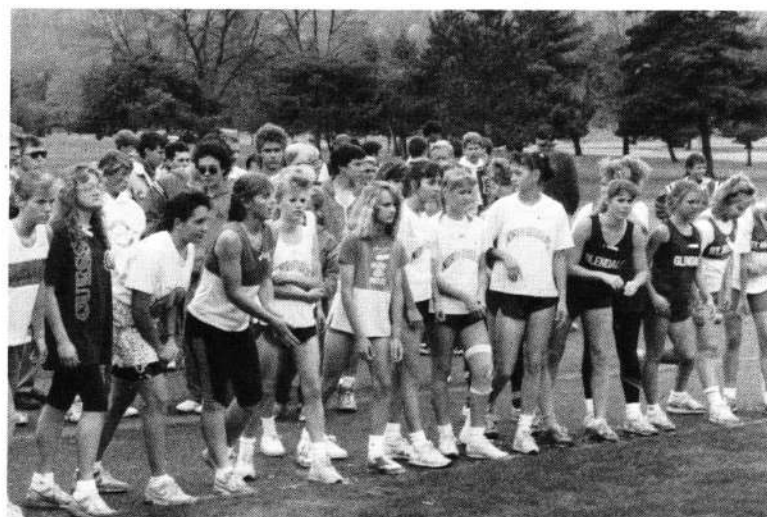

This year's Coach was Earl Lang. He led our team to its sixth straight district title in Roseburg on October 28. The state meet was November 4 in Eugene.

