How does one begin to say goodbye to Mr. Radcliffe, after 28 years in District 2CJ? In some way he is "Mr. P.H.S."

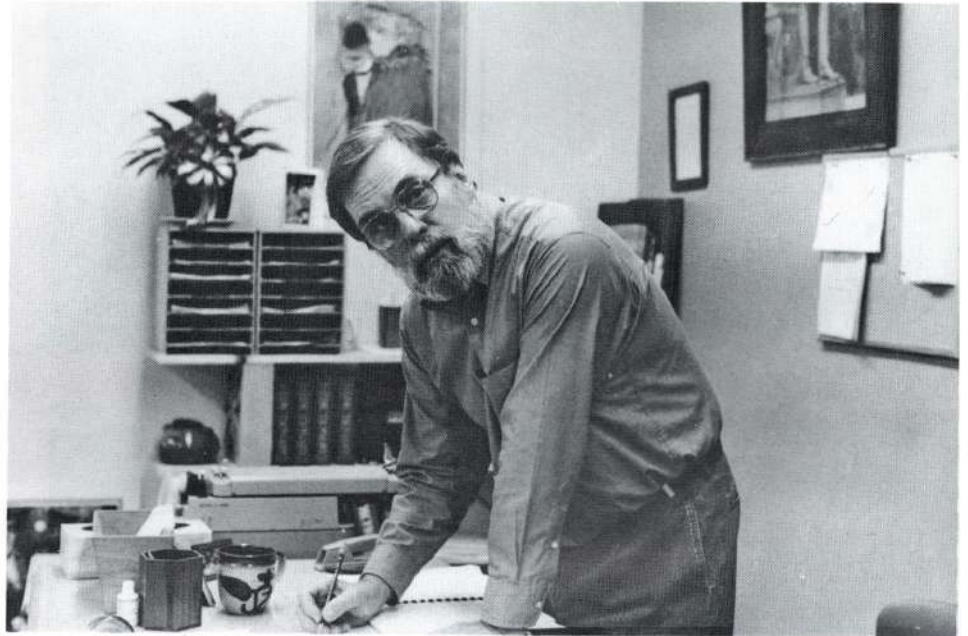

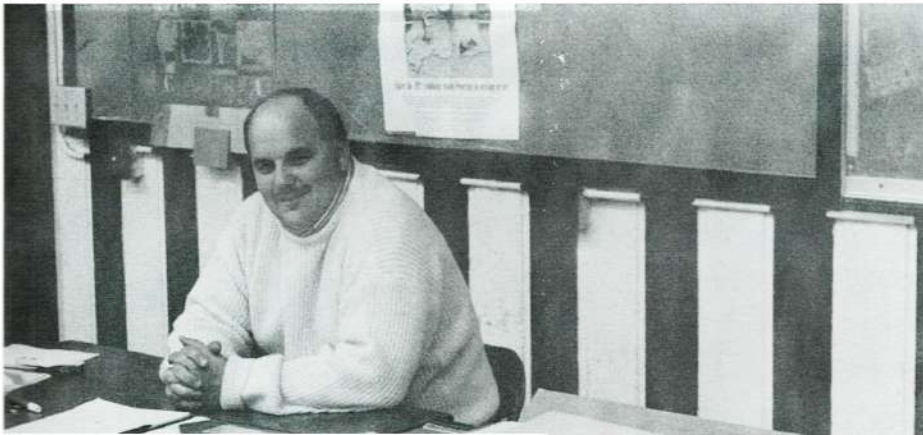


Pacific High

