

Beaver Boy State School Ralph Adams, Jr., of Langlois, sponsored by Curry Post, American Legion, attended the Beaver Boy State School held at the Hill Military Academy plant in Portland last week. This school in practicul citizenship follows the plan of making each one of the boys a citizen of some hypothetical community which forms part of a state. They perform all the duties of a citizen, holding elections, and forming the regular political setup of a state under the American constitution. Raiph Adams had the distinction of being elected to Congress in the election held early in the week which was getting up into the top ranks.



Langlois voters, in Curry county will vote Monday night at their school. New Lake residents will meet Monday night at the Hillis Perkins home.

Langlois is reported on a cash basis now. The Langlois special school levy this year is 10.1 mills and its assessed valuation is \$866,-553. New Lake has an assessed valuation of \$110,465 and a tax levy of 14.3 mills. New Lake's school was destroyed by fire three years ago and since then children have been transported to Langlois and transportation has been paid. New Lake is not on a cash basis in the exact sense, but has enough money in its building fund to pay off all warrants in cash if there is a consolidation and the balance is not longer needed for school building.


School Consolidation At Langlois, New Lake <u>Approved</u> By Patrons



The game will begin at 2 p.m. Langlo's is bringing apair of lefthanded pitchers, and has seven left-handed batters.