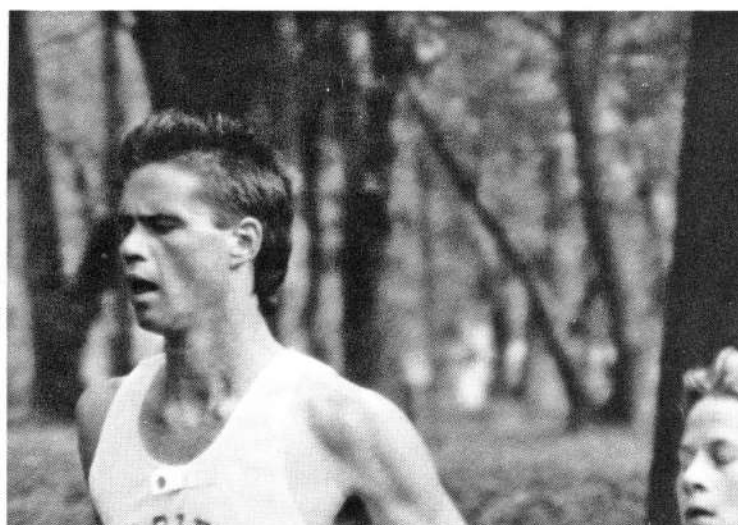

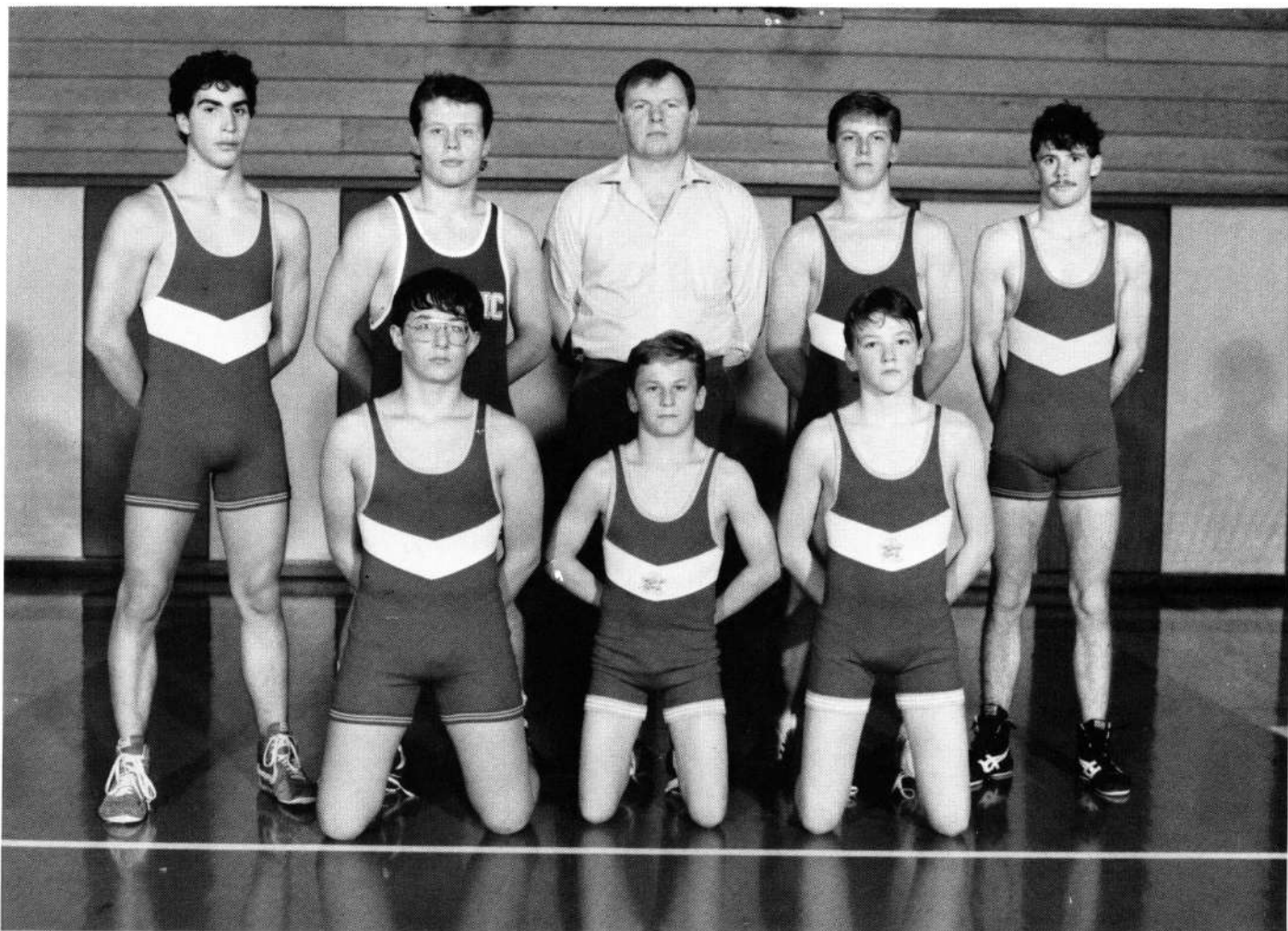

According to Coach Carl Wilkins, "Abble showed a lot of guts in coming back from a hard-fought loss to take his next four matches. He did a really good job."