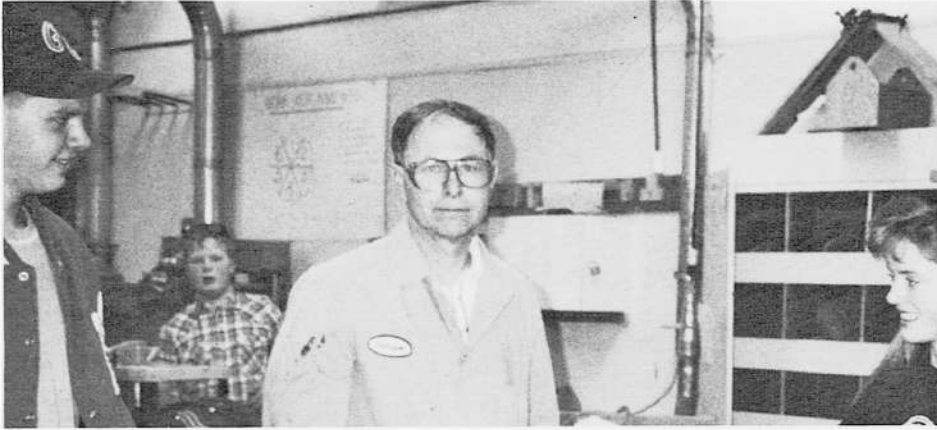

Though we don't often acknowledge it, we say thank you for everything you do for us.



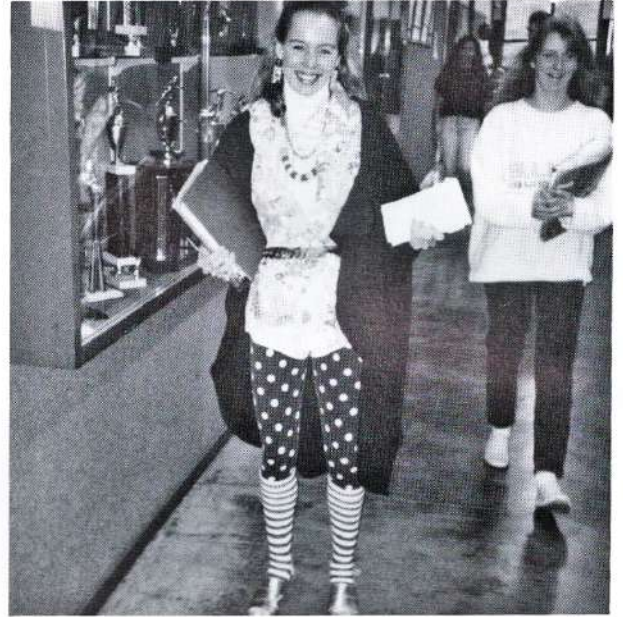
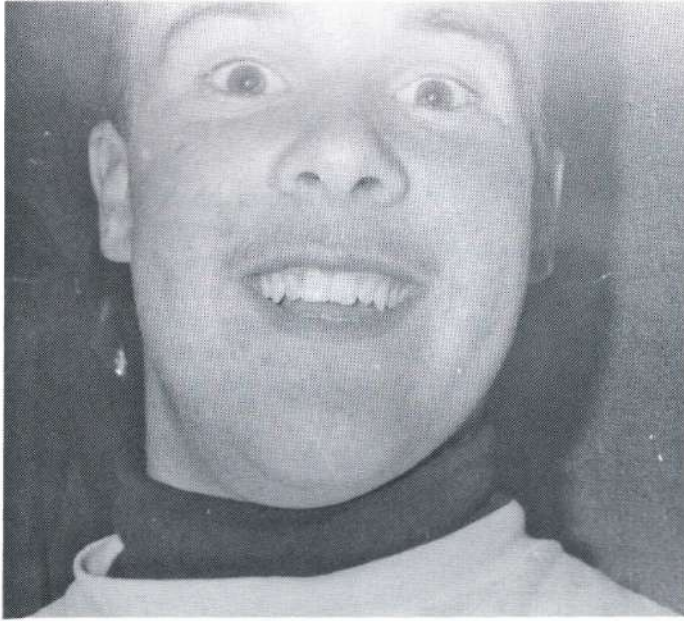

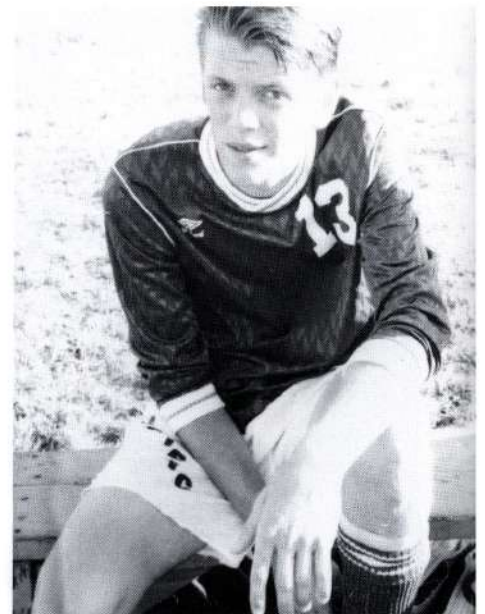

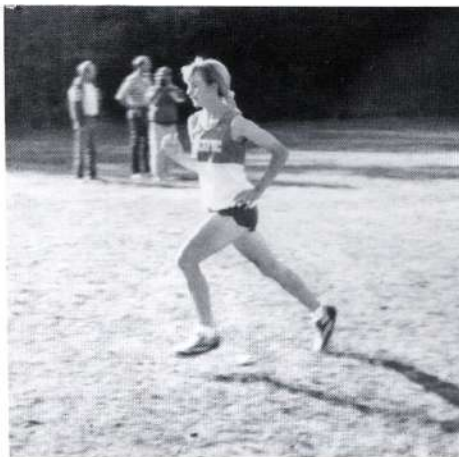

Pacific's team went to League in Medford and placed fourth overall. The team captains were Sundara Brookshier and Kris Gore and team leader was Shelley Pendergrass.

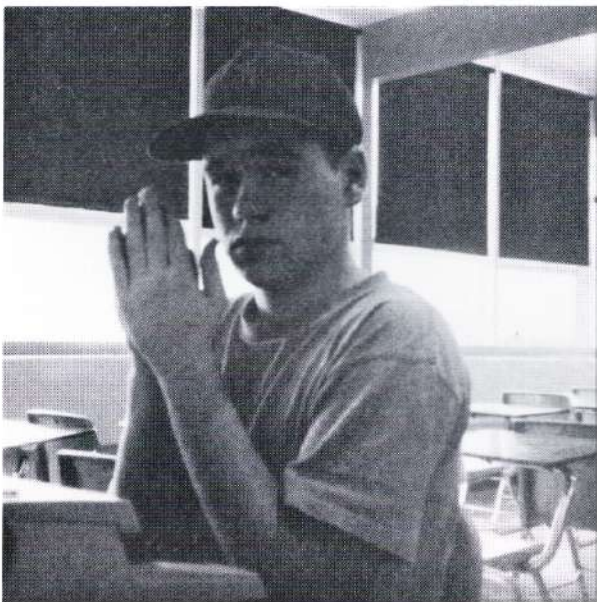
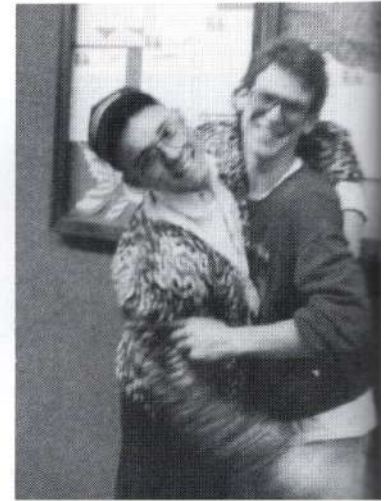