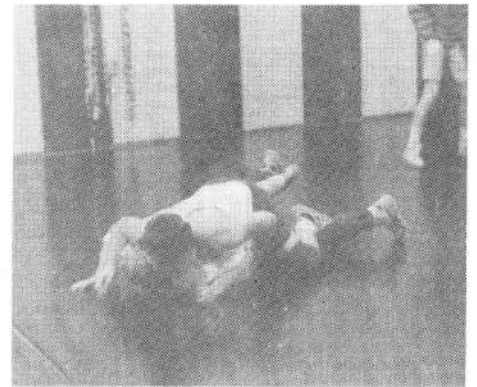

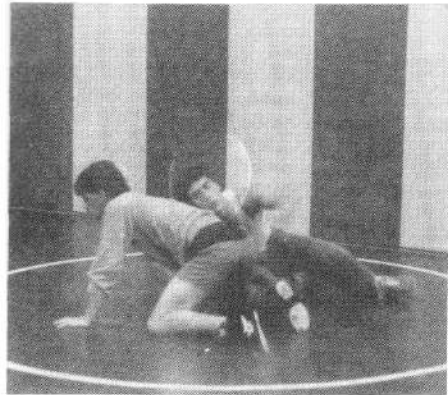

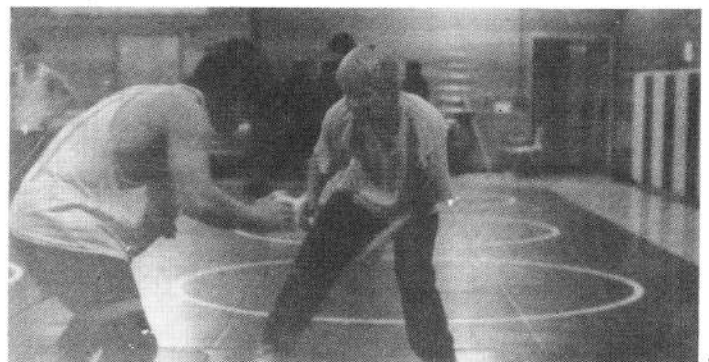

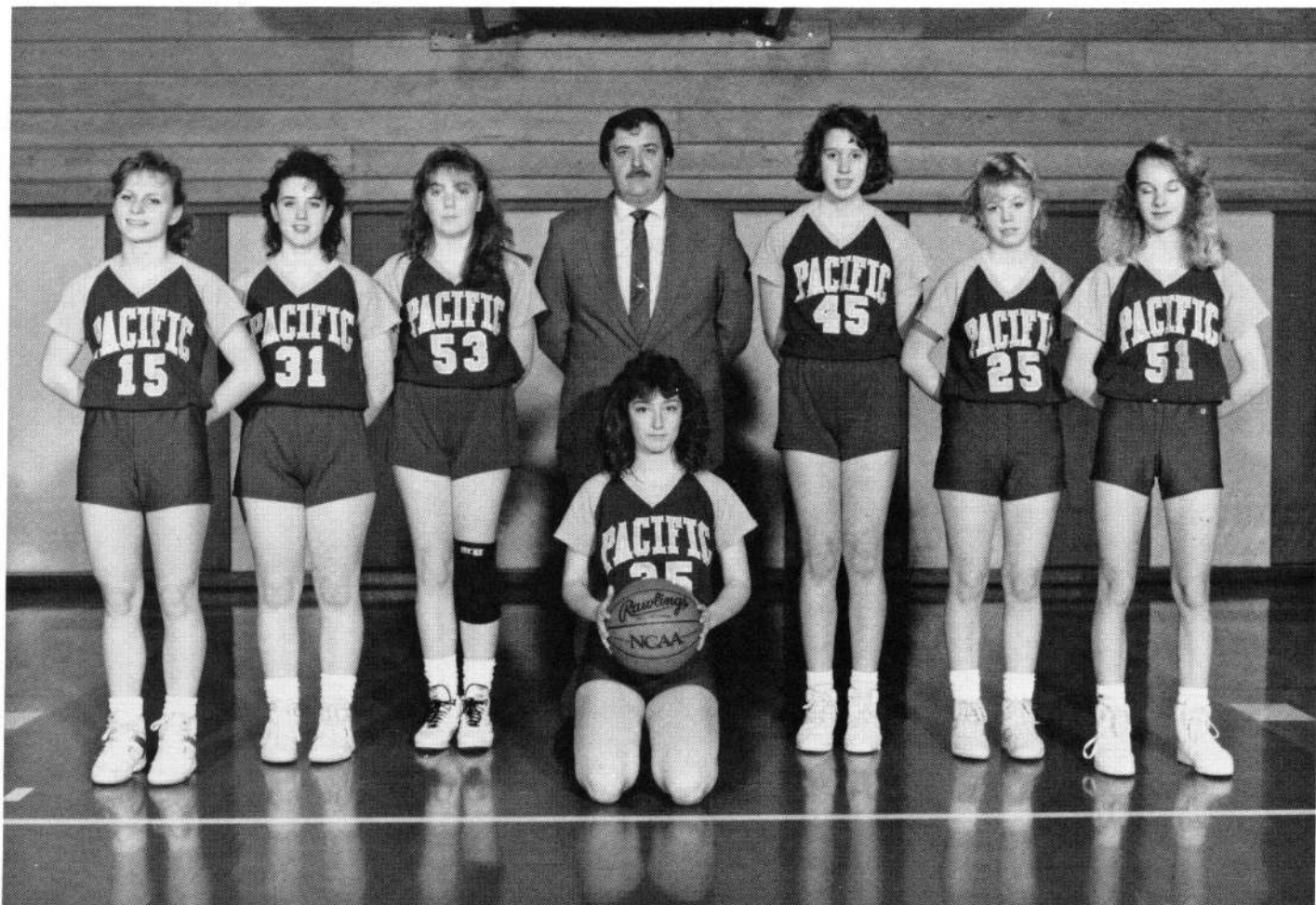

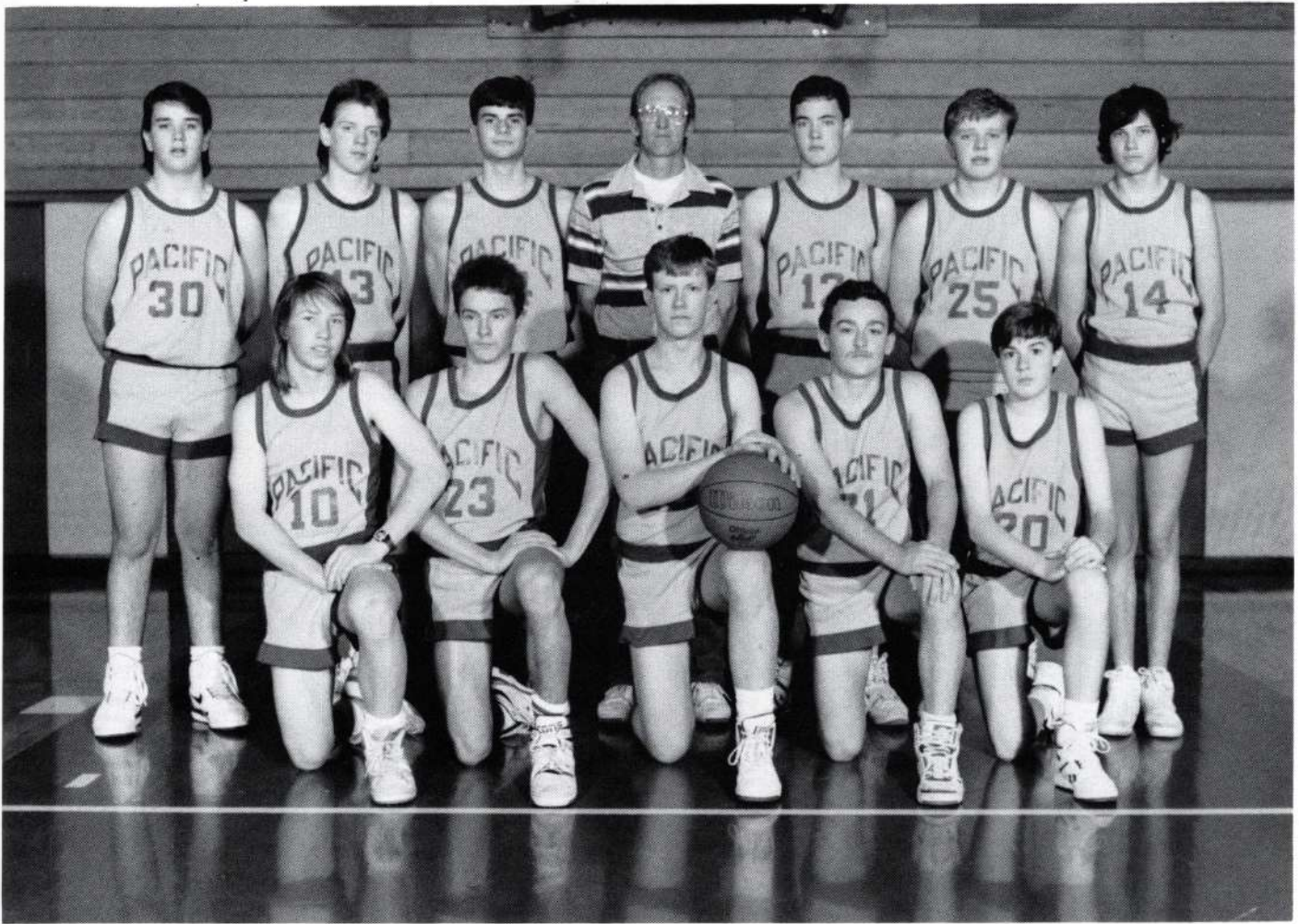

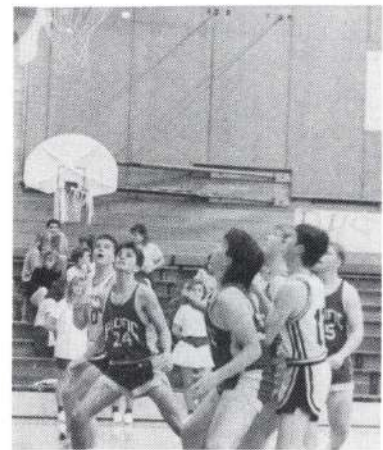