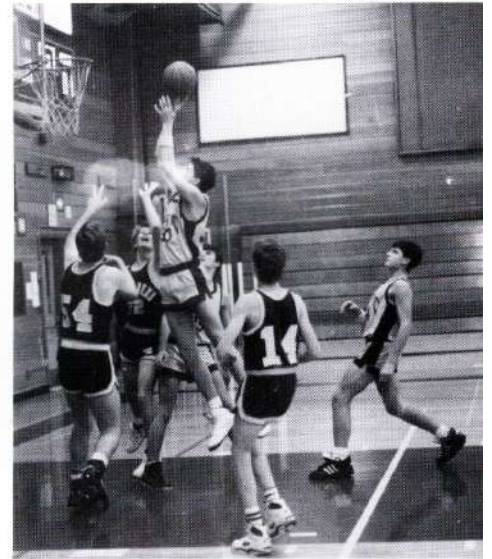

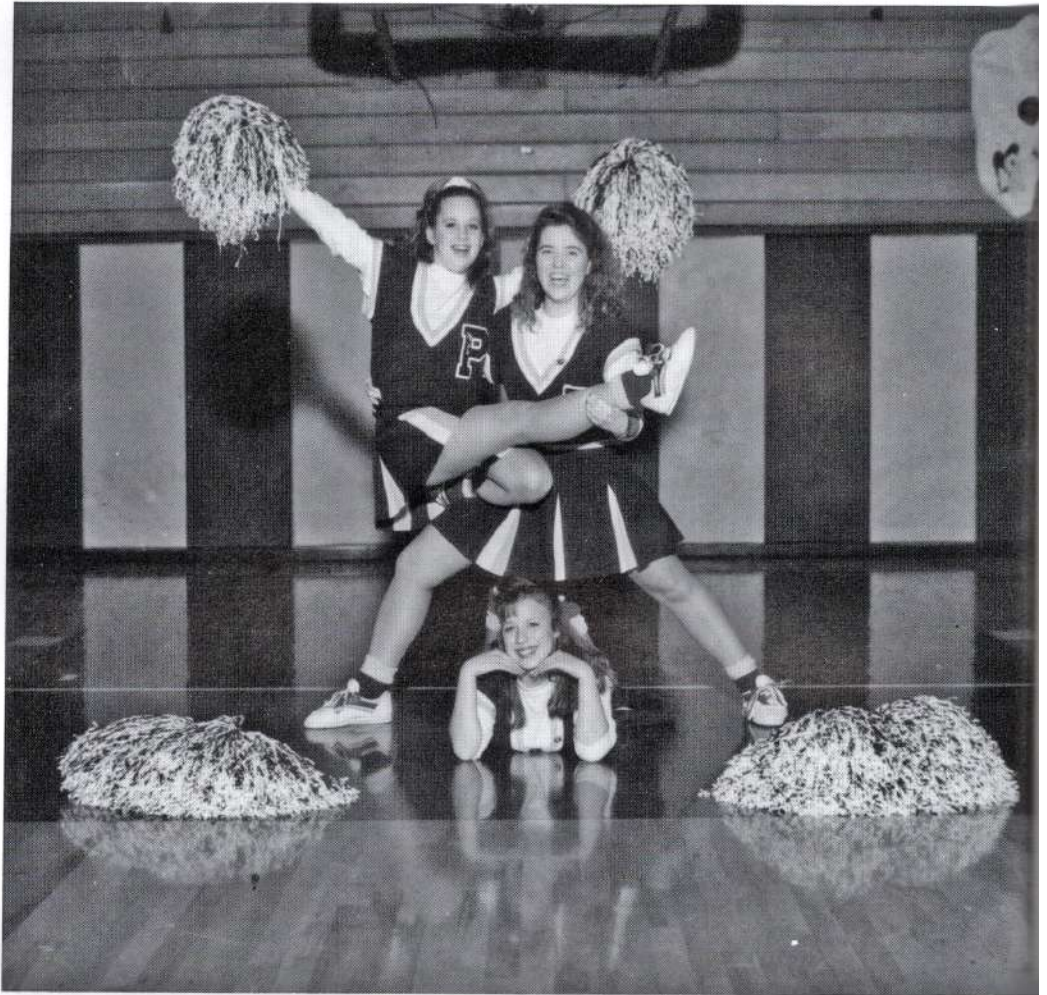

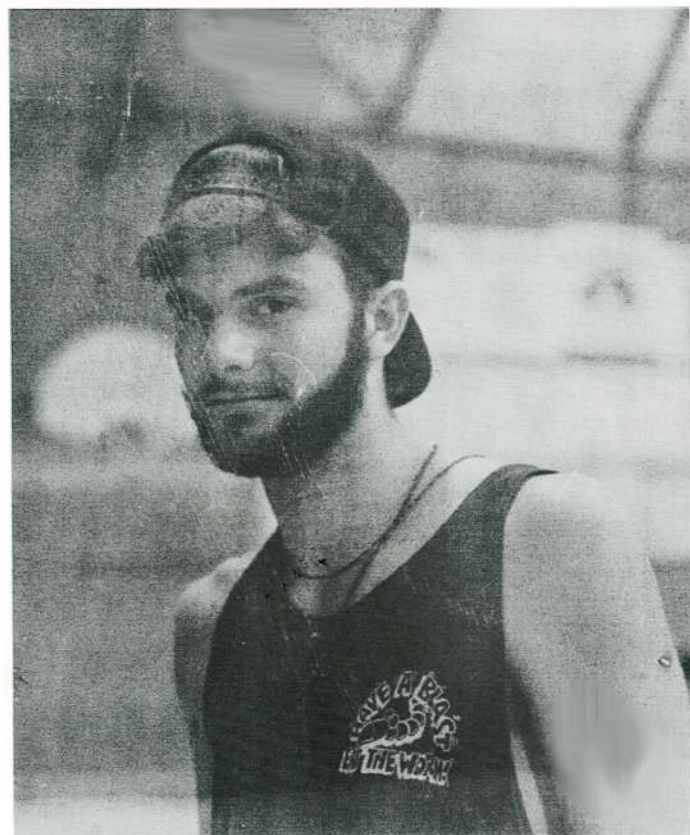
Valedictorian/Salutatorian