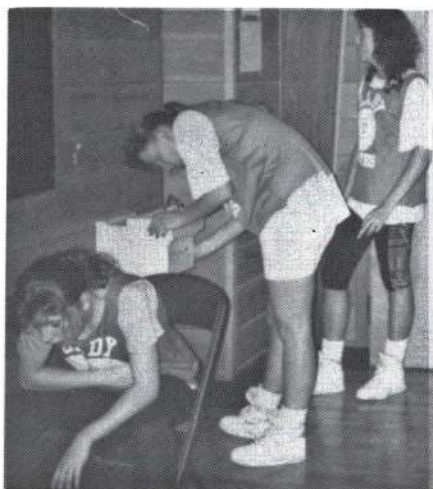

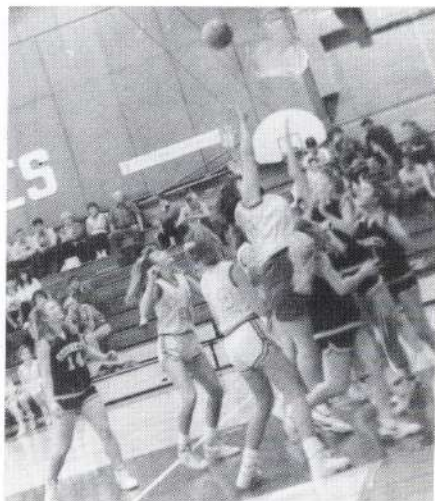

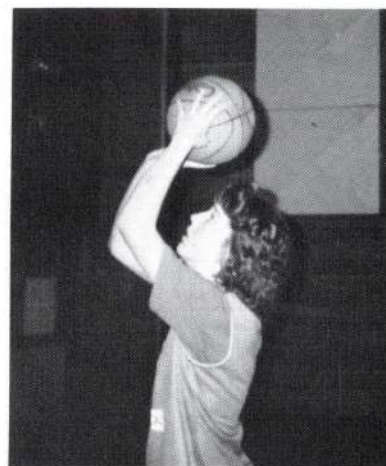
"Good Morning, Lady Pirates"