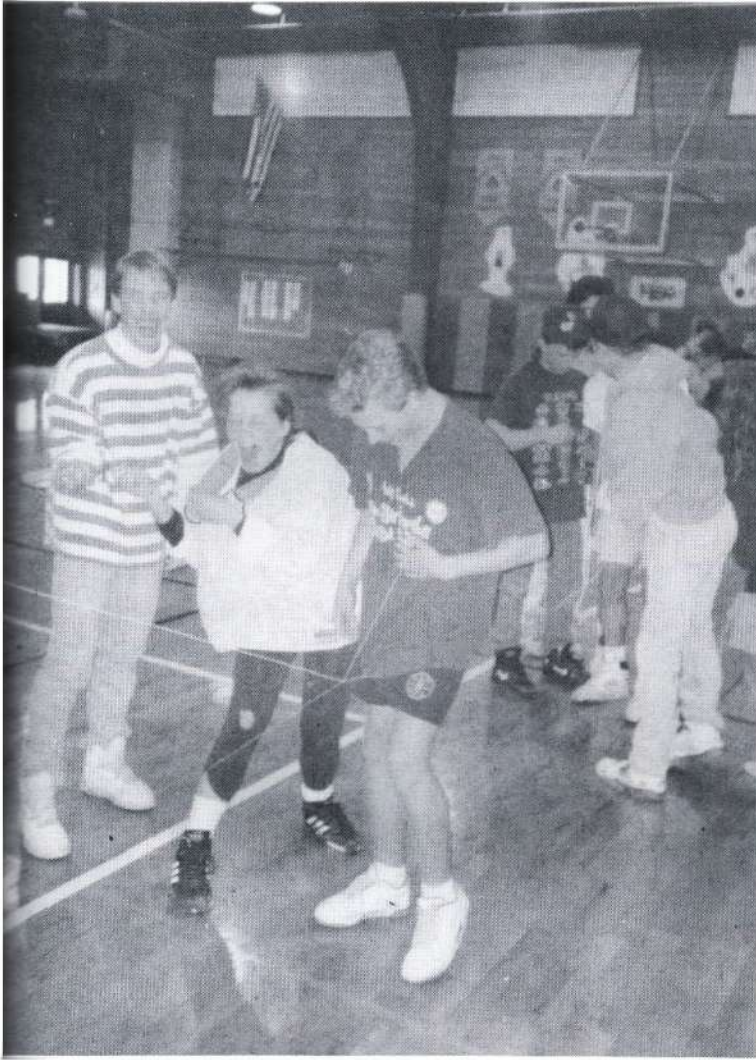

They, of course, regretted missing three days of school, even for a "double dose" of culture.

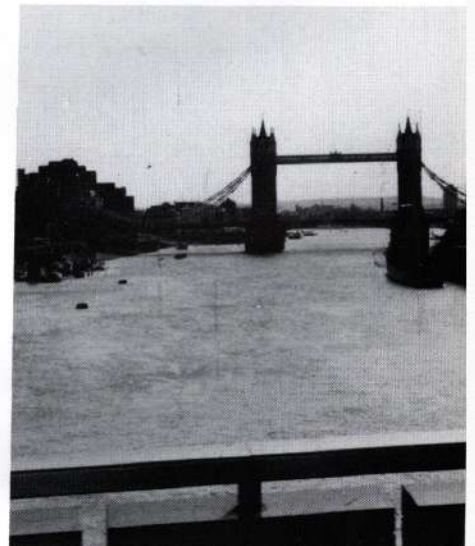

The P.H.S. track team, coached by Jim Kistner and Mr. Snow, had an eventful year. They participated in nine meets, one of which they hosted.

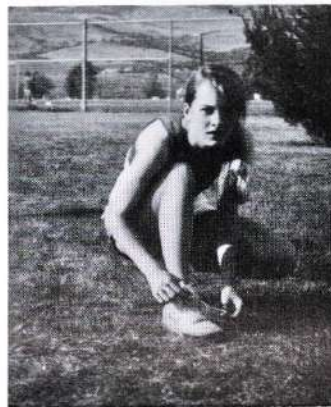

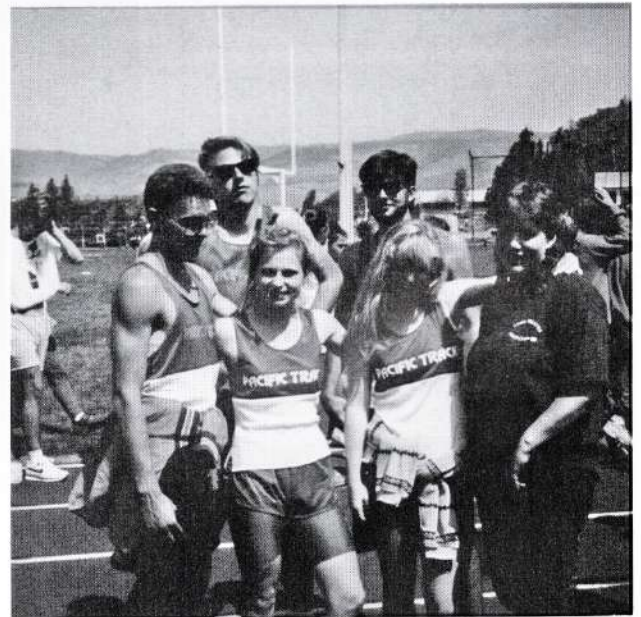
The following awards were presented for accomplishments in track:

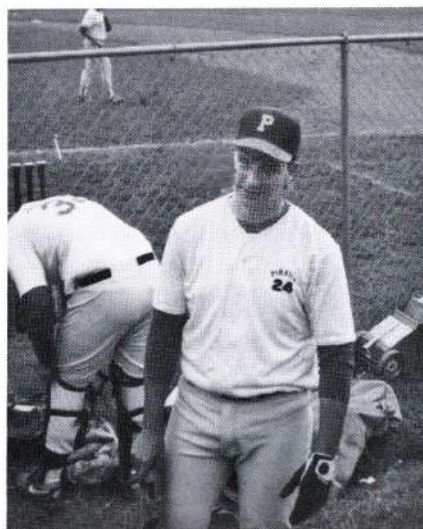

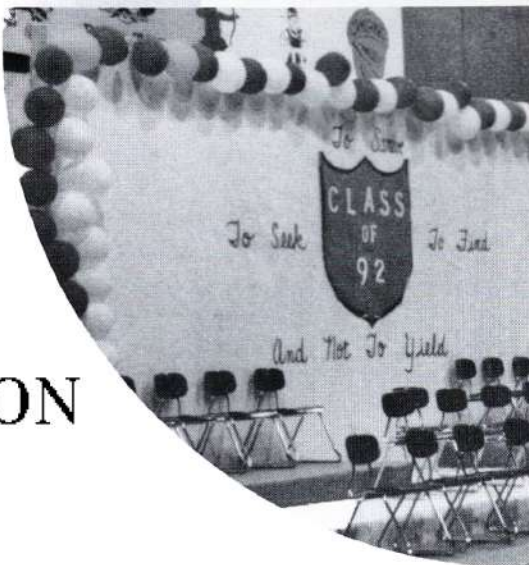