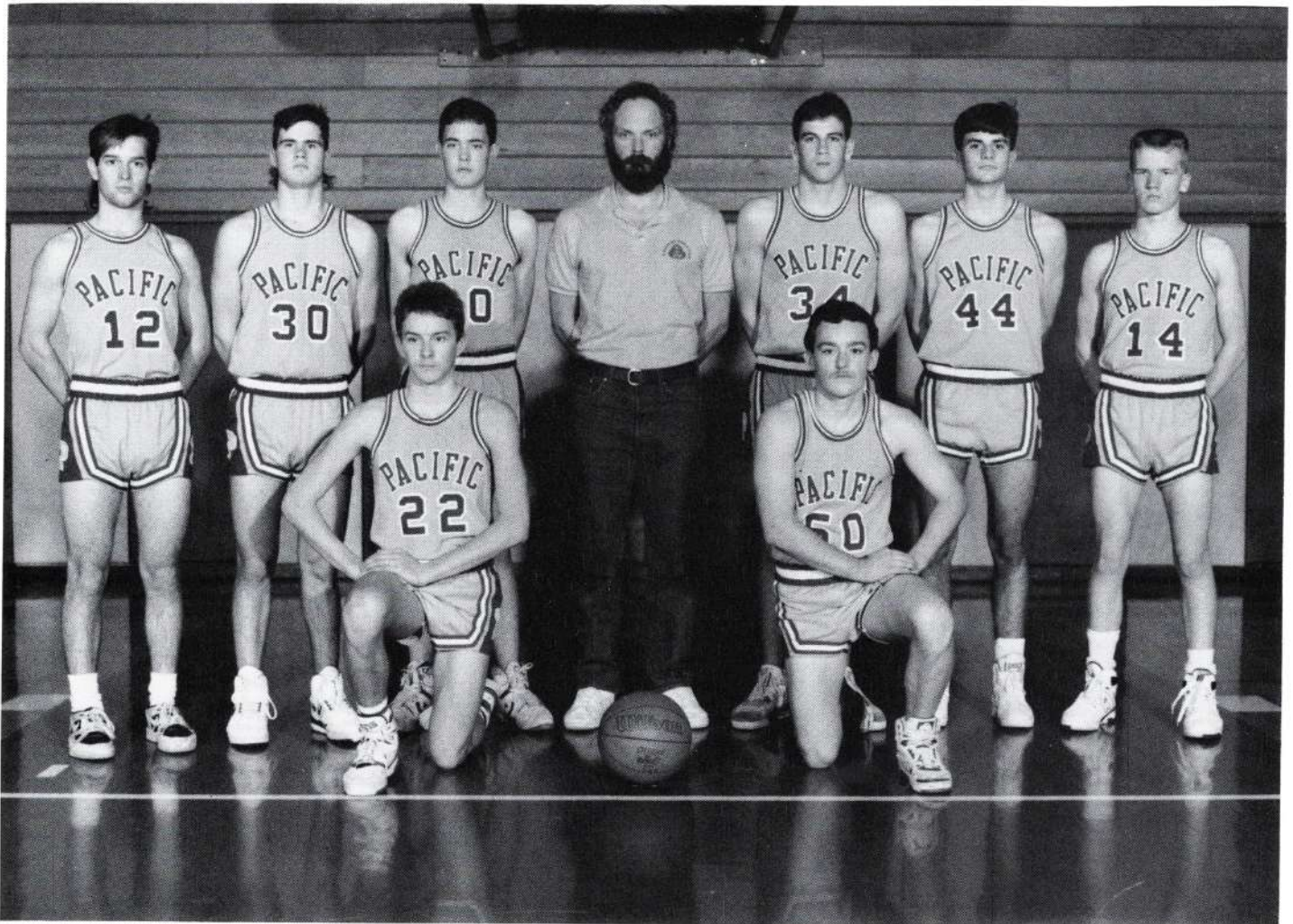

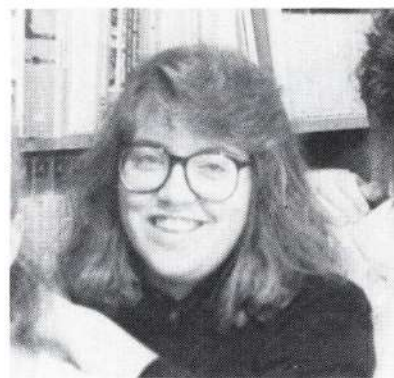

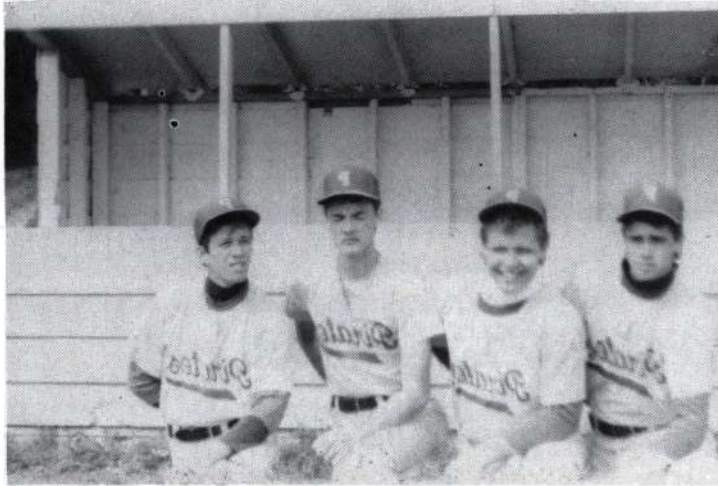
This year's baseball team played a full schedule of 26 games in mostly good weather. The players made progress throughout the season, and with eight freshmen on the team, the future looks bright.

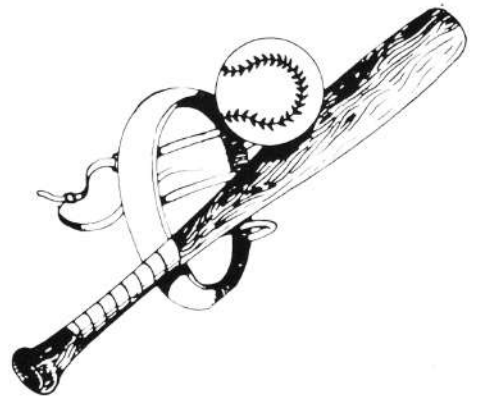

A lucky thirteen people made a trip to Ashland on March 14 and 15 to see two plays in the Angus Bowmer Theatre.

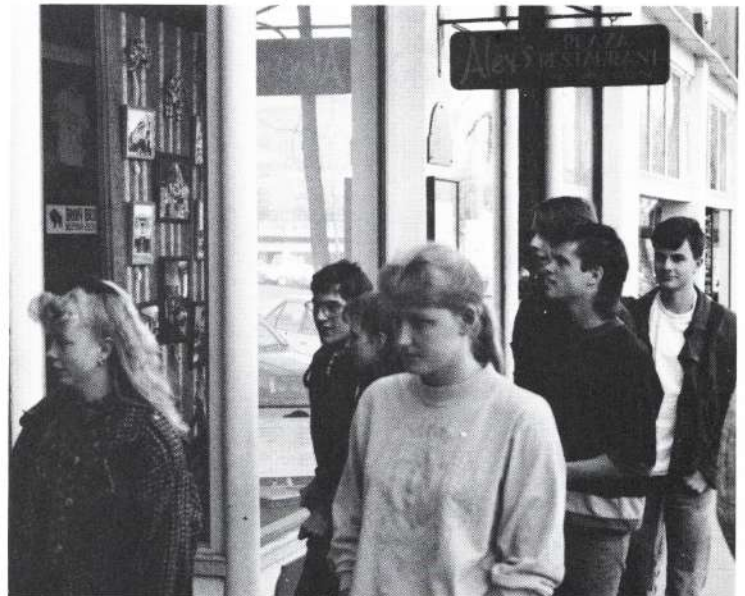
Students were accompanied by English teachers Dean Davis and Earlene Pritchard, and Don Kuykendall.

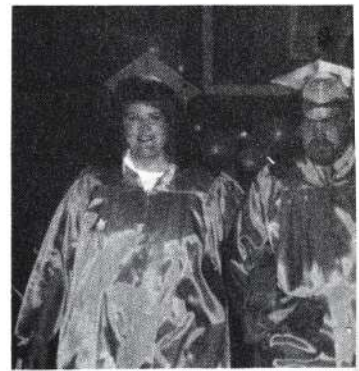
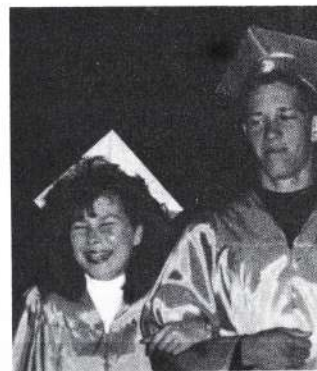
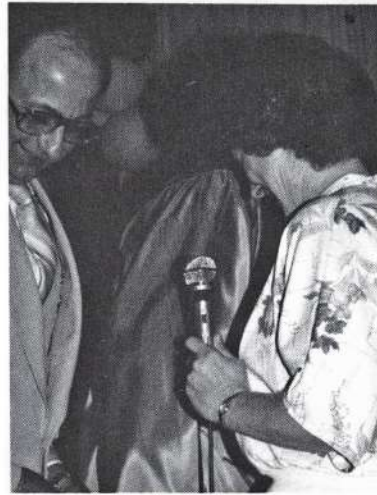
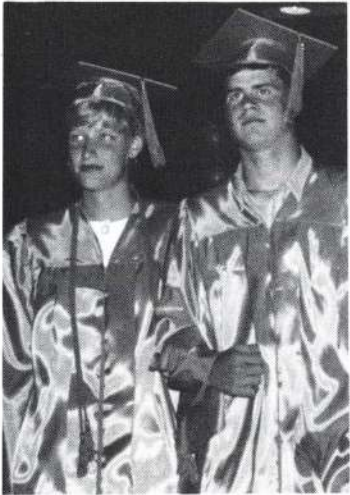


Graduation-'90

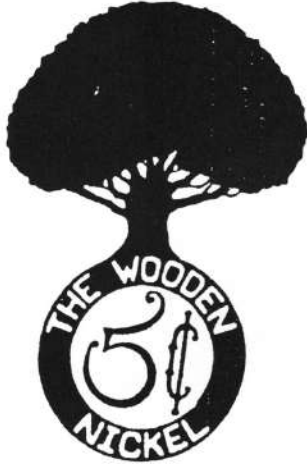

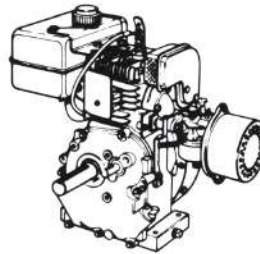

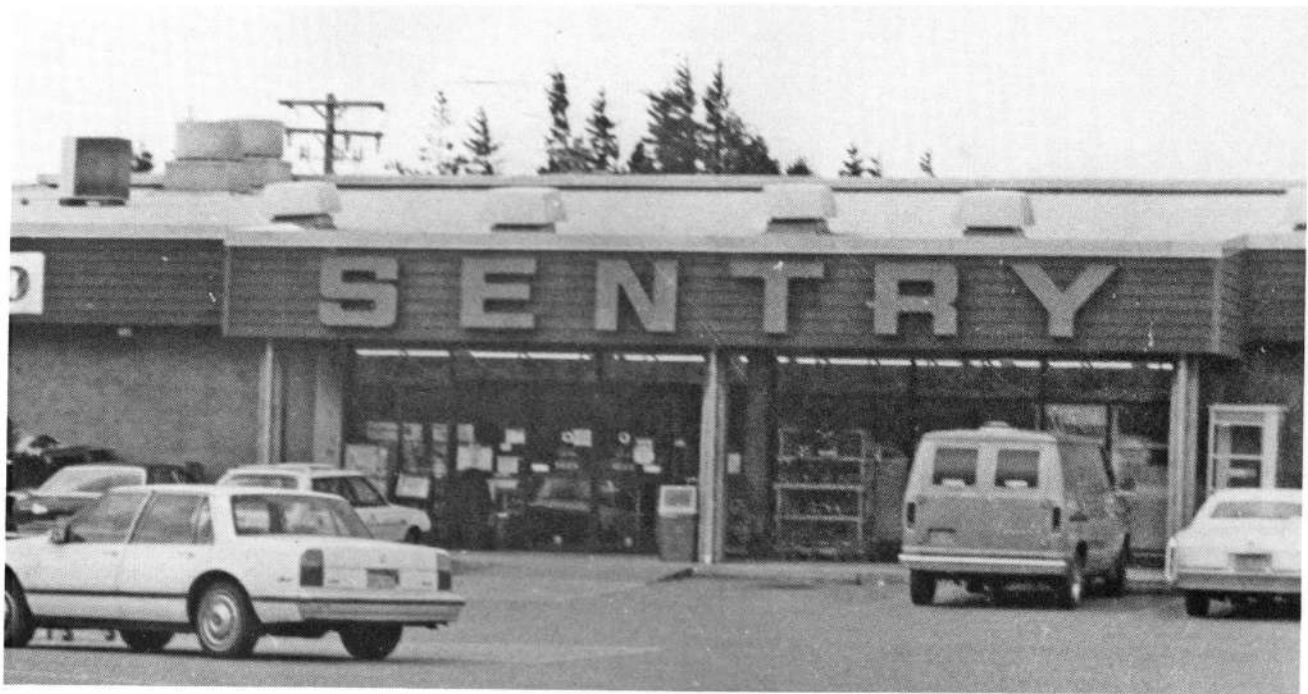
